*Madrid, August 22.*

**O**N the 18th Instant arrived an Express from the Marquess de Lede, with Letters dated the 24th of July, giving an Account, that on the 23d he caused his Infantry to be landed between Metazzo and Messina, without any Opposition, the Cavalry joining them the same Day. That then the Army advancing towards Messina, two Piemontese Battallions which were at a Post called the Capuchins, quitted it and retired into the Citadel and Forts. Whereupon the Inhabitants of Messina set open the Gates of the City, and admitted the Spaniards with great Acclamations of Joy. The Marquess de Lede had sent a Detachment towards Syracuse. Upon this News the Bells were rung, and Illuminations made here three Nights successively. On the 19th came Advice of the Arrival at Cadiz of the Flota from New Spain on the 15th Instant, under the Command of Sig. Sertano; having on Board six Millions and an half in Gold and Silver, of which one Million and an half belongs to the King: The other Effects brought by this Flota, are computed at two Millions and an half. 'Tis not yet known what Indulgence the King will lay upon this Cargo. On the 18th Instant marched from hence a Detachment of 100 Life Guards for Catalonia; and other Troops quartered in several Parts of Castile, are ordered to march thither likewise, upon the pressing Instances (tis said) of the Gouvernour of Castel-Rodrigo, Gouvernour of that Principality.

*Berne, Aug. 24.* On the 18th Instant M. Leathergerber, Secretary to the Abbot of St. Gall, had an Audience of the Council for secret Affairs, wherein he delivered the Ratification of the Treaty of Baden, on the Part of his Master, and received in Exchange that of this Canton. Promise was made to him at the same Time, that the Library and Sett of Bells, that had been taken from the Convent of St. Gall should be restored, and that his Master should be installed the 28th Instant. He set out again for Ravensberg, the Abbot's dwelling Place, on Saturday last, having received a Medal of this Star, of the Value of 40 Ducats, as a Recompence for his Trouble; the like has been presented to him by that of Zurich, where he had been some Days before on the same Errand. The Marquess d'Avagay, Ambassador of France to the Helvetic Body, is come back from Paris to Soleure, where the Pope's Nuncio was likewise expected from Lucy, Intercessor with that Minister. They write from Milan of the 15th Instant, that besides the Regiment of Hanover and Anspach, that of Odwyk was actually on the March for Naples, and it was said, would be followed shortly by that of the Marschal Visconti.

*Copenhagen, Aug. 27.* On the 24th Instant arrived two Mails from Norway. The last Letters are dated the 19th Instant, on which Day there had been an Action between the Danes, under the Command of Lieutenant General Count Sponeck, and the Swedes, on the Bay called Ide-Fiort, where the Swedes were possessed of a small Island called Scriver-

**Sunday.** On the 9th in the Night Count Sponeck came with 500 Men to the Shore over against that Island, having ordered Captain Jansen with some armed Vessels to repair thither. In the Night the Count caused a Battery to be raised, and at Day break commanded Captain Jansen to go with some of his Vessels near the said Island. Hereupon the Swedes came off with several Gallies and Shallops, to attack the Danish Vessels, which retiring as they had been directed, under the Cannon of the Battery, the Swedes pursued them close with three Gallies, four double Shallops, and other lesser Boats. Then the Count de Sponeck caused his Men to appear, and a terrible Fire of great and small shot being made upon the Swedes, two of their Gallies were sunk and two of their Shallops. The Danes had likewise placed Cannon in a Pratime, which being towed by some Gallies, had dismounted the Cannon of three or four Batteries which the Swedes had raised on their side of the Bay, and so left the said Harbour; and the 10th at Night Count Sponeck had ordered 500 Men to take Post on that Island, and dislodge the Swedes.

**Hague, Sept. 2.** Yesterday Circular Letters were sent to all the Towns of Holland, for their Deputies to repair hither and assist in the Assembly of the States of that Province, which is appointed to be held on the 9th instant. Two Days ago the Earl Cadogan and Mr. Whitworth, His Britannick Majesty's Minister, had a Conference with the Deputies of the States General; as had also the same day M. de Morville, Ambassador of France. M. Don Emmanuel of Portugal designs to leave this Place on the 10th instant, in order to go to the Court of France. The Deputies which were sent to Gröninghen to endeavour to put an End to the Dispute between that City and the Ommelanden, are returned hither, having succeeded in their Commission.

**Paris, Sept. 3.** By Letters from Madrid of the 26th of August is advised, that Earl Stanhope having had his Audience of Leave of the King and Queen of

Spain, was to set out betimes the next Morning, proposing to reach Bayonne in six Days, and to come hither in nine more.
