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Berne, March 15.

ON the 3d Instant the Sovereign Council of Two Hundred was assembled, to receive the Report made by the Committee appointed for Examining the Grievances of the City of Neufchatel, concerning the Prohibition of their Wines in this Canton. A Draught of an Answer to be made by this State to the King of Prussia's Letters, which were brought hither by the Deputies of Neufchatel, was read at the same Time and approved of. It tends to justify their Conduct in relation to the Proceedings with those of Neufchatel, and sets forth the Reasons this State has for not agreeing to what his Prussian Majesty demanded of them. concerning the Commerce of the Wines of Neufchatel. The Abbot of St. Gall having complained to the Two Cantons of Zurich and Berne of the Disobedience of some of his Subjects of Tockenburg, and the latter having likewise accused to the said Cantons their Prince of an Infraction of the late Treaty of Baden; this Canton has appointed a Committee to examine the Complaints of both Parties, and to make a Report to the Sovereign Council; whereupon it is hoped some Means will be found, in concert with the Canton of Zurich, to accommodate this Matter. This new Dispute is looked upon here to proceed only from the Stubbornness of some Inhabitants of Tockenburg, who not being contented with the late Treaty of Pacification, try to unravel all again, and lay hold of every little Accident to obtain their Ends. This State has been taken up lately with making several new Regulations for preventing the carrying of Money out of the Country. For this End some Members of the Sovereign Council have proposed to forbid the Importation of several foreign Commodities, as Tea, Coffee, &c. and to encourage all Sorts of Manufactures in this Canton. The whole has since been referred to a Committee, which is to make their Report in a few Days. It is advised from several Parts of France, that divers Regiments of Berne, and other Swiss Troops in the Service of that Crown, were broke up from their Quarters to march to the Frontiers of Spain. They write from Milan of the 7th Instant, that M. Colloredo the new Governour of that Duchy, was arrived in that Capital, and had been saluted with a general Discharge of the Artillery: The Deputies of the several Councils went as far as Vaprio to meet him.

Hague, March 23. Count Morville, Ambassador of the most Christian King to the States General, made his Publick Entry this Day. His Excellency went from hence this Morning to Delft, where he was received on the Part of the States by M. Hefless de Dinter, Steward and Master of the Ceremonies to their High Mightinesses, and complimented by the Magi-

strates of the Town, who entertained him at Dinner; after which he came in a Yacht belonging to the States, to the Bridge called Hornbrug, where the two Deputies of the States, M. Velters and M. Peffers, were ready to receive him at his Landing in the first Coach of State, the Ambassadour placing himself in the back part of the Coach, and the two Deputies sitting backwards over-against him. From thence they proceeded in the following Order: First their High Mightinesses Steward and Master of the Ceremonies, in a Coach drawn by Four Horses: Then his Excellency and the Two Deputies, in a Coach drawn by Six Horses, the States Messengers walking on both Sides: Next the Ambassadour's Gentleman of the Horse on Horseback, followed by Four Pages clothed in Velvet laced with Silver, likewise on Horseback: Then Two Swiss and Sixteen Footmen walking along before his Excellency's first Coach, which was universally admired for the exquisite Contrivance of its Painting and Carving, being empty, and drawn by Eight black Horses with rich Furniture; followed by his 2d and 3d Coaches, in which sat the Ambassadour's Gentlemen, the one being drawn by six grey Horses, and the other by as many pie-ball'd Horses richly harnessed. A long Train of near 100 Coaches belonging to the principal Members and Officers of the State closed the Procession. Having passed in this Order through the principal Streets of this Place, the Ambassadour alighted at the House called Prince Maurice's, into which he was conducted by the two Deputies, who went from thence to notify to the States General his Excellency's Arrival. Their High Mightinesses deputed eight of their Members to compliment the Ambassadour on their Part; Baron de Welderen from the Province of Geldern, M. Valkenier and Nieuwburg from Holland, M. de Spanbroek from Zealand, M. Peffers from Utrecht, M. Vegelin de Claerbergen from Friseland, M. Eekhold from Over Yssel, and M. Tamminga from Groningen. His Excellency was splendidly entertained that Evening by the said Deputies, and is to remain in the same House to be entertained and attended there on the Part of the States, and at their Expence for three Days; after which he is to be conducted with the same Ceremony to his publick Audience of their High Mightinesses. Orders have been sent to the several Admiralties of this Republick, pursuant to the Memorials presented to the States by the Ministers of Great Britain and France, to renew and enforce their Prohibitions against carrying Contraband Goods to Spain. M. Gansinot, Minister of the Elector of Bavaria, received this Morning an Ekpress with the News, that Prince Philip Maurice, who on the 14th Instant was chose Bishop of Paderborn, was on the 21st likewise elected Bishop of Munster, which he immediately notified to the States General.

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
