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Naples, July 19.

PON the first Advice of the Spanish Fleet's making fail toward these Parts, Count Thaun, our Viceroy, made all the necessary Dispositions for the Security of this City. The Count de Conversano brought in 1500 of his Vassals, well armed and accoursed, to be employed in the Emperour's Service; the Prince of San Nicandro offered to advance 10000 Ducats towards defraying the extraordinary Expences of out Military Preparations, and many others of the Nobility and wealthy Inhabitants of this Kingdom have given like Marks of their Zeal for his Imperial Majesty's Service. Two Camps were marked out, one near Magdalen Bridge, and the other at Bagnoli, for the Troops which are quartered in our Neighbourhood; and those which are to defend some Redoubts raised along the Coast to prevent the Spaniards making a Descent, were ordered to their Posts. About the same Time 60 Tarranes arrived here laden with Corn, and we received a Reinforcement of 800 Germans from Hungary, who came by Sea from Fiume to Manfredonia. Several Feluccas are come in from Mellina, having on board the Sicilian Viceroy's Lady, and the le of several other Persons of Distinction, with their Retinues, who came off upon the Spa-nish Forces landing in that Island. They brought an Account, that Palermo not being in a Condition to hold out a Siege, the Viceroy found it necessary to quit that Place and retired to Messina, where he had got together a good Garrison of the King of Si-cily's Troops, and had prevailed with the Imperial Governour of Reggio, who is an experienced Officer, to come over to Mef-fina and affift him with his Advice in put-ting that Place into the best Posture of De-fence, and that he did not doubt of main-taining it against any Force the Spaniards

were able to bring before it.

Leghorn, July 20. By an English Ship which came in nine Days from Sicily we have an Account, that the Spaniards, fince their taking of Palermo, had detached 3000 Horse to invest Melazzo, in which Place was a Piemontese Garrison that had taken all possible Care to put it in a good Posture of Desence; the Master of the said Ship adds, that the Spaniards had sent a Detachment of their Fleet from Sieily to Sardinia for a Reinforcement of Land Forces.

Venice, July 30. The Senate received Advice Yellerday by an Express from Sig. Ruzzini, their Ambassadour at the Congress at Passa-rowitz, that the Treaty of Peace between the Emperour and this Republick and the Ottoman Porte, was signed there the zist Instant. A French Ship came in this Week from the Archipelago, the Commander whereof reports, that he saw the Turkish Fleet the 5th off of Castel Rosso on the Coast of Negropont, and on the 7th met our Fleet off of Cape Metapan, A Conspiracy had been formed by many of the Seamen on Board the Swan, one of our Men of War, to have murdered their Officers, and fuch of their Comrades as would not join with them, and to carry the Ship away to Barbary; but it was happily discovered the Day before they intended to put their barbarous Defign in Execution, and the Ringleaders were seized, and four of them immediately put to Death. Letters from Rome of the 22d past say, the Pope entered that Day into the 70th Year of his Age; and that Count Gallas, the Emperour's Ambassadour, had demanded Passage through the Ecclesiastical Territories for an Imperial Regiment of Cuiraffiers and one of Dragoons, the former of which was marching from Mantua, and the other

from the Milaneze to the Kingdom of Naples.

Francfort. Aug. 7. The Troops of the Circles of the Upper Rhine and Franconia, singe their late unsuccessful Attempt to enter into the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel's Territories in order to disposses him of the Citadel of Rhinfeld, have continued quiet in their Quarters, and all Endeavours are used to prevent any further Disturbances on that Side, and to end the Dispute by an amicable Composition. Our Advices from Hungary say, that the Imperial Army was separated, in order to the more convenient subsisting of the Troops, and that about 25000 of them would shortly march to-wards Bohemia and Silesia. They give us the following Account of the Detachment which is actually marched from the Imperial Camp toward Italy; That it consists of Six Regiments of Imperial Foot of 2300 Men each, four of Cuirassiers each of 1100 Men, and two of Hussars of 600 Men each, making in the whole 13800 Foot and 5600 Horse, commanded by the Lieutenant Generals Veterani of Horse, Wachtendonk, Brown, Holstein Beck and Seckendorff of Foot, and the Major Generals Eck of Horse, Diesbach and Prince Maximilian of Hesse of Foot. Besides these Reinforcements the Imperialifis are faid to have already in the Kingdom of Naples, 8 Regi-

ments of Foot, amounting to 17600 Men, and 1 two Regiments of Horle making together 1700 Men, and in the Milaneze 10 Regiments of Foot which make 16800 Men, and 3 of Horse

making 4020 Men.

Paris, Aug. 11. By an Express which left Turin the 6th Instant and arrived here this Morning, we have Advice that the Emperour having consented to assist the King of Sicily, and sent Orders for that Purpose to the Viceroy of Naples; the Count de Bourg, a Major General in his Sicilian Majesty's Service, had been dispatched to Messina with Orders to the Viceroy of Sicily to admit such Succours of Imperial Troops as should be sent him. The King of Sicily having now no Measures to keep with the King of Spain, and entring into the Views of the Alliance concluded at London, in order to restore the Tranquility of Europe, Has sent Directions to the Count de Provana, his Ambassadour here, to repair to the Court of Great Britain to carry on a Negociation upon that Foot, who intends accordingly to let ont from hence for London the 13th. By this Express we have an Account from Messina of the 21st past, that the Vicetoy had reinforced the Garrison of that Place with a Batallion of . Foot, and four Companies of Grenadiers from Syracuse, and was well provided with Neces faries for a vigorous Defence; and that on the 18th the Spanish Troops from Palermo landed near Melazzo, in which Place was a Garrison of two Batallions and four Compa nies of Grenadiers. Our Letters from Bayonne of the 4th Instant say, the Earl Stanhope having received a Pals from the King of Spain, intended to proceed from thence the next Day

on his Journey to Madrid.

Hague, Aug 12. The Sieur Fontaine, Secretary of the Embassy from this State to the Ottoman Porte, arrived here the 10th Instant from Passarowitz, and brought the Treaty of Peace lately concluded between the Emperour and Venetians and the Grand Signior. fame Day Prince Kourakin, Ambassadour from the Czar of Muscovy, presented a Memorial to the States General, to acquaint them with the Reasons which have induced his Czarish Majetty to put their Resident the Sieur Bye under Arrest, and to seize his Papers, de-siring that they would recall him. Yesterday the Earl Cadogan, His Majesty of Great Britain's Ambaffadour Extraordinary, fet out for Amsterdam, but will shortly return hither. The Count de Chateauneuf, Ambassadour from France, has taken Leave of the Publick Ministers and other Persons of Distinction here, and is on his Departure for Paris, from whence M. de Morville, who is to succeed him in that Station, is expected in few Days.
