Berne, February 15. N the 9th Inftant the Committee appointed for examining the Grievances of the Deputies of Neufchatel, and the Right that State pretends to have by. Vir-tue of their Treaty of Comburghership with this Canton, to a free Commerce ; made their Report to the Sovereign Council of Two Hundred; which being taken into Confideration, and the Question being put, Whether the faid Treaty gave to those of Neufchatel fuch a Privilege or not? It was carried in the Negative. Notwithftanding which, the faid Council has fince been feveral Times affembled upon this Affair, and 'tis faid they will take off the Prohibition of the Sale of the Wines of Neuschatel upon certain Restrictions, and on Condition that those of Neufchatel look upon this Permission of felling their Wine in this Canton not as a Right, but as a Favour only. Yefterday being the Day fix'd for Summoning. for the third Time M. de Watteville (who killed lately M. Muller in a Rencounter) a solemn Court of Justice was held here, and M, de Watteville being call'd by an Officer of the State to answer to an Acculation of Murder laid to his Charge, and he not appearing, Sentence was pals'd upon him of Banishment for Life. A fad Accident happen'd lately in the Country of Valais: A vaft Heap of Snow having in A Thaw fallen fuddenly from a Mountain upon a Village which lay just below it, famous for its hot Baths, about 20 Houses of Peasants were buried under it, and 60 or 70 Perfons Perished. They write from Milan the 6th Instant, that the News of Count Colloreda's being nam'd Governour of that Dutchy by the Emperour, had been received there with general Satisfaction, and that he was expected there in a few Days.

Hambourg, Feb. 17. Letters from Dantzick give us an Account, that the Mufcovites had entirely decamped and marched out of the Territories of that City, taking their Way towards Petersburg. Prince Repnin, their General, gave a Treat to most of the Magistrates of that Place on the 7th, and the next Day followed his Troops.

Petersburg, Jan. 19. O.S. M. Jefferies the British Relident arrived here on New Year's Day; on the 3d he went to the Great Chancellour Golofkyn and the Vice-Chancellour Shaffiroff, who undertook to procure him an Audience on the Day following ; accordingly the 4th Inftant about Seven in the Morning, a Secretary came to his Lodgings and carried him to the Chancery, where having waited a fhort Time, the Great Chancellour came and conducted him to the Czar's Apartment, to whom he made a Speech in the German Language, . importing, that the King of Great Britain had ordered him to attend him, and to make him the most friendly Compliments on his Part; and to acquaint him how entirely fatisfied his Majofty was with the Reprefentations which M. Weffeldwsky, his Refident at the Court of Great Britain, had from time to time made in his Name That nothing could be more agreeable to the King his Master, than the Af-furances his Czarish Majesty had given him by his Minister, that he would explain himfelf in fuch manner as should demonstrate his fincere Intentions to maintain a perfect Friendship and entire good Understanding with him + That thereupon his Britannick Majesty had resolved to fend to him Sir John Nor-tis with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary, but that he had bean detained to long on his Journey by unforefeen Accidents, that Sir John Norris was gone from the Sound fome Days before his Arrival

Arrival at Cohenhagen; That his Majefty being informed of this Dilappointment, and being unwilling to let flip any Opportunity of answering the Advances made by his Czarilh Majefty, had ordered him to continue his Journey, and to open the Inftructions defigned for Sir John Norris; purluant to which Inflructions he was not only to return his Czarish Majesty Thanks for the obliging Declarations he had been pleased to make by his Refident, but to affure him of the perfect Efteem his Majefty had for his Perfon, and that his Majefty had nothing more at Heart, than to establish an entire Confidence with him, and to enter into Engagements of the most fincere and lafting Friendship with him. Tho Czar answered in the Ruffian Language, that he returned his Majefty Thanks for the Assurances he had given of his Friendship, and that he would make it his Bufiness to cultivate the same to the utmost of his Power, His Czarish Man jefty began with this New Year to give fresh Instances of his great Attention to Affairs of the State, by erecting divers new Councils, the Establishment of which has been long endeavoured, and 'tis hoped will now be fully settled. On New-Years-Day the Council of War met for the first Time, on which Occasion his Czarish Majesty made a Speech to the Members that compole it, and afterwards gave an Entertainment to the Nobi-lity Gengy, and foreign Ministers refiding here. The Councils of State, of Finances, of Commerce, and the new Secretany's Office, will likewife foon be established; but these of Juffice, of the Chançery, of the Mines and Manufa, Aures, will hardly be perfected till to. wards, they End of this Yean By this Establishment of for many Councils, the ancient Senate, and all their old way of Proceeding; which had been the Source of many Inconveniencies tombhe Stare, are entirely abolified.
