Madrid, July 4.

THE King of Spain, since his Removal to the Escorial, has felt some Returns of his Ague, but is so well recovered that he went abroad two Days ago to take the Air. The Differences between this Court and that of Rome are come to such a Height that the Pope's Nuuncio has been order'd to depart from hence, and all the Grandees, the Ministers of State, and others in his Majesty's Service, are forbid to have any Communication with him. He has desired however, that he may be allowed to wait in some Place at three or four Leagues distance from this Town for the Return of an Express he sent to Rome upon this Occasion, which has been granted. The Number of Officers employed by the Council of the Hazienda or Treasury being thought too great, several of them have been discharged, who are however to be allowed two thirds of their Salaries by way of Pension. The Inhabitants of Biscay refusing to pay certain Duties lately imposed on their Trade, some Troops are sent that Way to oblige them to a Compliance. Our last Advices from Barcelona say, a Vessel was come into that Port, the Master whereof reported, that the Fleet which failed from thence the 17th, was the 20th in Sight of the Island of Sardinia.

Paris, July 16. The Parliament of Paris having desired an Audience of the King, to make a further Representation upon the Subject of the late Edict for regulating the Coyn, the same is appointed to be on the 18th Instant. There does not appear any Disposition in the other Parliaments of this Kingdom to concur with this Parliament in their Opposition to the Execution of the said Edict. The Cardinals, Bishops, and other Prelates who are in Town, have frequent Meetings, to consult upon the Measures to be fallen upon, in case the Pope persists in the Resolution our Letters from Rome say he has taken, to proceed to Ecclesiastical Censures against those who refuse to submit to his Constitution: The Marquis de Levi is made Lieutenant-General of Franche Comté in the Room of the Marquis de Grammont lately deceased. The Prince de Carignan having withdrawn himself privately from the Court of Turin, upon some Discontent, came hither this Week. Monsieur de Morville being appointed Ambassador from this Court to the States-General, is on his Departure for the Hague; whence Monsieur Hop is shortly expected with the like Character from that Republick. We have no certain Advices of the Spanish Fleet, since its Departure from Barcelona; but there is a Report of its having met with bad Weather at Sea, and been driven towards the Coast of Barbary. Letters from Cadiz of the 30th past, say, that Orders had been come thither some Days, for the Departure of the Galeons for New-Spain which were to be convoy'd by three Men of War and two Fregates, but that they were detained in that Port by contrary Winds.

Hague, July 15. The Earl Cadogan having in his Conferences with the Deputies of the States-General, settled the Accompts of the Sums negociated in the Netherlands during the last War, nothing remains now to be adjusted but some Debts owing to this State, for Stores that have been furnish'd for the Service of the Spanish Netherlands, during the Reign of his late Catholick Majesty Charles the 11d, for the settling whereof, the Sieurs Copiefters and Nanny are come hither from Brussels, and the Marquis de Prié is shortly expected from thence, to put the last hand to that Negotiation, after which the Barrier Treaty will be fully put in Execution.

Hague, July 19. The States of Holland and West-Friseland met this Morning for the Dispatch of several Domestick Affairs. Our homeward bound East-India Fleet consisting of 22 Sail, is safely arrived. Baron Heems, the Emperour's Envoy, has received by an Express from Vienna, an Account of the Conclusion of the Peace between the Imperialists and Venetians, and the Ottoman Porte. We have yet no Advices that can be depended on concerning the Spanish Fleet, which failed about a Month ago from Barcelona. Some Letters from those Parts say, that it put into Cagliari in Sardinia, and was still there the 25th of the last Month.

Whitehall, July 8. An Express arrived this Day, with Letters from Vienna of the 9th Instant, N. S. which brought the welcome News of the happy Conclusion of the Negociation at Passarowitz, set on foot by the Mediation of His Majesty and the States General for restoring Peace between the Emperour and the Republick of Venice, and the Grand Seignior; every Article of the Treaty being settled and signed by the respective Plenipotentiaries, and Directions being given for the Instruments to be forthwith drawn out in form and perfected. Upon which Orders had been issued to detach immediately six Regiments of Foot and four of Horse, making in all about 16000 Men, to reinforce the Emperour's Troops in Italy.

Whitehall, July 10. An Express arrived here this Morning from the Earl Stanhope, and the Earl of Stairs, with an Account that a Convention between His Majesty and the Most Christian King, for settling the Terms of Treaties of Peace between the Emperour and the King of Spain, and between his Imperial Majesty and the King of Sicily, having on the 6th Instant, O. S. been read in the Council of the Regency, and unanimously approved, was the next Morning signed by their Excellencies on the Part of Great Britain, and by the Marshal d'Huxelles, President of the Council for Foreign Affairs, and the Count de Chiverny, another Member of the said Council, thereto empower'd, on the Part of France.

