Legborne, November 11.

Letters from Naples of the 4th Instant advise, that the same Day the Regiment of Cuirassiers of Hanover marched from thence for Trapea, whither the Regiment of Horse of Roma went some Days before; and both were to be imbarked for Melazzo. That the Imperial Regiment of Horse of Anspach was likewise arrived at Naples, and that of Visconti of Horse was expected in a Day or two, being followed by others which were already come to Ancona. These Letters add, that the Regiment of Odweir had been transported to Melazzo, that the Imperialists there had Plenty of Provisions, and that the Spaniards forbore making any Attempt upon them. On the 5th Instant Captain Field in the Rupert, and Captain Haddock in the Dreadnought, British Men of War, with 16 Transports having on board General Wachtendonck and 4000 Men of German Troops, sailed from hence for Melazzo. And here is Advice, that Captain Field has taken, between Porto Longone and Sicily, a large Transport in the Spanish Service, laden with Ammunition. The Leopold, an Imperial Man of War, is on the Coast towards Genoa, to take Care of the Transports and Barks with the rest of the German Troops which were imbarked at Genoa, and dispersed by a Storm.

Genoa, Nov. 15. The Leopold Man of War belonging to the Emperour, and four Transports with Troops, have been detained here by contrary Weather; but design to sail this Night for Melazzo, and to take in their Way Nine Barks with Soldiers which were forced by the late Storm into Porto fino.

Copenhagen, Nov. 19. On the 14th arrived a Mail from Norway, with Advice, that the Swedes in the Province of Drontheim were intrenching themselves, and suffered much by Sicknes and by

Want of Bread and other Provisions. These Letters add, that the Swedish Troops towards the Swynsund and Iddefjord, were in Motion to attack the Danes on that Side, who were prepared to give them a warm Reception. By the Accounts we have from Schonen of the King of Sweden's Motions, he seems resolved to employ all his Forces this Winter against Norway: His Troops from Stockholm and from Schonen were ordered to march to their Rendezvous at Stromstadt. Whereupon all the necessary Measures are taking here, for putting the Frontiers of Norway into the best Posture of Defence possible.

Hambourg, Nov. 22. The last Letters we had from Sweden were dated the 26th past, N. S. which gave an Account that Baron Gorez was on the 19th of October still at Stockholm, and it was uncertain whether he would first go to wait on the King of Sweden, or return to the Congress at Aland. 'Tis advised from Grodno, that the Dyet had written a Letter to the Czar, in which they desire him to withdraw his Troops out of Poland.

Paris, Nov. 25. On the 2d Instant M. de Nancre arriv'd here from Madrid, whence the Duke de St. Aignan is also expected in a few Days. The Duke of Bourbon has agreed with Workmen to pull down the House of Chantilly in Picardy, the antient Seat of the Family of Condé, and to erect a new more spacious Building. The Abbot Bignon has sold to the King a great Number of scarce and valuable Books, which were wanting in his Majesty's Library: The Abbey of Bourgueil, which was possess'd by the late M. de Louvois, who being cut for the Stone lately died of that Operation, is given to the said Abbot Bignon.
