HIS Day the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London attended His Majesty with the Petition which follows;

To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Petition of the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of the City of London.

SHEWETH,

HAT your Petitioners are apprehensive of being disquieted in the Execution of their Offices, by Pretence of not subscribing a Declaration against the Solemn League and Covenant at the Time of their Admission into their respective Offices, pursuant to an Act of Parliament made in the thirteenth Year of King Charles the Second.

That fuch Subscription hath been generally disused, and the said Act in that Particular for the

most part disregarded.

That your Petitioners have in the Administra-tion of their Offices behaved themselves with all Duty and Affection to your Majesty and your Government; and humbly hope and pray, that your Majesty will give such Directions and Orders herein as shall effectually quiet the Minds of your Petitioners, and enable them to proceed with Chearfulnels in the Execution of their respective Offices for the Service of your Majesty and the Preserva-tion of the publick Peace.

And your Petitioners shall ever pray, &c.

His Majesty was pleased to receive them very graciously, and to return the following most gracious Answer.

Am fully perswaded of your Duty and Affection to Me and My Government; and I take this Application kindly, as it is a Mark of your Trust and Considence in Me. I shall be glad, not only for, your Sakes but my own, if any Defests which may touch the Rights of my good Subjects are discovered in my Time, since that will furnish me with the Means of giving you and all my People an indisputable Proof of my Tenderness for their Privileges, and how untilling I shall ever be to take Advantage of their Mistakes. Advantage of their Mistakes.

Naples, Oct. 21. The Imperial Regiment of Dragoons of Tige, confishing of 800 Men, has lately been sent from hence to Melazzo, and a considerable Number of Tartanes and other Vessels are fitting out in this Port, to transport thither likewise the Imperial Regiments of Horse of Hanover and Anspach, and that of Foot of Oduyer, together with a great Quantity of all manner of warlike Stores. We have an Account from thence of the 16th Instant, that the Spaniards having invested that Place and begun to form a Line of Circum-vallation round it; the Imperial Generals obserwing that the Enemy daily received fresh Reinforcements, and were carrying on their Works with great Application, judged it convenient to attack them before they had finished their Line. They accordingly made a general Sally the 15th before break of Day with the Regiment of Dra-

goons abovementioned, commanded by Lieutenant General Veterani, and five Regiments of Im-perial and one of Piedmontele Foot, under the perial and one of Picdmontele Foot, under the command of Lieutenant General Wallis, aniounting in the whole to about 5000 Men. The Spaniards were above 12000 firong, but the Imperialifts attacked them with 10 much Vigour, that notwithstanding their great Superiority in Number they were Ariven from their Intrenchments, and even beyond their Camp, which the Imperialists set on fire, and nailed their Cannon; but the Enemy being joined by a frelh Reinforcement from Messina of seven Battalkions and two Regiments of Dragoons, the Imperialists were Regiments of Dragoons, the Imperialists were obliged to give way, and retreated to the Town in good Order. This Action lasted four Hours, and cost the Imperialists about 800 Men, killed, wounded or taken Prisoners, among the latter is Lieutenant General Veterani. They have taken of the Spaniards Count Swerin, General of Battalia, and divers other Officers, and about 200 private Men; and several Spanish Deserters are come over to the Town, who report that 1400 of their Men were killed, and many, disabled; and

Genoa, Nob. 1. The Fleet of Transport Ships with the Imperial Troops on board, failed from hence the 26th past, under Convoy of two British and one Imperial Man of War for Mel 220, and were got beyond Monte Christo on the 28th, when they were dispersed by a violent Storm, and nine of those Vessels were driven back to Porto Fino, about 18 Miles to the Eastward of this Place; one is come into our Port, which hath on board about 400 Germans, and another which carried 230 Soldiers, was firanded the 30th in the Night upon the Back of our new Mole, but all the Men were faved. Two Ships are now in Sight, one of which is supposed to be a Man of War, and the other a Transport Ship. We have an Account that the greatest Patt of this Fleet is put into Vada, and the Remainder is supposed to have got into other Ports on the Coasts of this State and of Tuscany.

West-Friseland which adjourned some Time ago, are to meet again the 16th Instant, and will then dispose of several Military Commissions in their Department. His Excellency the Earl Cadogan having made a short Journey to Amsterdam, returned hither last Night. The Marquess de Priscontinues in this Place, to put the last Hand to the Convention for the entire Execution of the Barrier-Treaty, after which he will return to Bruffels. The Dutch Squadron of Men of War, and the Fleet of Merchant Ships which came under their Convoy from the Baltick, are safely arrived in the Texel. Our Advices from the North say the Swedish Troops were retiring out of Norway,
Paris, Nov. 12. The Troops ordered into Quar-

ters towards the Spanish Frontiers, are on their March thither, and a Train of Artillery will shortly be sent that Way. The Duke of Berwick is on his Departure for Guienne. The Marques de Nancré is faid to be shortly expected home from Madrid. The Bishop of Verdun has caused his Appeal from the Pope's Constitution to be published in his Carhedral; a Counsellour at Law who happened to be present, interrupted the Reading rof it, by crying out aloud against it, saying it was contrary to the King's De-claration, of which Complaint has been made to the Regent, who has ordered that he should be reprimanded, and obliged to ask Pardon of the Bishop and Chapter for his unbecoming Behaviour. The Bishops of Narbonne and Albi, who have accepted the Constitution, have written a very respectful Letter to the Cardinal de Noailles, declaring that they would, notwithstanding the Pope's last Brief on that Occasion, continue in Communion with his Eminency and those who adhere to him in Appealing from the said Constitution.

Whitehall, Nov. 7. Letters from Vienna give an Account, that on Occasion of the Seizure of the Princes Sobiesky and her Daughter, by the Emperque's Order, as they were passing through In-spruck in their Way to Italy; several Applica-tions had been made to his Imperial Majesty for their Releafe, which have been very ill received; that Prince James Sobiesky, Father of the young Princess, was come to Vienna to make his Submission to the Emperour, who was highly displeased with him on Account of the intended Match, which was the Occasion of those Princes-ses Journey; and that his Imperial Majesty had declared his Resolution not to receive the said Prince into Favour again till that Match be entirely broken off.
