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Warsaw, July 29.

THE King of Poland is expected here from Dresden about the middle of next Month. The Turkish Envoy who lately had Audience of his Majesty at Reissen, took his Leave of the Crown General at Lemberg the 19th past, and proceeded on his Journey home. Twelve Regiments of Muscovite Troops came lately from Smolensko to Orzana. Our Accounts from Muscovy say, the Cossacks continue in Rebellion against the Czar.

Venice, Aug. 6. The 2d Instant the Senate received an Express from the Chevalier Ruzzini, their Ambassadour at the Congress at Passarowitz, with the welcome News that the Treaty of Peace between the Emperour and this State, and the Ottoman Porte, was signed there the 21st past; and the 4th being Sunday, the Doge, attended by a great Number of Nobility, went in State to the great Church of St. Mark, where Te Deum was sung upon this happy Occasion. Count Coloredo, the Emperour's Ambassadour, who had likewise received a Courier with the same News from Vienna, caused a solemn Service to be performed in the Church of the Carmelite Friars, and gave a very magnificent Entertainment to several Persons of Distinction. An English Merchant Man is come in here from the Archipelago, the Master whereof reports, that the Turkish Fleet was come out of the Dardanelles; and that on the 9th of the last Month he met the Venetian Fleet, under the Command of Admiral Diedo, in the Bay of Cerigo, sailing to the Eastward with a fair Wind. And there are Letters from Zant of the 10th which say, that they had heard the report of great Guns at Sea all that Day, which began in the Morning and did not cease till Night, from whence they conclude the two Fleets had been engaged. They write from Naples of the

29th past, that they were in daily Expectation of the Appearance of the British Fleet on their Coast; that Count Thaur, their Viceroy, had got together a good Number of Feluccas and other Vessels for the transporting of Troops to Reggio; and that General Wallis and several other Imperial Officers were gone over from the Place last mentioned to Messina, to assist in the Defence of that City, which besides its Citadel is defended by the Castles of Salvatore and Mattagrifone, all very well fortified and provided with strong Garrisons, and with Ammunition and all other Necessaries, and which entirely command both the City and the Port; and that the Towns of Trapani, Melazzo and Syracuse were likewise in a Condition to hold out a considerable Time, and sufficiently garrisoned.

Francfort, Aug. 11. The Troops of the Circles, to whom is committed the Execution of the Imperial Mandate for putting the Landgrave of Hesse Rhinfeld in Possession of Rhinfeld, having received fresh Orders to proceed, drew together again this Week, and advanced within half a League of the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel's Territories, whose Troops were in Readiness to oppose them, and had Orders to act offensively upon the least Hostility's being committed: But upon a Message which General Isselbach, who commands the Troops of the Circle, received from the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, he thought fit to halt, and there is yet Reason to hope that this Matter is in a way of Accomodation. The Bishop and Chapter of Munster have chosen Prince Philip, one of the younger Sons of the Elector of Bavaria, Coadjutor of that Bishoprick.

Copenhagen, Aug. 13. The King of Denmark went back to Fredericksbourg the 9th Instant, and returned Yesterday to this Place; his Majesty intends in a few Days to make a Tour to Laland and Falster, and the Isle of Mona, to visit the

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Fortifications and Magazines, and review the Troops in those Parts. The British and Danish Fleet continues at the Island of Bornholm to observe the Swedish Fleet, four Ships of which came lately out of Carlscroon, but soon put back into that Port upon the Approach of some of our Men of War that were sent out to give them Chase. Our Letters from Norway give an Account, that the Swedish Forces on the Borders of that Kingdom attempted lately to pass a Lake above the Swinsund, but were repulsed with Loss by the Danes; the King of Sweden himself was present in that Action, and received a Wound in his Eye by a Splinter of a Piece of a Rock that was shattered by a Cannon Ball. The Frontiers of Norway are so well secured, that it is believed the Swedes will not be able to make any Impression on that Side.

Himbouurg, Aug. 16. We have an Account from Mecklembourg, that the Duke seems to listen to Proposals that have been made him for accommodating the Differences between him and the Nobility of that Dutchy, and had already made Restitution of the Estates of some of them which he had confiscated. They write from Stockholm, that Baron Gortz was to return shortly to the Isle of A-land, to renew the Conferences with Baron Schaffin of the Czar of Muscovy's Minister. Letters from Norway of the 27th past, give an Account of an Action which happened the 22d on the Borders of that Country, between the Swedish and Danish Troops, the former attempting to pass over a Lake and land at a Place called Ide, but they were repulsed by the Danes, who had fired out several large Boats for that Purpose, with Troops and Artillery on Board, from Frederickshall, and obliged them to retire with considerable Loss.

Higus, Aug. 19. The Earl Cadogan, His Majesty of Great Britain's Ambassador Extraordinary, returned hither the 14th Instant from Amsterdam. The Imperial Ministers, have consented to the Method proposed by the States General of stating the Accounts of the Sums they advanced for the Defence of the Spanish Netherlands, during the Reign of the late King of Spain, Charles the 2d, and that Point being settled, all Matters relating to the Execution of the Barrier Treaty will now be adjusted in a very short Time. Yesterday Baron Heems, the Emperour's Minister, had a Conference with the States General, to invite them in the Name of his Imperial

Majesty, to enter into the Alliance lately concluded at London, for restoring the Peace of Christendom. The States of the Province of Holland and West Friseland are now assembled, and it is expected that before they separate they will resolve to give their Consent that this Republick shall enter into that Alliance, as the States of the Province of Guelderland have done, who met last Week to consider of that Affair. Prince Kourakin, the Muscovite Ambassadour, had on the 16th a Conference with the States General, who therein delivered their Answer to his late Memorial upon the seizing of the Sieur de Bye, their Resident at the Czar's Court, acquainting him that they had recalled their said Resident, and desiring he may be sent home with all his Papers; adding that they will examine into his Conduct, and if there appears just Cause of Complaint against him, they will give his Czarish Majesty all reasonable Satisfaction. M. de Morville, Ambassadour from the most Christian King, arrived here from Paris the 17th; and the Count de Chateauneuf, whom he succeeds in that Station, having since taken Leave of the States General, will set out, from hence, in three or four Days on his Return home.

Kensington, Aug. 8. On Tuesday last Sig. Ré, Secretary from the Duke of Parma, had a private Audience of His Majesty, being introduced by the Right Honourable James Craggs, Esq; one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cotterell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies, and delivered to his Majesty a Letter from his Highness, notifying the Death of the Princess Elizabeth Farnese, his Highness's Sister.
