Ere is arrived the Hopewell of London in eleven weeks from Famazca, which Colony they left in a very good and healthy condition, and the people there in dayly expectation of the return of the Fleet of Privateers, which some time since sailed from thence.

Plymouth, April 25. This day according to His Majesties Order, were shipt on board the Reserve Fregar, two Companies of Foot of this Garrison for the River of Thames; this evening the Loyal Merchant, and the Ann from the East Indies, are undersayl for London.

Venice, April 18. N.S. Some Vessels arriving here from Zant, with Letters from the Proveditor General, we understand, that he had happily concluded the affair of exchanging the Prisoners taken during the late Wars with the Turks, and that the Fleet under his command, was in a very good concidion, so that having in a manner nothing more to do in those parts, it is said, this Senate will easily give him leave to return hither.

This Republick having ordered a squadron of their men of war, to continue still cruising near Sapiensu; we have not heard of any dammage the Pyrates have of late done in those Seas. It is said, that the Galleys of Maltha have not long since raken several Merchant ships belonging to the Turks, which we very much fear may provoke the Port, and prove of bad consequence to that State.

By Letters from the Port we are assured, that the Grand Scignor is fully resolved to pass very suddainly with all the Forces he hath at present on foot in those parts, into Asia; to which his Physicians, as well as the Grand Visier and other Ministers at present admits him though upon different accompts; yet some speak as if he would first go to Constantinople; to celebrate the Circumcision of his Son; for though the Sultaness in the mean time stands with her party on her guard, and is sufficiently watchful to prevent any surprise, yet seems the willing to have this solemnity kept there.
