Rome, September 20.

ON the 15th Instant a Contract of Marriage between the Constable Colonna and the Daughter of the late Duke Salviati, was signed in the Palace Salviati; her Dowry is 150000 Crowns. On the 18th they were married by Cardinal Fabroni. Certain Inhabitants of Montelibretto, and some Officers belonging to the Prince of Palestrina, were lately seized and brought hither, upon Complaint made by Count Gallas the Emperour's Ambassadour, that they held Intelligence with Scarpileggia the Chief of the Banditi; but upon Examination their Guilt not appearing, they were all dismissed, except one who still remains confined. Captain Grifoni is sent to Villettri, in order to head a Number of Soldiers to Collalto, and act with them against the Banditi, who commit great Disorders in the open Country, and in the Woods and Forests thereabouts. Sig. Molara, Commissary of Arms, is gone at the same time to acquaint the Duke of Gaetano, that the Pope out of Regard to him would not send Sbirri nor Soldiers on his Estate, but desires him to assist Captain Grifoni against the Banditi, many of whom have retired into his Woods. 'Tis advised from Malta, that the Great Master of that Order being very much broken by his great Age and Infirmities, had appointed Don Raimond de Paz, a Majorcan, to be his Lieutenant.

Milan, Sept. 21. On Sunday last the Companies of the Regiment of Konigseck, which were in Garrison in our Castle, marched for Pavia, where they are to join the rest of their Regiment, and proceed with that of Bareith and two other Battallions to Genoa, there to be imbarked for Naples. By Letters from Rome 'tis advised, that since the Publication the 8th Instant of the Brief of Separation, against those Prelates in France who refuse Obedience to the Bull *Unigenitus*, nothing further has been done by the Court of Rome in that Affair; but that they wait to see what Effects that Brief will have in France, and whether the Success will be answerable to the Hopes with which the Pope has been flattered by his Adherents in that Kingdom.

Genoa, Oct. 4. Certain Officers are gone, by Order of this Government, to meet on the Frontiers 5600 Imperialists, and to conduct them to San Pietro d' Arena, where they are to imbark for Naples. A Man of War and several Transports are expected in three or four Days from Naples, to take on board those Troops. General Wachtendonk, who is to command them, arrived this Afternoon from Milan, and says the said Troops will be at San Pietro d' Arena by the 12th Instant. Two Days ago came into this Port two British Ships from Alicant, which in their Way touched at Port Mahon. Here is come also, the Eagle, commanded by Captain: Thomas King, in 14 Days from Messina.

Copenhagen, Oct. 4. e ave etters o the 27th of last Month from the British and Danish Squadrons, which left them at Bornholm; in which Station 'tis believed they will continue, till they have Advice that the Trade from the Baltick (which is expected daily) is come safe hither. By a Ship which was off the Harbour of Carlscroon about a Fortnight ago, We have an Account, that the Swedish Admirals Flags were struck, and all their Men of War, except six, hawled into the Basin; their Sails un- bent, and their Yards and Topmasts down. By Letters from Petersbourg we learn, that the Czar with his Fleet returned thither the 14th past. Last Week the Lord Polwarth, his Britannick Majesty's Minister, went to Fredericksbourg, where the King of Denmark and the Prince Royal have been some Days, taking the Diversion of Hunting.

Hambourg, Oct. 11. On the 1st Instant arrived a Ship with Letters from Drontheim dated the 17th past, giving an Account that a Body of 8 or 10000 Swedes, commanded by General Ahrnfeld had made an Irruption into that Part of the Country: That General Budde, with a Body of Danish Troops, not exceeding 3000 Men, had opposed them, first at Sevefegord, and afterwards at Stein, but was forced by the great Superiority of the Swedes to retire from both Places; that the said Danish General's Horse was killed under him, and that he retreated into the Castle of Drontheim; causing the Beacons to be fired for some Miles round that Place, for a Signal to the Peasants to draw together, and to annoy the Enemy, chiefly by depriving them of Subsistence. By Letters that are since arrived from Norway we learn, that the Body of Swedes under General Ahrnfeld had found a Way through Jempterland, and was advanced within four Leagues of Drontheim. It is said the Design of the Swedes is upon Bergen, but besides that Aggerhuys is in their Way, 'tis doubted whether that Project can be executed without a Naval Force. The Rencounters between the Danes and those Swedes who have broke into Norway, were not considerable. The

the Swedes commanded by the King of Sweden, are on the Frontiers of Fredericksfall. The Troops above-mentioned under General Ahrnfeld, had been employed about Stockholm and towards Finland, till they were ordered on this Expedition.

Hague, Oct. 14. M. Pestfers, Resident of the States General at Brussels, is come hither from thence. The Marquess de Prié being expected at Rotterdam to Morrow, on his Way to this Place, the Imperial Commissaries M. Neny and Copieters are gone thither to meet him. They have prepared and settled every thing relating to the Accompts which they were sent to adjust, in such a Manner, that 'tis not doubted the new Convention for terminating all Disputes about the Barrier-Treaty, will in a few Days be signed by the said Marquess. We expect every Day to hear, that the States of the Province of Zealand, who have been assembled since the 10th Instant, have come to a Resolution of acceding to the Quadruple Alliance.

Hampton-Court, Oct. 13. This Day the Ratifications of the Treaty signed at London the 22d of July last, between the Emperour, His Britannick Majesty, and the most Christian King, were mutually exchanged by the several Parties concerned.
