Waymouth , May 3.

N the 28th paft arrived here two Veffels of this Port, in feaven weeks from Virginia, laden with the Commodities of that Country; and this day came into Port the Robert and Fohn from the Barbalas, the Mafter fays, that at his coming thence about feaven weeks fince, the ficknefs which hath been of late very violent and mortal in that Island was quite abated, that there did not dye above two a week at the Bridge Town, and that the Country was at prefent, thanks be to God, very free again of any diftemper.

Lyme, May 3. On Munday last airived here the Concord in fix weeks from the Barbados; by which we have the confirmation of the prefent good and healthy condition of that place, being freed of the distemper they for some time had very violently all over the Island.

Madrid, April 15. We are told of a very confiderable fumme of Money lately fent from hence for Barcellonne, to be employed on the Fortifications as well of that as of the other places in Gatalogne, on which they work continually with all the dilfgence imaginable; they write from thence, that 1500 Men which were raifed in those Countries, were on their march to Naples, for the compleating the Spanish Regiments there.

From Cadiz our Letters of the 5th instant advise us, that a certain Italian Renegado, who as he faid, was fled from Taffiletta's Army, and arrived there from Salle, having been brought before the Duke de Veraguas, Governor of that place for the present, and been examined concerning what he knew of the affairs of those parts, had declared, that the faid Taffiletta was at prefent at Salle, with an Army of 100, 000 men, all well armed and disciplined by several German and other Forreign Officers he had in his fervice, with a good train of Artillery, he had caufed to be brought from Santta Cruz, which he fometimes fince took from the Moots, who had adhered to the party of Gayland, that bis intentions were very fuddainly to go and lay Siegeto Mamora, a Spanish Garrison of much importance, he proposing to himself no less then the Conquest of all those Countries, together with several other particulars he very positively affirmed, proffering to yield himself prisoner, till such time as they should receive a certain confirmation of what he related, which some days after they accordingly did in some measure, by a small Vessel sent with Letters from Mamora, to give advice of their pre-Tent fears of some suddain attacque from Taffilerta who they faid was encamped with a very formidable Army near Salle; that thereupon his Excellency had immediately sent them a supply of 400 Men, with large quantities of Powder and all other Provisions, which on the suddain could be furnisht from thence.

Rome, April 18. The 11thⁱinftant the Pope went hath made much to lodge at St. Peters, in order to the celebrating occasion of dif the next day, the Canonifation of the five new Princes are bot Saints, formerly spoken of, which was accor- the paraiculats.

didgly done with very extraordinary Splendor, in the form and manner ufually practifed here, on the like occasions; the Concourse of people was very great, as well of Forreigners as others; the Queen of *Sweden* appeared not by refion as is thought, of her not having the place allowed her', which the formerly had in a like folemnity, in the time of the late Pope *Clement* the IX, at which her Majesty took fome difpleasure; the Duke *de Gravina*, lately married to the Lady Ludovica Altieri took place as a Nephew of the Pope, and as such, did, together with the Forreign Ambalsafers and the other Roman Princes, and perfons of principal note at present residing here, affis at all the Ceremonies; all things being performed without the least dilorder, and concluded with the publick acclamations of the people. In the afternoon the Pope returned again to his Pallace of Montecavallo, the place of his ordinary residence.

The vacant Cardinals Cap is not yet dispoled of to Signior Rospigliosi, and some seem fill to doubt, whether he may at length obtain it; being told that his most Christian Majesty hath ordered the Duke d'Effrees to make all convenient hast bither in quality of his Ambassador (for whose Receptiongreat preparations are here making) to prefs his Holines without any farther delay, to make that promotion in favor of the Bissop of Laon, in which that King is so earness, as to seem to admit of ho refusal.

His Holinels having thought fit to appoint Seignior Ranucci his Nuncio in the Court of Savoye, to go and refide if the fame quality in Poland, hath nominated Signior Duraqqo to fucceed him at Turin. The Cardinal Pallavacino Legat of Bolognes' haveing defired leave to retire from that employment to his own private eftate at Genoua, his Holinels hath accordingly granted it him, and at the fame time made choice of the Cardinal Bonaccorfi for the Government of thole Countries, where we are told, all things at prefent are quiet and composed.

On Sunday laft the Cardinal Altieri haveing treated the Marquis de Saignelay Son to Monfieur Colbert in his own apartment in the Palace, at a very magnificent dinner, conducted him in the afternoon to take his leave of his Holinefs, who haveing very kindly received him, caufed him to be prefented with feveral rich Medals and other curiofities of value, and fo difmift him with marks of much efteem and kindnefs; the 25th inftant he (departed from hence towards Naples, out of curiofity to fee that Kingdom, where haveing paffed fome short time, it is faid, he will return by this place for Loretto and Venice.

place for Loretto and Venice. From Madrid our last Letters tell us, that the Kings Councel there have finally determined the differences, between the Princes Palestrina-Barberino, and Borghese, and the Constable de Colonna, in favor of the two former; which being a thing that hath made much noise here, affords at prefent great occasion of discourse, of which seeing those two Princes are both out of Town, we have not as yet the particulars.

