Tlergt's our Brafile Fleet confilting of thirs ty odd fayl, together with the two East India ships, are set out from hence in pursuance of their several voyages. Of

all those which by the general report were condemned to be baniflied, only the Marquis de Milquitela fuffered in that particular, and was accordingly shipt on board one of the faid Eaf India thips, to remain exiled for ever in those parts; amongst other great Crimes committed by the faid Marquis, it is found that it was he that some time fince killed the Marquis de Sande as he çame from the Palace, though by mistake; thinking him to have been Don Francisco de Luna (in whole Litter he happened then to be) for whom he lay in wait, upon a private quarrel, to affault him as be palled.

Yesterday the Marquis de Marialva returned hither from the Trontiers, where he had been by order of the Prince Regent to vifit the Fortifications, and to fee in what condition those parts at present are, sipon the advice we lately received here, that the Spaniards were reinforcing all their Garrifons that border on this Kingdome

The Popes Nuncio is not yet arrived, but is dayly expected, all men in the mean time wondring very much what may retard him ; But in the intesim we receive the Popes Bulls for the confirmation of our new Bilhops, the Poft yesterday brought us those for the Archbilhop of Euora, Diego de Soufa; for the Bilhop of Lamego, Don Luis de Sousa; the Bishop of Vijeu, Manoel de Saldonka; and for the Bishop of Finchal, in the Island of Maderas, Gabriel de Almeida,

The Dutch Veffel which was forme time fince fequestred here, for going to Brazile without glving caution first, accordingly to what is here practiced, hath upon a farther examination of that matter been releafed again.

Hambrough, May 19. By feveral Travellers paf-fing this place from Warfaw and other parts in Poland, we are told, of the troubles which in all probability are like to be in the Ukrain this Summer ; the Coffacks increasing dayly in strength, under the command of Doroshensko, a profeit enemy to that Kingdom, and backed by the Turks and Tarters, especially the former, who promise them, as is faid, large succors, the better to enable them for the carrying on their defigns against the Poles, who now begin to look about them, and to make all possible provision for their defence and fecurity, in cale of an attacque.

From Viennz of the 14th instant our Letters in-form us, that the Prince d' Aversbergh, had by the Emperors order been taken into cuftody, as was thought, upon Tome difcovery made by the Count | farther order. From Germany they tell us, that Nadafi, of his having been privy to leveral mat-ters relating to the Rebellion in Hungary; that

enjoy that imall Effate he had left behind him, as well for their own fublistance as the paying of his debts, and some inconfiderable Legacies he had made to his particul: r Friends and Relations; who in the mean time have obtained leave for the conveying his Body into Hungary, to be there buried amongit his Ancestors.

The 10th inftant Nagiferenez, and Bignedi were brought to their Tryal, and there condemned to luffer death as Rebels against his Imperial Majestien Government; they continue still priloners, the day not being yet appointed for their execution; in the interim, great applications are made by their friends to obtain their pardon, not without fome hopes of fuccels.

The Emperor hath taken away from the Chil-dren of the Count Serini, all the Eftate their Father had in Hungary, intending them the fame proportion of Lands and to the fame value, in lieu thereof in his Hereditary Countries, to the end they may not be able, when come to age, to endeavor any disturbances in those Countries, through the sence they may have of their Fathers death.

Some days fince arrived here Signior Altri, in quality of Nuncio from the Pope, where having refresht himself after his journey for some days, he is gone for Laxemburgh, where their Imperial Ma-jestics continue fill with the whole Court. The Turkish Chiaus lately arrived here from the Baffa of Bude, with allurances from the Port of a perfect friendship, is departed again on his way home, extremely satisfied with his entertainment here, and especially with the rich presents he received at his departure by the Emperors order.

From Prefburgh they write, that things begin to have a better face then tormerly, the Gentry feen-ing very ready to confent to whatever the Emperor shall defire of them, and have now unanimoully agreed to maintain the Imperiall Troops to be quartered in thole Countries; and feveral other matters much conducing to the publick peace and fecurity. From the Port we have of late received but little

news, out last Letters speak, as if the Grand Signior had fome defign upon Poland this Summer, but we hope otherwife.

Paris, May 23. During the absence of the Court here passes little of news. From Thealon we have advice, that there was lately gone from thence 14. French men of War, together with Nine Galleys, as was faid for Tunks, to endeavor if possible, by fome confiderable attempt, to bring those people to more reasonable terms, then hitherto they have admitted of an accommodation.

