Lisbon, August 13, N. S.,

N the 28th paft arrived the Rio Fleet, confifting of 13 Sail, befides three they left at Oporto. By this Fleet came Dom Joan Manoel' de Noranha Governour of Angola, and Dom Braz Baltezar de Silveira Governour of the Mines. It brings 86 Arobas of Gold, and 432052 Moedas regiftred, befides above, as much which is not regiftred ; 5365 Chefts and 649 half Chefts of Sugar, 1252 Elephants Teeth, 3279 tanned Hides, and 1546 not tanned, 280 Roles of Tobaeco, and 70 Pipes of Train Oyl,

Madrid, Aug. 15. On the 12th Inftant the Earl Stanhope arrived here, and Yesterday went to Fresser, a Seat within half a League of the Escurial, where Cardinal Alberoni had caused very commodious Lodgings to be fitted up for him. The same Evening about Six a-Clock, his Lordship went to the Cardinal at the Escurial by Appointment, and had a long Conference with him. We have had no Advices from Sicily, fince the taking of the Castle of Palermo.

From on board the Barfleur at Naples, July 25, O. S. On the 21ft Inftant late at Night Sir George Byng with the British Fleet under his Command, came to an Anchor in this Port. The next Morning the Admiral, with feveral Officers, went alhore, and being received by the Viceroy with all Marks of Effeem and Diftinction, had a Conference with him. The Viceroy having received Directions from the Emperour to give the King of Sicily what Affiftance he is able, in order to it he has caused 2000 Men to be imbarked for reinforcing the Garrisons of the Citadel and Fort of Messina. That the Transports may go fase, the Admirat is now unmooring, defigning to proceed this Night to Sea, and fecure their Paffage.

From on board the Batfleur going through the Faro of Melfinia, the york of July, O. S. Sir George Byng, with the Britilh Fleet, came off of the Point of Meffina last Night, and fent Captain Saunders, ashore with a Letter to the Mara quess de Lede, who is Captain Genew ral, and commands in chief the Spanish Army in the Island of Sicily : Upon the Receipt of which in the Conference Captain Saunders had with him, as likewife by the Letter he fent to Sin George Byng in answer to his, he declared that, he had no Powers to treat, and that he would purfue his Orders, .) which were to fieze on Si cily. The finall Forts above the Town of Mellina," as likewife the Town it felf, were furrendred to the Spaniards by the Sicilians, upon Capitula-tion that they fhould not bring thein Troops within the Town. General Wetzel, with all the Tartans and German Troops is gone to Reggio, and from thence will fend over to the Citadel and Fort of Meffina, which ftill hold out, and will be able to do fo fome Time, the Spaniards not having yet railed any Batteries against them, but only placed Mortars to play upon them, which have yet done but very little Damage. Sir George Byng had also Intelligence, that Yetterday Morning the Spanish Fleet weighed in some Confusion from Meffina, and went through the Faro; and as we were standing in this Morning powards Messina,' he received Advices from the Calabrian Shore, that the Spanish Fleet were in Sight of Reggio; upon which he has refolved to follow them. When he is through the Faro, he will fend to the Viceroy Count Maffei, who is now an

at Syracula, and will be able; as we are informed, to defend that Place. Sir George had a Letter this Moining from the Governour of Melazzo, who ftill holds, out-against the Spaniards.

Syracufa, Aug. 11. N. S. The 9th Inftant at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, the Spä nish Fleet set Sail from the Faro, and made towards Carania upon this Coaft, where Yef torday in the Evening we discovered a great Number of Ships. They had left their Army at Land, which continued then the Bombard ment of the Citadel of Mettina, pretending that-they were coming to-this Place; but in reality they were flying from the British Fleet, which they understood was coming with full Sail towards the Faro. Yesterday at Two inthe Afternoon, the British Fleet confishing of about 25 large Men of War, came into the Fa ro; and the Spanish Fleet having no Wind, they came up with them at a Place about 12 Miles from this Town, off of Avola, as they were making towards CapePaffaro : TheRear Guard of the Spanish Fleet was in Sight this Morn ing till about Sun Riling, making off towards the faid Cape, and about an Hour after we heard à continued terrible Noife of the firing of Cannon, whereby we underftood there was an'Engagement between the two Fleets. About Nooh we had Intelligence, that Admiral Byng, with the greately Part of his Ships, was purfuing the Body of the Spanish Fleet, which had been very roughly handled, and that fix or leven British Men of War staid behind to attack the Spanish Rear, whereof they had then fank four. Since which Advice, we faw from hence five other Spanish Ships blown up behind the Point of Sta, Barbara d'Ognu no; and this Evening late we fill distover-ed the Fires. Admiral Byng has acquainted Count Maffei here, that he had furrounded 12. Spanish Ships of War in such Manner that they could no ways eccape, and that it would coft him but a few Hours to make himfelf Master of them.

Hagne, Aug. 26. The Marquels de Prié having agreed to flate and fettle the Accompts of the Sums raifed during the Time of his late Catholick Majefly King Charles II. in the manner proposed by the Council of State here, the Imperial and Dutch Commissions appointed for the Examination of this Matter, continue to meet every Day. They have now made a confiderable Progress, and the British Ministers press them to fanish with all imaginable Expedition. The States being informed, that the Danes do again take their Ships trading to Sweden, and that above 30 of them were already carryed into the Ports of Norway by the Danish Frigates, invited Yesterday the Danish Resident to a Conference, and complained of these

Proceedings. He told them, that the King his Mafter in releasing their ships last Winter had promised not to disturb any more thei Trade, provided Sweden would do the fame, and not upon any other Fobt. That most of their Ships had falfe Bills of Lading for Neutral Ports, when in reality they were bound for Sweden, and taken failing that way. That the greatest Part of them were laden with Corn and all other Sorts of Provisions to store Magazines, for the Ufe of a Swedifh Aimy now ready to invade Norway; and that the King his Mafter cannot fuffer fuch Supplies, to be furnished to his Enemy, as enable him to invade his Country ; nor will confent to the Free Trade they infift upon, till Sweden has acquiefced to the fame.
