## Malaga, April 7.

He winds have been of late very high and violent in all these parts, not without doing much harm, especially on the Coast of Barbary, where, as we are told, fome Veflels going to the Spanish Garrisons have been lost; and amongst others, several Ships belonging to Argiers : but this is so uncertainly reported, that we cannot give as yet any great credit

to it. Yesterday arrived here the Guernsey, and another English Fregat, with 25 fail of Merchant men under their Convoy, and intend in two or three days to fayl in purfuance of their voyages.

Rome, April 11. On Sunday last his Holineis attended by feveral Cardinals and other perfons of quality of the Court, went from his Palace of Mon-tecavallo to the Church de Minerva, being follow-ed by all his Guards and others of his Houshold, where he affisted at all the publick Offices of the day. The next day his Holinefs was pleafed himfelf to perform in his private Chappel, the cere-mony of Marriage between the duke de Gravina Orfino and the Lady Ludovica Altieri, in the presence of feveral Cardinals and other perfons of the greaseft quality, allyed to those two noble Families : after which they were all entertained at a most splendid dinner, by the Cardinal Altieri in his own apartment in the Palace; the faid Duke hath been fince to visit the Queen of Smeden, who received him with all the marks of effect and respect, due to the quality of the Popes Nephew, a title which his Holinels in favor of this Marriage hath been pleafed to confer upon him.

The 8th inftant the Abbot de Bourlemont, st pre-fent Agent for his most Christian Majesly in this Court, had Audience of the Pope, when he delivered him freft Letters from that King, in which he very warmely prefles his Holinefs to bestow the vacant Cardinals cap; on the Bishop of Laon, for whom that King hath long defired it.

To motrow will be celebrated with great Pomp and Magnificence the Cannonifation of the five new Saints, in order to which the Pope goes and lodges

this night at St. Peters. Vienna, April 12. The Process of the Count Na-dasti, accused of Treasonable practices against the present Government, is finally finished, and in few days they will accordingly proceed to give fentence againft him; by which, those that pretend to know most of that affair, report, he will be condemn-ed to die, and to have his Estate conficated to the Emperor, but his friends and relations hope better; or at the worft, that their intreaties and follicitations will fo far prevail with his Imperial Majesty, as to reprieve hini from death, in the mean time they are likewife framing a Process against the Counts, Serini, Franchipani and others concerned in that Rebellion, though it is faid, that the Prince Ragotsky hath fent to follicite their pardons of the Emperor.

From Presburg they write, that upon the Count de Rothals having cauled the Emperors late Decla-

on to fubmit themielves to the Emperors commands, in what concerns their immediate appearing before the Commissioners there

His Imperial Majefty is gone to divert himfelf for some days at Laxemburgh; before his departure he was pleafed to beftow the charge of General of

Waradin on Prince Charles of Lorrain. From Caffovia we have advice of fome difpute which hath lately happened, between the Garrison and those Inhabitants, by reason that the latte irefuled to furnish them with provisions, of which it feems they were in great want; in which they would have proceeded fo far as at laft to come to blows, but that the Authority of some persons of quality appeafed their fury, and at length composed the whole matter. From the Port some Letters speak of the deal of the grand Vizier, but this we know not how to credit without farther confirmation.

Lifbon, March 30. The Popes Nuncio who hath been fo long expected here from Rome is not yet arrived; but in the mean time we have received the Buls for the confirmation of seven new Bishops, viz. the Archbishop of Lisbone, Antonio de Mendoça; the Bishop of Coninbra Don Manoel de Naronha; the Bishop of Aquarda, Alvaro de Sant. Bonaventura ; the Bishop of Liria, Pedro Vicira de Sylva; the Archbishop of Goa, Christoval de Sylveira; the Bi-shop of Brazile, Don Esteuan Carneiro; and the ti-tular Bishop of Martyria, Luis de Sousa, chief Chaplain to the Prince Regent.

OurBrazile Fleet which fome time fince was by bad weather forced back into port, not without some dammage in their Masts and Rigging, may in a very fhort time be ready to fayl again, though it is by fome reported, that they will be obliged to ftay for the Archbishop of Goa and the Bishop of Brazile, in order to their trausportation to their respective Sees, but, we hope the contrary, fearing they might by io long a ftay, lofe their voyages. *Madrid*, April 15. Some days fince the Marquis of

Aytona, Son and Heir to the late Marquis of that Title, was married to the onely daughter of the Conde de Medel lin, Prefident of the Confejo de Ordenes.

Upon the news we had from Flanders of the. death of Don Antonio Pimentelli late Governor of Antwerp, feveral Candidates have appeared for that employment, which being of principal Truft; and one of the most important in all those Countries, her Majesty thinks fit to proceed more mature ly in that choice, and hath not as yet declared her pleasure in the matter.

