Vienna, April 4.

He Count de Rothal went hence the second instant on his way to Presbourg, in order to his being present there at the affembling again of those Commissioners immediately after the Holydayes; amongst other things before his departure, he received directions from the Emperor, to cause the Declaration his Imperial Majesty hath lately made to be duely published in all places of Hungary, to this effect; That notwithstanding the Emperor had received most evident and notorious testimony, in several late occasions of the disloyal carriage and evil practises of several persons of Quality and many of his No-bility of Hungary against his Person and Government; yet that his Imperial Majesty was graciously inclined to pardon all past Crimes and Offences of that nature, provided they did confess their Errors, and come and submit themselves to his Imperial Majesty, in the persons of his Commissioners at Presburgh, and for the future conform themselves in all things to their duty. It is hoped this milde proceeding of the Emperor may have the defired effect, and bring at length the Nobility and Gentry of those Countries, who have hitherto appeared somewhat obstinate, to a due submission to the Emperors Will and Commands herein; in the mean time we are told, that the Inhabitants about Presbourgh having been informed of the tenor of this Declaration, have already granted 20000 Measures of Corn, with great quantities of Beer and other Provisions for the Subfistance of the Emperors Troops in those parts.

Since the departure of Monsieur Peris in quality

Since the departure of Monsieur Peris in quality of Envoye Extraordinary to the Port, a Courier hath been dispatched from hence in great 1 afte with Letters of much importance as is said, to overtake if possible the said Envoy before his arrival at Adrianople; from whence we have of late received little of news, onely that the Grand Signiors Physicians have perswaded him for his healths sake to change the air, and to go and pass some Months in Asia, to which the present possure of affairs in those parts

feem likewise to induce him.

From Ratisbonne our Letters advise us, that the States were there assembled again after the Faster Holidays, but that by reason of the many difficulties which daily intervene, there seemed to be little likelihood of bringing the matter of the Perpetual Capitulation, which they have had long before them, as yet to any conclusion.

From Mayence they write, that they have been within few days very much allarmed there at the near approach of some French Cavalry, to the number of 500, who were fallen into the County of Fallesin, part as they say of the Duke of Lorrains territories, from whence that City is distant about

20 miles.

Dantzick, April 5. From Warsum we are told, that their Majesties returned thither on Palm-Sunday-Eve from Cracom, whither, after having passed some drys at their Devotions at Crenstocom, they went and spent some time in visiting the Salt-

apines, and in other the Divertisements that those parts afford; since his arrival, the King hath given Audience to the Envoye lately arrived there from the Czar of Moscovy, whom his Majesty the same thay, according to the practice of those Countreys, caused to be entertained at a most splendid and magnificent Dinner. It is said, that the king intends very suddainly to go for Leopol, to be present at the Marriage which is to be there celebrated the 20th instant, between the under General Demetrium Wisnowitsky his Uncle, and the Sister of the Duke of Ostrog, one of the most antient and considerable Families in that Kingdom, which as is said, will be performed with all the splendor and magnificence imaginable.

Our Letters from Caminiec advise us, that the Bassa of Silestria had sent 10000 men to the assistance of Dorofensko, one of the Generals of the Coffacks, and that it was very much feared, that having encreased his strength with so considerable a supply, he might make some incursion into the Countreys of this Kingdom, which border upon the Ukrain's for the preventing of which milchlef, that the General Sobietsky, was drawing the Army out of their winter Quarters, intending immediately to march with them that way to secure those parts from any artempt; notwithstanding which care of our General, we are here much troubled at the advice we have, that a party of Tartars have lately made an inroad into some of the remotest Provinces of the Kingdom, and carried away with them great numbers of Men, both Gentlemen and Peasants, with great quantities of Cattle, having every where as they paised, left the marks of their barbarous cruelty.

From Riga our Letter ives us an account, that Colonel Staden was still there in quelity of Envoye from the Czar of Musicovy, that he ad had several Audiences of that Governour, in which nothing as was known, had passed, but matter of Comple-

ment and Civility.

Cologne, April 17. The Marquis de Grana is at length arrived here on the part of the Emperor, and is at present, together with the Popes Nuncio, endeavouring by all possible means an accommodation of the present differences between the Flector of Cologne and this place; for the better effecting of which, he hath proposed the Flectors of Menta, Triers, and Brandenburgh, to be Mediators in this matter; with this condition, that both parties shall rest satisfied with their determination therein, which affords great occasion of discourse amongs us here.

Hambrough, April 13. Several Dutch Merchants having lately passed this place, on their way from Muscovy towards Holland and other parts, report, that at their leaving that Country, which is as late as any of our Letters that we have received from thence, there was no certain advice of the deseat of the Rebels, so confidently of late reported here so that the Emperor had sent several Forces out against them, but what success they had had, was variously reported, and still much doubted, so that our former report of the deseat of Radzin needs a farther confirmation.

