## From Saturday May 16. to Tuelday May 19. 1719.

Paris, May 24. Etters from Bourdeaux advise, that the Marquess de Cilly was to open the Trenches before Fon-tarabia in the Night between the 20th and 21ft Instant. By the Accounts he had of the Dispositions made for its Defence, he reckoned to be Mafter of It in a few Days; the Situation of the Place being fuch, that it may be battered in Breach from the first Battery. The Spaniards were drawing together near Vittoria, but they have few Troops on that Side, their main Force being in Catalonia. Advices from Spain fay his Catholick Majefty arrived at Valencia on the 5th Inflant, and was fet out again from thence for Sa-ragoffa: It was given out, that he would go from thence either to Barcelona or Pampelona, according to the Motions of the French Army. M. Sarsfield, called Lord Lucap, who had lately been in Ireland, died at St. Omers on the 12th Inflant. The French died at St. Omers on the 12th Instant. East-India Company here is joined to that of the West-Indies, with the Augmentation of a Fund of Twenty Five Millions; and their Stock is now rifen to 125 per Cent. On the 21st Collonel Stanhope, His Britannick Majefly's Envoy, arrived here. Yafterday he was admired for the Borent and here : Yesterday he was admitted to the Regent, and is to have Audience again of his Royal Highness on the 26th. On the 22d the Parliament of Paris made an Arrêt, condemning a Piece intitled, A Declara-tion of bis Catholick Majefty, on Occafion of the Refo-lution he has taken to put himfelf at the Head of his Troops, for fupporting the Interests of his most Christian Majesty and of the French Nation, dated the Z7th of A-pril, 1719. The Preamble to this Arrêt fets forth, That it cannot be doubted this Piece (which has been printed and differfed privately) came from the fame Author who composed those which were condemned by the Parliament in January and February last. That the same Spirit of Rebellion breaths in it; that the fame Invectives against the Person of the Duke of Orleans are scattered through it; that the Author carries his Audaciousness fo far as to dispute his Royal Highness's Authority; stiling him the pretended Regent; as if the Regency to which he was called by the Rights of Blood, and by the Wifhes of the People, had not been folemnly vefted in him by one of the moft august Assemblies that ever was held in the Court of Parliament; that without further Grounds the Author confers on the King of Spain the Quality of Regent of the Kingdom; that in his Name he commands the French Troops to repair to the Spanish Camp, and for the Reward of their Defertion, promites them not only the Favours of that Prince, but likewife the Acknowledgements of their King when he fhall attain a more advanced Age; that in vain does he pretend to intereft in this Confpiracy the Parlia-ments, which will never deviate from the Fidelity they owe to the King, but will ever most firenu-oully oppose the feditious Enterprizes of those who would take Advantage of a Time of Minority, to excite Troubles and kindle the Fire of Diffention in the Kingdom. Wherefore they order the faid Paper the Kingdom. Wherefore they order the faid Paper to be fupprefied as feditious, tending to flir up Re-bellion, and impugning the Royal Authority; enjoin all those who have Copies of it, to bring them with-in eight Days from the Date of the Arrêt to the Re-gistry of the Court, there to be fupprefied; forbid-ding all Persons to print, fell, utter, or otherwise disperse the fame, in any Manner whatever, on pain of being prosecuted as Disfurbers of the pub-lick Peace; and guilty of High-Treason. His Majefty having, upon the Application of the Merchants trading to Portugal, directed an additional Number of Pacquet-Boats to be added to those employed on the Lisbon Station, to carry on that Correspondence weekly during the War with Spain : The Post-Master-General of Great Britain gives Notice, that two Pacquet Boats are accordingly added to that Station, as was during the last War; and that Letters will be taken in at this Office every Tuesday for any Part of Portugal, commencing from Tuesday the 12th Instant inclusive, from which time Pacquet Boats will fail weekly between Falmouth and Lisbon, Wind and Weather permitting.