Kensington, July 11. Monsieur de Dalwig, Envoy from the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, had on the 8th Instant his first private Audience of His Majesty, to which he was introduced by the Rt. Hon. James Cragge, Esq; one of His Majesty's Principal

remonies.

The same Day Monsieur le Coq, Minister from the King of Poland, had also his first private Audience of His Majesty; to which he was likewise introduced by the Rt. Hon. Mr. Secretary Craggs, and conducted by Sir Clement Cotterell, Master of the Ceremonies.

Yesterday Signior Ré, Secretary from the Duke of Parma, had a private Audience of His Majesty, being introduced by the Right Honourable James Craggs, Esq; one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cotterell, Master of the Ceremonies, and delivered to His Majesty a Letter from his Highness, notifying the Death of the Dutchess Dowager of Modena his Highness's Sister.

The Court goes into Mourning next Sunday for three Weeks upon this Occasion.

THIS Court being informed that several Common Players of Interludes, did, in the Month of August last, assemble and meet together, at or near a certain Place called Tattenhoe, alias Tattenhall, alias Tottenham-Court, in the Parish of St. Pancras, in this County; and did then and there erect several Booths, and exhibit and act several Drolls, and use and exercise several unlawful Games and Plays, whereby great Numbers of His Majesty's Subjects were encouraged to assemble and meet together, and to commit Riots and other Misdemeanors, in Breach of His Majesty's Peace, and to the Disturbance of the Neighbourhood of that Place; and that some of the same Players or Interludes, and other evil disposed Persons, are now seeking out and contracting for Ground, in or near Tattenhoe, alias Tattenhall, alias Tottenham-Court, aforesaid, as well as in divers other Parts of this County, to build Booths for lawfully acting such Plays and Drolls, and for carrying on and encouraging of divers kinds of unlawful Play and Gaming; and whereas all such Players of Interludes are deemed and declared Rogues and Vagabonds, and the acting of such Plays and Drolls, and the keeping of publick Gaming-Tables or Gaming-Houses, are contrary to the Laws and Statutes of this Realm, and do manifestly and directly tend to the Encouragement of Vice and Immorality, and to the debauching and ruining of Servants, Apprentices, and others, as well as to the Disturbance of the publick Peace, by occasioning Quarrels, Riots and Tumults, and other Disorders, whereby it will be very difficult for the Justices and other Civil Magistrates and Officers of this County (if such Practices are permitted) to preserve the publick Peace, or to prevent or punish such Misdemeanors as may be committed by such Numbers of evil disposed Persons as do usually meet at such Places, and on such Occasions. For the preventing of such Mischiefs and Disorders for the future, it is thought fit and ordered by this Court, that the High Constable of Holborn Division in this County do forthwith Issue forth his Precepts to the Petty Constables of Tattenhoe, alias Tattenhall, alias Tottenham-Court, and other the Constables and Headboroughs of the Parish of St. Pancras aforesaid, requiring them forthwith to give publick Notice of this Order, by affixing the same on the most notorious Places, or by such other ways and means as they shall think most proper within their respective Divisions for the better Notification thereof, and to the end that no Persons may pretend Ignorance; And in case any of the said Common Players of Interludes or others, shall notwithstanding, shew or act any such Plays or Drolls, or keep any Gaming-Houses or Gaming-Tables, the said high and petty Constables, and all other Officers, are hereby required to apprehend, and carry them before one or more of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for this County, dwelling nearest to the Places where any such Booths, or Gaming-Houses, or Gaming-Tables, shall be erected or erecting, to the end they may be punished according to the Laws in such Case made and provided. And it is further order'd, that all the High Constables, Petty Constables, and other Officers within this County, where any Booths shall be erecting, or where they shall be credibly intormed any such Drolls, Plays, or Gaming, are intended to be shewed or carried on, shall act in the same or like manner, and observe and obey the same Orders, within their respective Jurisdictions, Divisions, or Parishes, as is before ordered, concerning the High Constable, Petty Constables, and other Officers of Holborn-Division: And for the better preventing, or suppressing of the Disorders aforesaid, it is also recommended to the Justices of the Peace within their several Divisions, to meet together, to take and use such lawful Means, as may be most effectual

answer the contrary at their Peril: And it is further ordered by this Court, that this Order be forthwith Printed and Published in one or more of the publick News-Papers, for the better Notification hereof.
