Adrianople, April 29, O. S.

ON the 24th Instant Mr. Stanyan, one of the Ambassadors of the King of Great Britain for the Mediation, made his publick Entry here. On the same Day the Musti was removed, and another put into his Room. Yesterday when Mr. Stanyan and Mr. Wortley, the British Ambassadors, were going to their Audience of the Grand Vizier, an Account was brought them that he was also deposed, and that Ibrahim Bassa, who is the Grand Signior's Son in Law and Favourite, was put into his Place. However, this Change was made with such Dispatch, that it did not delay their Audience above an Hour; and then their Excellencies went together, according to Custom, to take it of the new Vizier; who on that Occasion declared, that his Predecessour was removed for no other Reason than his not being so well inclined to Peace as the Grand Signior wished, and therefore that this Change would be so far from making any in his Measures towards it, that it would be a Means of finishing much sooner the Negotiation, by removing the chief Obstacle thereto. The Vizier desired Mr. Stanyan to acquaint Sir Robert Sutton with this Step, that he might explain it to the Emperour's Ministers, for fear they should otherwise put a wrong Construction upon it. This Morning Mr. Stanyan had Audience of the Grand Signior. Mr. Wortley intends to be going from hence for Constantinople in five or six Days, in order to imbark for England.

From the Camp near Passarowitz, May 16. On the 4th Instant Sir Robert Sutton, one of the British Ambassadors for the Mediation, arrived near this Place, and spent the next three Days in visiting the Quarters, and regulating other Matters relating to the Congress. On the 8th the Plenipotentiaries of the Port pitched their Tents in the Place marked out for their Camp, and Count Colyer, the Ambassador of the States General, encamped near them. Count Virmont, one of the Imperial Plenipotentiaries, and Sig. Ruzziini

the Venetian Ambassador, are since arrived, and have taken the Quarters at Passarowitz which M. Talman had marked. But the Turkish Plenipotentiaries refusing absolutely to remain in their Camp, by reason of the Distance of the Water and want of Forrage, Sir Robert Sutton was obliged to mount on Horseback, view the Ground on their Side of Passarowitz, choose them a new Camp to the Satisfaction of both Parties, and assign Places for the Conferences, and for himself and Count Colyer to encamp in; those at first designed for that Purpose being improper after the Change of the Situation of the Turkish Camp, and otherwise very inconvenient. The Quarters which the Ministers Mediators now have, are at an equal Distance of about three Quarters of a League from those of the two Parties, as the former designed for them were. After this, the Turkish Ambassadors producing their Full Powers to the Ministers Mediators, who communicated them to the other Plenipotentiaries, they were judged to be defective; first, because the Emperour is therein styled *German Cæsar*, whereas the Grand Signior in his Lettets to his Imperial Majesty hath several times given him the Title of *Roman Emperour*; and the second Exception taken to them, was, that they are not signed by the Grand Signior with his own Hand. The Turks affirmed, that the said Full Powers are intirely conformable to those which were accepted at former Treaties. And whereas it was further objected to them, that they did not appear authorized, by any Instrument in Form, to treat with the Venetian Ambassador; they answered, that they held themselves fully empowered to do it by an Article of their Instructions. But that Article being perused, it was not judged perfectly sufficient. Whereupon the said Plenipotentiaries of the Port dispatched Yesterday an Express, to be accompanied by fourteen of their Servants as far as Nissa, for new Powers and Instructions, which are expected within 24 Days at farthest.

Madrid, May 30. The King being fallen ill again, has removed from Balsain to a private House

House in that Neighbourhood in which Cardinal Alberoni lodged. Admiral Castaneta having not been able to procure such Ships which he was sent to purchase in Holland, had Orders some Time ago to return through France to Barcelona; and he is expected there daily, to take upon him the Command of the Fleet. We have Advice from Barcelona, that all the Troops appointed for the intended Expedition, were to be drawn together in that Neighbourhood by the 25th Instant, in order to embark as soon as the Squadron and Transports expected from Cadiz should be all arrived.

Copenhagen, June 7. The British Squadron under the Command of Sir John Norris, continues in this Road; but will sail in a Day or two, to join the 12 Men of War commanded by Admiral Rabe, which for that Purpose are returned from Bornholm into the Bay of Koge. The King of Denmark set out from this Place on the first Instant in the Morning, and on the 4th crossed the Great Belt, in order to go to Jutland, and from thence to Holstein. On the 4th the Lord Polwarth and Sir John Norris had a Conference with the Danish Ministers.

Flague, June 14. On the 11th Instant the Earl of Cadogan had his publick Audience of the States, with the usual Honours and Solemnity: On which Occasion his Excellency gave them Assurances of His Britannick Majesty's Friendship, and Resolution to maintain an entire Union with this Republick. The same Day Rear Admiral Van Cooper sailed out of the Maese, with the Men of War under his Command, for the North; and the rest of the Convoy, with the Merchant Men, are likewise sailed from the Texel for the Place of Rendezvous: This Squadron consists of Nine Men of War and two Frigates. Yesterday M. Betti Landi, the Spanish Ambassadour, had a Conference with the Deputies of the States for foreign Affairs; in which he presented a Memorial, tending to dissuade them from entering into the Alliance with the Emperour, his Britannick Majesty, and the King of France. The States of the Province of Holland will assemble To-Morrow, in Order to come to a Resolution touching the said Alliance. An Augmentation of the Appointments for the Embassy in France, having now been agreed to by the several Provinces, M. Hop who was named some Time ago for that Commission is preparing his Equipage, and will be ready to set out for Paris in six Weeks. On the 12th Lieutenant General Murray arrived here, to take the Oath of Fidelity to the States for the Government of Tournay, which has lately been conferred on him. General Hompesch is gone from hence, to take Possession of the Government of Boissleduc, which Count Tilly is to put into his Hands, and then to repair himself to Maestricht, of which he is Governour.
