THE Count de Provana, Minister of the King of Sardinia, arrived here the 29th Instant from England. M. de Malezieux, Chancellour of Dombes, Steward of the Duke of Maine's Household, has been siezed, as has also his Wife, and are both fent to the Bastile: Their Son the Bishop of Lavaur, and M. Davisart Chief Advocate-General of the Parliament of Thoulouse, are likewise taken into Custody. The Prince of Dombes is ordered to repair to Gien, and the Count d' Eu to Bourges. The King's Declaration of the 4th Inffant, and an Arrêt of the King's Council of State, dated the 27th, have been published, by which the general Bank formerly enablished in this City, is converted into and declared to be the Royal Bank, henceforward to be managed in His Majesty's Name and by his Authority, under the Direction of the Duke of Orleans. These Letters were brought hither by an Express difpatched to France by the Count de la Mark, who was in the Swedish Atmy Mark, who was in the Swedin Army when the King was killed by a Shor that entred his Temple, he being in the Trenches between Nine and Ten at Night.
