From the Camp as Passarowitz, June 6.

N the 31st past a Beig Aga arrived here from Adrianople with Full Powers, which upon the Representation of the Turkish Ambassadours the Grand Signior has granted them, to fupply the Defect of those they produced upon their Arrival here. He also produced upon their Arrival here. He alfo brought a Letter from the new Grand Viziep to Sir Robert Sutton, His Majefty of Great Britain's Amballadour, full of Expressions of Ci-vility and Kindness, and of his Defire to see a happy Issue of the important Negotiation for which this Congress is appointed, praying him to press the Conclusion of the Peace, left it might meet with any Interruption from the Operations of the Campaign, the Seafon being now fo far advanced. These new Full Powers being delivered into the Mediators Hands, and communicated to the Imperial Ambassiadours, were found fatisfactory in every Point, the Turkifh Ministers being thereby duely authorized to agree to the main fundamental Article of the Treaty, That each Party flould retain the Towns and Territories of which they are now possessed to treat of a Peace with the Ambassadour of the Republick of Venice; which last Article had been entirely omitted in their former Powers. Then the Ceremonial and Method of proceeding in the Conferences being fettled upon the Foot of what was practifed in the Treaty of Carlowitz, it was agreed they should be opened Yesterday. Accordingly a large Tent having been pitched, in the Mediators Quarter, for the Conferences, with two others near it, in which the Ministers, of each Side might repose themselves, the Imperial Ambaffadours, whole Treaty with the Turks is to be first dispatch'd, came thither with great So-lemnity, attended by their Guards and a nu-metous Retinue of Officers and Servants, as did likewife the Ambaffadours of the Ottoman Porte. The Ambafladours alighted at their refpective, Tents, and proceeded from thence to the large Tent above-mentioned, where being feated in the Order which had before been agreed upon, the Conference began about 11 in the Morning, and lasted till Two in the Afternoon. The Imperialists began with declaring, that they looked upon the Article of each Side retaining what they have in prefent Possession, to be entirely fixt and determined, to which the Turks agreed. Then the Imperialists moved in behalf of the Republick of Venice, to whom the Turks engaged that reasonable Satisfaction should be given; and an Article-was drawn up for that Purpole. The next Point they fettled was, that the Grand Signior fhould for thwith banifh Prince Ragotski and the Hungarian Outlaws his Adherents out of his Dominions, and should never give Refuge or Allistance to any Rebel Subjects of the Emperour. The Turks afterwards defired a Ceffation of Arms during the Congress, but the Imperialists positively refused it. Then the Conference was adjourned to this Day, and the Ambaffadours having entertained each other with Coffee and other Refreshments, returned to their respective Quarters. The mutual Benevo-

lence which both Parties expressed towards each other at this first Interview, and the Frankness of their Debates, give all imaginable Cause to hope that Matters will soon be brought to a happy Accommodation.

Madrid, June 13. The Court continues at Balfain, where their Majeflics have been en-tertained with Hunting, and they intended this Week to have taken a fhort Journey of Pleasure to the Efcurial : But their Diversions were interrupted by a Return of the King's Illnefs, who on the 8th Instant was feized with the fame Indisposition as formerly in his Stomach, accompanied with an Ague, from which he is not yet free. An Advice Boat is arrived at Cadiz, being difpatched from New Spain by the Viceroy, with Notice that the Flota homeward bound from Vera Cruz would fail about the End of May laff, fo that it may be expected at Cadiz towards the Beginning of August. They write from Bar-celona, that the Men of War and Transports which lately failed from Cadiz were arrived there, in order to join the great Convöy which is to carry the last Supplies of Men, Artillery, and Stores of all Kinds for the Spanish Army in Sardinia, and will be ready to put to Sea by the Middle of this Month.

Drefden, June 18. The States of the Electorate of Saxony, which were affembled in this City, ended their Seffion the 28th of the last Month. The King of Poland fet out from hence the fame Day for the Caftle of Reuffen in Poland, whither Multapha Talhiskey Aga, Envoy from the Ottoman Porte, came from Warfaw to at-tend his Majefty. The 4th Inftant the Envoy had his first Audience, to which he was conducted with great Solemnity : He delivered a Letter from the Sultan to his Majefty, complimenting him upon the Continuation of the Peace and good Correspondence between them, acquainting his Majesty that he hoped, through the Mediation of the King of Great Britain and the States of the United Netherlands, to see a fpeedy End put to the War in which he was unhappily engaged with the Emperour of Germany and the State of Venice, to which he defired his Majesty would contribute his good Offices, and concluding with his Wifhes and Promifes of doing his Endeavour to live always in perfect Friendship with the King and Kingdom of Poland. The Envoy made a Speech to the fame Purpole, and was told he should receive the King's Answer in writing; after which he was reconducted by the Crown Marshal to the Houle that had been prepared for his Reception, where he was folendidly entertained at his Ma-jefty's Expense. The 11th in the Morning the Envoy had his Audience of Leave, and received the King's Answer to the Grand Signior's Letter: After which the King left Reuffen, and returned hither the 13th. It is faid his Majefty has appointed a General Diet of the Kingdom of Poland to meet at Warfaw in August next. Letters from thence give an Account, that the Mulcovite Forces which were marching homewards from Poland, upon the Receipt of fresh Orders from the Czar, are turned towards Pruffia, to oblige the City of Dantzick to-fulfill the

Conditions they entered into with him the laft Year, there being 50000 Crowns yet unpaid of the Sum they had agreed to give, and two Frigates wanting which they promifed to furnish for his Service. It is reported that his Czarish Majesty and the King of Prussia are to have an Interview at Memel towards the End of this Month.

Hambourg, June 21. The King of Denmark came lately from Copenhagen to Gluckstad, and having reviewed his Troops in those Parts is gone to Slefwick. Our Letters from Copenhagen of the 18th Inflant fay, the British and Danish Fleet was still in the Bay of Kiog; and that according to their Advices from Norway, the Swedifh Troops on the Frontiers of that Kingdom continued very quiet. They write from Petersbourg of the 28th paft, that the Muscovite Vice Chan-cellour Shaffiroff, whom the Czar has appointed his Plenipotentiary to treat with the Swedish Ministers at Aland, had been feized with a Fit of an Apoplexy, which prevented his Journey; and by our Accounts from Stockholm of the 4th Instant, Baron Gortz; who is to transact with him on the Part of Sweden, was not yet fet out from that Place.

Hague, June 24. The States of Holland and West-Friseland are to meet to Morrow, and it is expected they will foon come to a Refolution to give their Confent to this Republick's entering into the Treaty lately fet on Foot for the Prefervation of the General Peace and Tranquility of Europe, the feveral Towns of this Province having expressed their good Disposition towards The Earl of Cadogan, Ambaffadour Extrait. ordinary and Plenipotentiary from the King of Great Britain, having been prevented by the Ceremonies of his Entry and Audience from keeping his Majesty's Birth Day, gave a very fplendid Entertainment Yesterday, upon that Occafion, to the foreign Ministers and other Perfons of Diffinction refiding here. The young Earl of Albemarle arrived here the 21st Instant from Nancy, and intends fhortly to go to England.

Whitehall, June 20. The respective Convo-cations of the Clergy of the Provinces of Canterbury and York, which flood prorogued to Wednefday the 18th of this Month, are further prorogued to Friday the 31st of October next.
