A P R O C L A M A T I O N,
 For Taking off the Prohibition of Commerce
 with Sweden.

G E O R G E R.

WHereas in pursuance of an Act of Parliament made in the Third Year of our Reign, [Intituled, An Act to enable His Majesty effectually to prohibit or restrain Commerce with Sweden] we did think fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy-Council, to issue our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the second Day of March, one thousand seven hundred and sixteen, in the third Year of our Reign; and did thereby, under the Penalties in the said Act, strictly prohibit and forbid all and every Person and Persons, Natives and Foreigners, Bodies Politick and Corporate whatsoever, before the End of the next Sessions of Parliament, which should be after the twentieth Day of March, one thousand seven hundred and seventeen, to ship, export, carry or send, or cause or procure to be shipped, exported, carried, or sent, directly or indirectly, from or out of the Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, or any the Dominions thereunto belonging, unto or for the Kingdom of Sweden, or any the Dominions or Countries under the Power of the King of Sweden, any Goods, Wares, Commodities, or Merchandizes whatsoever; or to import or bring, or cause or procure to be imported or brought, directly or indirectly, by way of Merchandize, into Great Britain, Ireland, or any the Dominions thereunto belonging, any Goods, Wares, or Commodities whatsoever, of the Growth, Product, or Manufacture of Sweden, or any of the Dominions under the Power of the King of Sweden, mixt or unmixt with the Goods of any other Country, other than such of the said Goods, Wares, or Commodities, which then were, or at any Time or Times, on or before the fifteenth Day of April, one thousand seven hundred and seventeen, should be laden or put on board any Ship or Vessel in Sweden, or other Foreign Parts, to be brought into Great Britain, Ireland, or any the Dominions thereunto belonging; unless we should think fit, before the End of the next Session of Parliament which should be after the said twentieth Day of March, one thousand seven hundred and seventeen, by our Royal Proclamation, to open the Commerce between our Subjects and those of Sweden, or to alter the Prohibitions therein contained: Now we judging it may be convenient to open the Commerce between our Subjects and those of Sweden, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy-Council, to issue this our Royal Proclamation; and we do hereby declare, That it shall and may be lawful for all and every Person and Persons, Natives and Foreigners, Bodies Politick and Corporate whatsoever, from henceforth to ship, export, carry, or send, or cause or procure to be shipped, exported, carried, or sent, from or out of the Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, or any the Dominions thereunto belonging, unto or for the Kingdom of Sweden, or any the Dominions or Countries under the Power of the Queen of Sweden, any Goods, Wares, Commodities, or Merchandizes whatsoever; or to import or bring, or cause or procure to be imported or brought, by

way of Merchandize, into Great Britain, Ireland, or any the Dominions thereunto belonging, any Goods, Wares, or Commodities whatsoever, of the Growth, Product, or Manufacture of Sweden, or any of the Dominions under the Power of the Queen of Sweden, mixt or unmixt with the Goods of any other Country, at any Time or Times before the end of this present Sessions of Parliament, any thing in our said recited Proclamation contained to the contrary thereof notwithstanding; unless we shall think fit within the Time aforesaid to alter this our Royal Proclamation.

Berne, March 5. The Protestant Cantons have written lately to the King of Great Britain, to desire His Majesty's good Offices with the King of Sardinia in behalf of some of his Subjects of the Valleys, which have lately been molested in the Exercise of their Religion by the Roman Catholics. This State has named two Deputies to repair to Araw the 20th Instant, and to adjust with those of Zurich, who are likewise expected there that Day, all Accompts relating to the late Swiss War. It is thought this Matter will be very much disputed, and that the Conferences will last some time. The Baron de la Tour, first Minister of the Abbot of St. Gall, died lately at Lindaw in the 95th Year of his Age. It is said he has left behind him to the Value of 90000 Florins.

Copenhagen, April 8. Rear Admiral Tordenchiold sailed from hence on the 5th Instant in the Evening with four Men of War of the Line and three Frigates, and four more Ships of the Line are soon to follow. It is reckoned he is now before Gottemburg, which Place he is to block up.

Petersburg, March 13. On the 3d Instant the Czar returned hither in good Health from Olonitz. The Queen of Sweden has notified by a Letter to this Court the Death of the late King her Brother, and her own Accession to the Crown. Count Gyllenbourg has likewise acquainted General Bruce by or-

der of the Queen, that she is willing to continue the Congress at Aland. Upon the said Notification the Czar and all his Court went into Mourning on Sunday last for the Death of the King of Sweden; and the foreign Ministers put themselves in Mourning likewise, to have the easier Access to his Czarish Majesty. M. Osterman, one of the Czar's Plenipotentiaries for negotiating Peace with Sweden, is ordered to get ready to return to Aland: His Baggage is already sent away, and his Instructions are drawing up. In the mean time the Preparations of War by Sea and Land are carrying on with all Diligence.

Naples, March 31, N. S. We have Advice from Melazzo, that the Spaniards who have lain so long before that Place, were drawing off their Artillery and heavy Baggage, and sending them to Messina; so that it was not doubted their Troops would speedily retire thither. The Imperial Regiments of Wirtemberg, Holstein, and Hesse Cassel are arrived here, and three others are expected in a few Days. In the mean while a Number of Transports are getting ready for their Imbarkation, and Sir George Byng with his Squadron is expected back from Port Mahon, to concert proper Measures for the further Operations. The Spaniards are putting Messina into a Posture of Defence.

Paris, April 15. We have no certain Account yet, what is become of the Spanish Fleet since it failed from Cadiz. But by the last Letters which came from the best Hands in Spain, it appears that at Madrid they now look upon the Enterprize against Great Britain to have miscarried.

Hague, April 14. On the 12th Instant the Secretary of Sweden here notified to the States by Order from his Court, that the Queen his Mistress had sent Orders to the Officers at the several Ports of that Kingdom, to forbear for the future giving any Molestation to the Ships belonging to their High Mightinesses Subjects, or to any Neutral Shipping, unless they should be laden with Contraband Goods. The States of Friseland have made pressing Instances to the States General to be discharged from Part of the Taxes laid on that Province, in Consideration of the Loss the Inhabitants have suffered by the late Inundations and the Mortality among their Cattle. This Morning the Count de la Mark, Ambassadour of France, arrived here in his Return from Sweden, and designs to proceed in a few Days on his Journey to Paris.

From on board the Dorsetshire off Penzance, April 4. The Earl of Berkeley with the

Men of War under his Command having been off Cape Cleet in Ireland, returned to Day to this Coast.
