Troops were at Galue on their march to Dunkirke, and the next day they were to lodge at Steenfiract, and fo forward.

We were told that a party of 500 French horfe had lately appeared under the Walls of Ghent; but as we have been fince informed, they were onely fent out for the apprehending fome Souldiers who had deferted their Companies.

Hague, April 24. The Councel of State have vertue of an Order of the States General to that purpose, commanded all Officers at present, og which hereafter shall be in their Service, of why Nation foever they may be, to exercise their Real ments or Companies in Dutch, to take Dutch Colours, to cause no other March to be beaten, then what is accustomed in the Provinces, and to conform themselves in every thing else to the Discipline of this place; fo that all the Forreign Troops will for the future be united under one Body, and be no more known by those distinct Names of the French, Highdutch, or other Regiments, as hath been heretofore practifed. It is faid they have refolved to pay the King of Denmark 60000 Gil-ders, in lieu of the Sublidies due to him from this State, about the latter end of this Month, and the other remaining Sum, within fome fhort time farther:

Bruffels, April 24. The Prince de Mamines is preparing him elf for his journey, being appointed by his Catholick Majefty, to go in quality of Envoye Extraordinary to Complyment his moft Christian Majefty upon his arrival in Flanders. Our Governor the Count de Monterey went hen e the 22 inftant for Antwerp to fetch his Lady, so the whore he returned again hither the next day.

Hazuo, April 28. The 25 instant the States of Holland and Westfreesland parted , and the same day the States General deputed two of their Body to go and condole on their part with his Highneis the Prince of Orange, upon the death of the Dutchels of York; for whom his Highnels hath put himfelf and whole Family into mourning. Our Fleet is at present quite ready, the ships set out by the Ad-miralty of Amsterdam are in the Texel, and it is faid that Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter and Lieute. nant Admiral de Ghent will in few days receive ditections to fail with them, as likewife those of Rot-terdam to the place of Rendezvouz, which it is thought will be in the Weilings : From Westphalie our letters allure us, that the Bishop of Munster has nnally accepted of the late project as proposed by the Dukes of Lunenbourg; and that the preliminaries being thus agreed on, they have allowed two months for the concluding the Principal Treaty, which we doubt not, fince they are fo farr advanced, but will be done without any difficulty.

Falmouth, April 17. The 14 inftant came in here the St. George of Topsham from Charante with wines, together with the Patience of Tarmouth, and three Merchant men more from Bourdeaux bound for London.

Plymouth, April 18. Yesterday arrived in this Port the Anne Captain Brown, and the Loyal-Merchant Captain Riby Commanders from the East-Findies, at the same time sailed from hence the Fohn and Margaret Captain Martin commander for those parts.

Whitchal. April 22. This afternoon his Majefly with the ufual Solemnities, being prefent in the House of Peers, the house of Commons with their Speaker attending him, he was gratiously pleased to give his Royal Assent to several Bills then prefented to him : after which my Lord Keeper by his Majesties command prorogued the Parliament till the Mos April next.