What was formerly faid of the Marquis de Montroys being nominated by the Queen Regent to the Government of Cadiz, fome time fince, proves to be a miffake, her Majesty having thought fit to dif-pose of that Government to Don Diego Cavallero, at present Vice-roy of Navarre. The Constable of Caftile having been some time fince privately married to the Dutchels of Cardona, without the know-ledg of many of his Friends and Relations, is inrending to make them amends, for what according to the cuftom he should have done upon his wedration to be every where published; feveral of the ding tlay, with a most magnificent and fum-Hungarian Nobility had declared a great inclinati- ptuous Treat, and other divertifements of all kinds,

kinds, which he is with great coft preparing to entertain them fuddenly with.

The Archbishop de Thoulouse, Ambassador extraordinary from his most Christian Majelly in this Court, speaks of returning very speedily home, but yet not till fuch time as his fucceffor arrive here, or at least within the Territories of this Crown. The Conde de Molina at present Ambassador from hence in the Court of England, being ordered to pass over into France, to reside there in the same quality, her Majesty hath fately nominated the Marquis de Winces, having met with all the fuccels imagina-Freine, Brother in law to the Conde de Penaranda and Nephew to the Constable of Castile, to fucceed him as Ambassador extraordinary there. Dantgick, April 18. From Warsam our last Let-

ters tell us, that their Majesties were gone to divert themselves for some days to a house of pleasure, they have within three miles of this place : That the Sieur Opasky, who was lately fent by his Majefty in quality of his Envoy to the Elector of Branden-burgh, being some time fince returned from thence, is to go very speedily in the same quality to Swe-den, and as is thought may reside there for some time: That they are much allarmed by some Letters lately received from the Ukrain, in which they are told, of the approach of the Turks and Tartowards those parts; that the former have made a Bridg over the River Danube, to ferve upon any occasion for passage to their Forces, which causes great fears and apprehensions amongst us : That they have certain advice of another incursion of the Tartars, notwithstanding all the endeavors of our Generals to prevent the fame; who befides the other damages they have done, carryed away near 4000 Inhabitants captives : That the Commissioners assenbled by order of the King and Senate at Radon to adjust the pretentions of the Army, have not as yet been able to conclude any thing therein.

From Moscowy we have not any late news, so that we know not what to judg of the affairs of those Countries, which the general report speaks to be still in an unquiet and disturbed condition.

• Paris, April 28. The Ambaffador who hath fome time refided in this Court on the part of the Republick of Venice, having before his Majesties departure for Flanders, been with the usual Ceremonies conducted to take his leave of him in order to his return home, his Majesty was then pleased to give him the Cross, which he is to wear as Knight of Maltha, of the order of St. Lagarus of Ferusatem, an honour this King hath as well in confideration of his own worth, as to express the particular efteem he hath for that antient and illustrious Family of Morofini, of which he is, been pleafed to confer upon him, belides some other rich prefents the King hath bestowed upon him.

The King having disposed of the Government of Languedoc, to the Count de Lauqun, hath fince permitted him to quit his command of Captain of the Guards of his body, to the Count de Nogent his Brother in Law, at present Gentleman of the Wardrobe, which place the King hath fince given to the Chevalier de Lauqun Brother to the faid Count.

We are told of an unhappy accident that happened at Chantilly, at their Majesties being there with the Court, it seems the Prince de Conde's Mastre d'Hostel, because t'at great entertainment was not ferved up , and performed with that order and exattnefs as he defired, out of trouble retired privately to his Chamber, and there miferably killed himfelf.

The Mareshal de la Ferte is at present dangerously ill

infomuch that some begin to despair of his recovery. Haque, April 28. Our Leters from Spain tell us, that they have lately made over to the Count de Monterey Governor of Flanders Joacoo Crowns,

and that fo foon as their West-India Fleet arrive, they will permit another confiderable fum to be employed for his most Catholick Majesties Service in those parts; That all hands are at work to repair their leveral Fortifications all along the Sea Coaft, towards which charge the States of Caffile and Arragon have largely contributed.

Bruffels, May 1. Cur Letters yelterday arrived Am Spain, tell us, that Monsieur Beverning Ambaslador from the States General of the United Prople in his regotiation there, was accordingly thinking of returning home very fuddainly. The 29th patt went hence Monsieur de Louvigny, by his Excellencies order for the Hague; and yesterday the Baron d' Iffola returned for the same place.

His Excellency intends within few days to go for Bruges, where he will stay during the time his most Christian Majesty is in Flanders; and at the fame time Count Marcin will go for Ipre, to see in what condition that place is in ; where as is faid, they have above 5000 men in Garrifon; and for their better fecurity have made feveral Sluces, by which they can upon an occasion, put the Countrey thereabouts under water, and fo hinder the approach of any enemy. His Excellency hath given order for the marching of feveral Troops which were quartered at Louain, Malines, and those other remoter parts, to march towards the Frontiers of Flanders, and to expect there his further directions.

Cologne, April 24. The Landt-Gravinne of Heffe hath lately caufed a General Muster to be made of all the forces fhe hath at prefent on foot, which are Ten thousand men effective; and some speak as if in these jealous times they intended to increase them by some new supplies.
