Constantinople, September 10, O. S.

THE Beginning of last Month, Mr. Stanyan, His Britannick Majesty's Ambassador to the Port, left the Grand Vizier's Camp at Sophia, and came to this City. The Dutch Ambassador is arrived from Passarowitz at Adrianople, and is expected here in Two or Three Days. The Grand Signior has been some Time undetermined whether he should winter at Adrianople, or return to this City; but is now resolved to come hither, and 'tis said will set out in about eight or 10 Days. Prince Ragotzki is quartered at a Village on the Black Sea about three Leagues off this Town, and has an Allowance of about 10 l. a Day for him and his Retinue, which consists of near 200 Persons, among whom are several Hungarian Officers. The Port treats him hitherto pretty well; but 'tis reported he is dissatisfied, and has intimated to the Vizier, that he does not design to stay long in this Country. The Waywod of Walachia of the Family of Cordato, who was taken Prisoner by the Germans during the late War, will be re-instated in that Principality, to the great Disappointment of his Brother, who was made Waywod during the other's Confinement, and was in Hopes of being continued in it.

Copenhagen, Nov. 26. The last Advices from Norway tell us, that some Parties of Swedes had penetrated by different Ways into Norway, and advanced towards Christianstad. 'Tis also advised from several Places, that the King of Sweden has ordered all his Forces to march towards Norway; having for this Enterprize drawn off the Troops which lay about Stockholm, to guard that Part of his Country against the Mulcovites. Hereupon all possible Diligence is used for imbarcking and sending to Norway six Battallions more from hence. Mr. Jefferies sets out from hence to Morrow for Hambourg, whence he will proceed with all Expedition to Petersbourg.

Paris, Dec. 3. The Letters from Italy arrived last Night, but have brought no particular News from those Parts; only they write from Genoa the 22d of last Month, that the Winds had continued fair for the Convoy, and that they reckoned it arrived by that Time at Melazzo.

Hague, Dec. 2. The several Instruments relating to the new Convention for the Execution of the Barrier-Treaty, will be ready for Signing on the 6th Instant; against which Time the States General will nominate and authorize some of their Body to sign them, jointly with the Marquess de Prie and the Earl of Cadogan. The States of the Province of Holland assembled to Day. The States General being informed, that Two Swedish Privateers are cruising on our Coast, and that Two of our Merchant-Men have lately been taken by them; have ordered the Chamber of Admiralty of Amsterdam, to send out Two Frigates to cruise and seize all Swedish Privateers and Ships that they shall meet with. 'Tis advised from Francfort, that the Troops of the Circles which had advanced into the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel's Territories, on Occasion of the Dispute about Rhinsfels, have received Orders to return home.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Cavendish of the Dover, at Gibraltar, Oct. 24.

A Bashaw with three English Captive Masters has been sent to Tetuan, with full Powers to treat of Peace. This has been signified to me by Letters from that Bashaw, which after perusal I have sent to Sir George Byng: By those Letters, and by examining the Person who brought them, I have great Reason to believe the Moors are very sincere. I have written to the said Bashaw to acquaint him, that I would forward his Letters to the Admiral, but as I have no Directions to treat with him, having no other Orders than to cruise on the Ships of the Moors with the Squadron under my Command, I have given him Assurance that the Admiral will bring this Affair to a Conclusion as soon as possibly
