Port Mabon, March 23. N. S.

SIR George Byng proposes to leave this Place the end of this Month, and to sail with some of the Men of War for Naples, leaving Orders for the rest to follow him as they get ready. To Day Sir George Byng dispatched the Dragon and Superbe to Captain Cavendish, with Copies of his full Powers and Instructions from his Majesty, and with Orders and Power from himself to treat and settle a Peace with the Moors. Captain Matthews of the Kent, who commands his Majesty's Squadron at Pentemelia near Reggio, has written a Letter to Sir George Byng, dated the 2d of February, advising, that on the 29th of January the Royal Oak and Rochester returned from cruising, bringing with them a Spanish Man of War of 22 Guns and 180 Men called the Little St. John, which the Royal Oak took on the 26th; she left Messina the Night before with Cammock, whom she was carrying to Malta, whence he was to proceed to Barcelona, but he escaped by taking in time to his Boat, and making to Catania; he left behind him the Pretender's Commission constituting him Admiral of the White, together with other Papers.

Cibraltar, Feb. 28, O. S. Colonel Cotton having Intelligence some Days ago, that at Estepona the Spaniards had Boats laden with Arms, which were designed to be put on Board their Ships at Cadiz for the Expedition; he immediately sent out a Row-Boat armed, to lye in their Way and intercept them. This occasioned their disembarking near 10000 Firelocks at that Place, and obliged them to carry them by Land to Tariffa; where they still remain. In the mean while their Fleet is sailed from Cadiz.

Hague, April 11. Part of the Ships for transporting the five Battallions designed for England, sailed on the 9th Instant from Rotterdam for Williamstadt, as did the others Yesterday, and Colonel Huske will follow to Day from Rotterdam, to muster the Troops and receive them on board. The two Battallions from Zutphen are expected at Williamstadt To-morrow Night; that from Venlo will be there on the 13th, and the two others which came from Tour-nay and Ipres, and are to embark To-morrow at Sas van Ghent, may be there at the same time if the Wind be fair; so that all the Transports will probably be ready to sail for England on the 14th or 15th Instant at furthest. But if those from Sas van Ghent should be kept back by contrary Winds, Brigadier Welderen will immediately sail for England with the other Battallions which shall be arrived.

From on board the Prince Frederick off the Land's End, March 30. Last Night Captain Hildesley Commander of His Majesty's Ship Flamborough, spoke with Thomas Rose Master of the Jenny Galley of and for London from Leghorne, who reported, that being off Cape Finisterre about 70 Leagues to the Westward on the 19th of this Month, in a strong Gale of Wind Easterly, he saw a Ship of about 50 Guns with only her Mizzen-Mast standing, and in the Shrouds a Red Flag, which he supposing to be a Red English Ensign, bore down till he was within Gunshot of her, and then seeing a Spanish Pendant at her Ensign-Staff, he sprung his Luff and left her; at the same time seeing a small Ship astern of her, two others on her Lee-Bow, and another on her Lee-Quarter, all which in a short time after he saw join the disabled Ship.

From on Board the Dorsetshire off the Land's End, March 30. This Evening the Earl of Berkeley joined Sir John Norris, and his Lordship has now under his Command the following Men of War, Dorsetshire, Prince Frederick, Monmouth, Hampton-Court, Windsor, Medway, Salisbury, Winchester, Launceston, Kinfales, Rye, Gibraltar, and Hind. His Lordship has detached the Weymouth and Dursley-Galley, to get Intelligence of the Enemy.

Holyhead, March 30. His Grace the Duke of Bolton, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, arrived at this Place To-Day about Noon, and intends to imbarck To-Mor-row Morning for Dublin.