Fiom Adrianople we have advice, that the French Ambassador hath not yet been able to obtain an Audience from the Grand Seignior, upon pretence that some weighty matters that are at present in hand, will not allow to much leafure; but others p etend to say it is, that those Ministers are disiatisfied with the French, for having affisted a Malthefe who had been long prisonen there, to make this elcape.

Venice, May 24: Lie Letters from our General in Dalmatia informing, that he had according to the Orders, received from the Scanter, withdrawn his Forces from Cliffe, Novegrada, and Scardons, that he was going to Cattarp 19, log the fame orders exe-cuted at Rillano, and in all other places which the cuted at Riffano, and in all other places which the Republick now holds on those confines; that the Turks on their part have done the like, in all those places they lately possible themselves of; for that we have great realon to hope, that all things will in a thort time be happily adjutted, to the latisfaction

of both parties.

This week Cavaglier Morofini took his leave of the Senate - in order to his journey for Rome, where he is to refide in quality of their Amhallador. By a Vessel from Smirna we have Letters which tell us., that, they had advice there from Adrianople, that the Grand Seignior had fent politive orders to all his Bassaes and Officers towards Hungary, to deliver up to the Emperor all fuch of the Hungarian Rebels' as were retired within his Dominions; intending to give his Imperial Majefty all imaginable proofs of his fincere intentions, for the maintainance of a good correspondence between phem.

The Turkish Fleet confisting of 50 Galleys we hear are put to lea, on what deligu is not known, though it is generally believed they will not be able to at-

tempt any great matters this year. From the Port we are told, that the Grand Seignior finding all his endeavors ineffectual, for the appealing the jealoufies and dilorders at Confantinopie, hath thoughts to make h's refidence for the future at Air 2 ople, and o clare that his Metropolis, fo which end he wil build his Seraglio and establish his Diuan and Treasury there, and draw thither all the perfons of quality who depend upon him; thinking by that means to bring that great City, to a condition of not being able Jong to refift his Authority.

Cologne, May 8. We know not as yet what to think of the prefent polture of our affairs, or what to expect in fo doubtful a time, every day brings us fome allarmes of the approach of oun enemies, though we fcarce know from whence; and yet at the fame time from other hands we are affured, that all things will at length be amicably com posed, by the interposition of the Emperor and other Forreign States, who seen not a little to concern themselves in our present differences; several, conferences have been lately held with the Deputies of our Elector, in the presence of the Marquis de Granz, and the Envoy of the Elector of Menzy, nominated for one of the Arbiters, though without any fuccefs, or the least hopes of reconciling things, those Deputies persisting in their demands to have several of the Inhabitants delivered up to them, and other points mentioned in our last;

which we think here too unreasonable to be agreed to.

We are told that some of the Bishop of Munjters Froops were on their march this way, but that the Boors and Inhabitants of the Countreys they intend-ded to pais, taking the Allarme, had gathered together in great multitudes, and fallen upon them with fuch violence, as they were going to pais a certain River, that feveral of the Bishops men remained dead upon the place, and the reft forced to retreat.

Hague, May 12. On Thursday last arived here the Duke of Saxen Lawenburgh, together with his Dutchels and other perfons of quality, intending to país fome part of the Summer in these Countries. Several perfons of note went yesterday from hence for Dunkerke, out of curiofity to lee the French Court and Camp there; we are told that his molt Christi-an Majesty will in few days remove from thence, intending to be very fuddainly back again at Park : Here is a difcourse as if the young Prince Elector Palatine were come to Town incognito, with intention after some short stay here to pass into Danemark, and those other Northein parts. From Wefsphalia they write, that the Deputies of Lunenhurgh and of Munster, were to meet the 11 in-fant at Bylevels: That there hath lately happened a great Fire at Munster, which had burnt down five Cloyfters, and near 300 Houfes, besides other great dammage done by it : They fatther add, of ap-other Fire at Oldenburgh in Westphalie which had confumed above 60 Houles, and done much mifchief to that place: That the Bifhop of *Munfler* had had fresh addresses made to him by the States of his Country, for the disbanding of his Troops; but that he had returned them for Answer, that he should yet have officiation for them. That there was a defen-five League lately concluded between the Elector of Brandenburgh, Duke of Newburgh, and Bithop of Munster, by which they were obliged to affift each other in cale of an attacque; which they name the Triple Alliance. From Bruffels they tell us, that his Excellency the Count de Monterey was at Bruges, and had drawn thither from other parts of the Country, a confiderable Body of Horfe and Foot; that his Excellency had large fums of Money lately re-

mis Excellency had large hims of Money lately re-mitted him from Spain, from whence they likewile expect a farther fupply of Spanish Infantry. Parts, May 17.