From Hammelen they write, that the Mediators labour still with much earnestness for an accommo-

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dation; that to that end they had framed a new Project for a Preliminary Treaty, which those Princes have as is faid declared themselves satisfied with, fo that nothing now remains but to perswade the Bishop of Muniter likewise to accept thereof, which if they do, a short time it is hoped may conclude this matter.

Legorn, April 6. The first instantarrived here Sir William fennings and Captain Langston, in the Princess and Neweistle Fregats; they will in few days depart again; the former, together with the Faulcon Fregat for Zant, and the other for Port Mahon, meet Sir Edward Spragg there. The 4th instants Greenwich and Affurance Fregats failed from hence with several Merchant men under their Conyor bound for England. The Great Duke is at prese with his Court at Pisa, and on Thursday next is expected here, where after having thaid 3 or 4 days, he will return for Florence again.

Paris, April 18. From Cadiz all our Letters tell us, of the late damage which the late high winds did to that place, and the ships at anchor in the Harbor; in which amongst oth re, several ships belonging to this Nation were funk and destroyed in the Port. To morrow their Majesties return with the Court from Versailles to S. Germains, from whence the King will begin his journey for Flanders on the day formerly fixed, being the 23 instant : the Queen, together with the Dauphin, attended by most of the principal Ladies of the Court, will accompany his Majesty part of his progress; in the mean time we are told of the great and magnificent preparations which the Prince de Conde is making for the receiving their Majesties at Chantilly, which place they are to pass on their way to Dunkirk, and where it is faid they may stay two or three days to recreate themselves with the divertisements that Prince hath with extraordinary gallantry and splendor prepared during their stay, to entertain the Court with.

Monsieur Colbert is daily expected back from Roc'elle, where we hear he last was, under some in-disposition of health, contracted by the toil and trouble of his journey; it is said the King hath writ-ten to him not to expose himself unto any inconveniency by making too much haste in his return.

Higue, April 21. The States of Holland are adjourned till Friday next, by reason of the difficul-ties which arose amongst them, about the Interest money to be allowed for the fum they are about taking up; in which not being able to come to any conclusion, the respective Members are gone to advise with their Principals how to proceed in this

The faid States have refolved to propole to the States General the setling a yearly pension of 25000 Gilders upon his Highness the Prince of Orange,

of which they are willing to pay 5000.

The Deputies of the respective Admiralties are gone from hence, with large instructions in matters relating to the Fleet, but so, as to be expected in few days here back again; in the mean time we are told, that Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter is going for Hel-Joet Auys, to see in what posture our men of War are there.

It is faid that the States are nominating some perfon of quality, to go and Complyment his most Christian Majesty on the r part upon his arrival at Dunkerk. From Luninburgh they write of some new Project, proposed by those Princes to the Bishop of Munster in order to a Treaty; withall declaring, that in case that Bishop refuses to accept thereof, they will not hearken to any other propositions whatso-

From Cologne our Letters of the 17th instant tell us, that the Bishop of Munster had lately written to the Maguirates of that place, offering them

the affiftance of his Forces against whomsoever should go about to attacque them, provided they caused all other Forreign Twoops at present 4: Garrison there, immediately to withdraw out of the Town; but that those Inhabitants had publickly expressed the little inclination they had, of putting themfelves fo far into the hands of that Bishop, as to neglect the fuccors they already had, and still hoped to receive from several of their Neighbours in luch a conjuncture.

Bruffels, April 22. The last advice we had of the French Troops was, that they were on their march from Phillipville towards Ath on their way for Dunkerk; in the mean time our Garisons on that side of the Country are every where well provided, especially at Ipre, where they have 4000 Souldiers within the Town, with Ammunition and other Pro-

visions proportionable.

The 18th instant our Governor the Count de Monterey returned hither from Luxemburgh, where he had been to visit the several places and Fortifications of that County; his Excellency was received throughout all that Province, with all the respects and testimonies of esteem and affection imaginable, the people every where expressing the satisfaction they received, in his Excellencies having been pleafed to honour that Province with his presence, which for many years hath not been done by any General Governor of these Countries before; we are farther told, that the States having been assembled at the time of his Excellencies being there, they had readily confented to an augmentation of the Subfidies some time since granted by them, with a Sum of 36 Thousand Gilders more; besides 50 Thousand Gilders they agreed to raise to be employed in the perfecting the Fortifications of the Capital City of that Province.

Coms Caftle, April 11. We having of late received advice by some vessels coming from the Barbado's, of a violent distemper which very much rages there, which proving most commonly mortal to those it seizes on, hath given occasion to fear it in some degree infectious; upon which, feveral Masters of ships and others newly arrived from those parts, having been solemuly examined, and amongst them one John Moor, Master of the ship, called the Oak of London, he affirms, that at his coming from thence, which was on the 17th of February last past, divers people were taken with a pain in their Head and Back, and that in the space of 5 or 6 days, they either died or recovered again; that many Men but few Women died of this distemper, and that it had been very mortal to the Negroes, but that it was generally thought by all men not to be the Plague.
