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Kensington, June 16.

AN Humble Address of the Grand Jury of Barbados, was presented to His Majesty by the Agents of the said Island, introduced by the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Craggs.

An Address of the President and other principal Inhabitants of the Island of St. Christopher, has likewise been presented to His Majesty by Collonel Matthews, Lieutenant General of the Leeward Islands, and Lieutenant Governour of the said Island of St. Christopher, introduced by the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Craggs.

Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Algiers, March 29. On the 9th of this Month Ali Bashaw, our Dey, fell ill of a Fever, of which he died the 25th in the Evening, having governed this State seven Years and seven Months, and concluded his Administration with this peculiar Felicity, that he left it in Peace, and died a natural Death, in that Station, which has never happened but to one of his Predecessors. The 26th, early in the Morning, a Divan was held, in which Mohamet, who was Treasurer to the deceased Dey, was elected his Successor, and immediately took Possession of his Office. About an Hour after Mr. Thompson, the British Consul, went to Congratulate him upon his Advancement to the Government, and required him to confirm the Articles of Peace between His Majesty of Great Britain and this State; the Dey received him with Marks of great Respect to His Majesty, and of Kindness and Civility towards His Minister, and readily consented to what the Consul desired, which he has since performed by executing a Confirmation in Form of the said Treaty, accompanying it with Promises of using his best Endeavours to cultivate Peace and a good Correspondence with the British Nation.

Belgrade, May 31. A considerable Number of Cannon has lately been brought hither by Water from Buda and other Places, to be planted upon the new Fortifications lately added to this Town, which by the great Care and Diligence of Count Odwyer, who has had the chief Direction of those Works, and of the Repairs of the old ones, is put into a far better State of Defence than while it was in the Possession of the Turks. The Train of Artillery for the Service of our Army is likewise arrived at Semlin, near which Place the Troops come in daily, and in very few Days the whole Army will be encamped. Count Mercy is drawing together another Body of Imperial Troops upon the Banks of the Danube, at some Distance below this Place. A Bridge is making on the Danube near Semendria, after the finishing of which, three other Bridges will be built

on that River at proper Distances, and great Numbers of Pioneers and Country People are employed in clearing the Ways about our Camp, as well for the Conveniency of bringing Provisions and other Necessaries to it, as for the Ease of the Troops whenever they shall have Occasion to march. In the mean Time the Ministers of the several Powers who are employed to negotiate a Treaty of Peace between the Emperour, the Venetians, and the Ottoman Porte, are settling their Quarters at Passarowitz; but there is a Complaint of Scarcity of Provisions, especially in the Quarter of the Turkish Ambassadors, who have desired the Imperialists that they may be supplied for their Money from our Side of the Country, which was readily granted, and Passes are given them for that Purpose. A Turkish Aga who came lately with some Dispatches from Adrianople to the Ministers of the Porte at the Congress, returning home through our Quarters, Care was taken to shew him the good Condition of our Troops, and the Forwardness they are in towards taking the Field, that he might be able to undeceive the Sultan, whom, as it was reported, Count Ragotski had endeavoured to persuade that the Designs of the Spaniards on the Emperour's Territories in Italy would cause such a Diversion of his Forces as to oblige him to weaken his Army in Hungary to a considerable Degree. The Turks are drawing together some Troops near Nissa, but are so backward in their Preparations that their Army cannot be formed sooner than the End of next Month.

Buda, June 4. Prince Eugene of Savoy arrived here the 2d Instant by Water from Vienna; he was received at the Water-side by Baron Loffenholz our Governour, and saluted by a treble Discharge of our Cannon. His Highness, without making any Stay, pursued his Voyage towards Belgrade, in order to take upon him the Command of the Imperial Army. Supplies of Men, Artillery and Warlike Stores are daily passing by this Place for the Army, the greatest Part of which is already arrived at the general Rendezvous in the Plains of Semlin; and all Accounts agree, that never were seen Regiments more compleat and better appointed.

Copenhagen, June 11. The British Squadron under the Command of Admiral Norris, sailed from hence the 9th Instant to the Bay of Kiog, and joined the Danish Squadron consisting of 12 Men of War, commanded by Admiral Raab, who has since sent out a Frigate towards Bornholm, to get Intelligence of the Motions of the Swedish Fleet. The King of Denmark is at present at Odensee, attended by his Great Marshal Count Callemberg, and M. Gabel his Secretary at War, but the rest of his Ministers continue here. Two of the Danish Men of War which sailed some Time ago to the North Sea, are returned into our Road, the other three being found sufficient
