Venice, May 13.

N Sunday last publick Prayers were begun in the Church of St. Mark, for good Success the ensuing Campaign against the Turks, and for Peace; at which Devotions the Doge and Senate, with a great Concourse of People, assisted, and the same were continued three Days. Letters from Corfu of the 15th a last Month give an Account of the Arriva of the last great Convoy that was sent from hence with Stores for the Fleet; and that the Ships of War and Gallies being all careened, most of the Workmen who were fent from hence to be employed in that Service, were preparing to return hither. A Number of Greek Seamen, which had been raised at Zant and Cephalonia, were arrived at Corfu, and were distributed into the feveral Ships and Gallies, which by this Means had their full Complement of Men. 'Tis advised from Smyrna, that the Turks were cleaning their Men of War and Gallies, but will not fit out to Sea a greater Number than they did last Year; that they waited for Mariners from the Islands of the Archipelago, after whose Arrival the Fleet would sail out of the Dardanelles for Chio, there to join the Squadrons from Barbary. It having been advised, that the Turks frequently appear in small Bodies in Sight of Preveza and Vonizza, but without making any Attempt against either of them, being deterred by the good Order they find those Places are in, the Senate have written to General Schulembourg to thank him for his Care in reinforcing those Garrisons timely in March last, and supplying them with all Necessaries; at the same Time intimating to his Excellency, that they would have him forbear to take the Field, till they are able to judge what will be the Issue of the Negotiations in Hungary.

Hague, May 31. A Squadron of nine Men of War will be ready to fail next Week for the Baltick with the Merchant Ships bound for the North. The Marquels de Chateauneuf, Ambassadour of France, has removed out of his House, which is now making ready for his Successour M. de Morville, who is daily expected. We have Ad,