From Lorrain they write, as if the Mareshal de Crequi had received directions, to caule the Troops at prelent quartered in those Countries, to march towards the River Sarre, and to encamp there till the Emperor hath nominated the Electors of Majters relating to the Rebellion in Hungury; that ence, of Treves, and of Saxony, joyntly to take the faid Count Nadafti had before his death written into their possession by way of sequestration, the to the Emperor, befeeching him to compassion places of Hombourg and Biche, possess by the Duke matter his innecent Children, and to suffer them to of Lorrain, who is immediately to withdraw his Garrildut

From Durlithe we hear, that they continue to had made, and in the Agreement concluded work on the Fortifications with all the diligence imaginable; that the Cittadel. was quite finished, and the teft of the works very well advanced: They farther write; that their Majesties would remove that this Charge should not be disposed of from thence the 25th instant to Tournay, and from thence to Aeth.

Madrid, May 8. The Marquis de Grotola, is lately arrived here from Naples, and hath fince had Audience of her Majefty, concerning matters of much impostance relating to that Kingdom. Her Majefty hath been pleased to nominate Don Pedro Zavales Governor of Oftend, to succeed the Marquis of Montroy in the Government of Cambray.

Don Manoel de Lyra, appointed Envoy extraordinary to the States General of the United Provinces, is gone from hence in order to his entring upon that employment.

They write from Malaga of the 5th instant, that the day before the Adventure and Milford Frigats arrived there with feveral Merchant men under their Gonvoy; and that the fame day put in there the Greenwich and Affurance Frigats from the U.S. With about 30 Merchant ships homewards bound.

From Sevill we have advice, that the fecond inflant cameto Gadiz a Fleet of English Merchant men in 15 days from the Downes, under the Convoy of three men of War, who passed forward with search fayl for the Levant.

Bilevelt May 15. The 9th inftant came hither the Deputies from the States General, to affift on their part, at the Treaty to be concluded, between the Princes of Lunenburgh and the Bishop of Munster, where they found most of the Lunenburgh Deputies, as likewife those from Brandenburgh and Newburgh, but the Deputies from the Bishop of Munster are not yet arrived; which delays of that Prelate are very much wondred at, and give occasion to think, that that Treaty will fcarce be finished, within the time limited by the Preliminaries; in the interim the Bishop hath upon the Duke of Wolfembutell's withdrawing his Troops out of Hoxter, put in a Garrifon of 70 men, according to what was agreed on in that particular.

The Lunenburgh Forces continue in their respective Garrisons ready to march upon any occasion, those Princes having resolved not to part with any of wheir Troops, till more of the Summer be past.

Haerlem, May 26. From the Hague our Letters tell us, that on the 16th inftant the Deputies of the Province of Gelderland, made a report to the States General, that their Principals had in their laft Affembly agreed to the augmenting the yearly Penfions of the two Field Marshals, from 12 to 20 thousand Gilders by the year, on condition his Highness the Prince of Orange might have one settled on him of 50 Thousand Gilders by the year, to be paid out of the ordinary Fonds for the War, as all other things of that nature are.

Upon which the Deputies of the other Provinces desired a Copy of their resolution, and that it might according to custom be Registred; but those of Holland, having some days after observed that the States of Gelderland gave in it the Title of Defigned Captain General to his Highness, did teprefent to those of Gelderland, that the States of their Province had by declaring in those terms, made

themfelves incapable of having any Vote, when it fhould be taken into confideration, whether they fhould make a Captain General or not, becaufe they had difpofed in their particulars of this charge, without the participation of the reft of the Allies, that they had failed in the express promife they had made, and in the Agreement concluded between them in the year 1668. That there should be no thoughts of making a Captain General, till his Highnels fhould have compleated his 22 year; and that this Charge fhould not be difpofed of, but by the unanimous confent of all the Provinces.

That in cafe they withdrew not their Refolution out of the Register, that the Province of Holland would be obliged to enter a folemn Protell, and to take a Refolution quite contrary to that which the Province of Gelderland had made in this matter. Whereupon having confulted amongst themfelves, what was best to be done in it, they refolved to withdraw their Declaration again, notwithstanding that those of Zealand had already transmitted a Copy thereof to their Principals, and those of Friefland offered to follow their example, and to declare themfelves in the fame terms.

Our Fleet is not yet put to lea; the Amfler...am Squadron rides at prefent at the Texcl, and isrea-dy to fayl, expetting only one man of War which happened to come `agiound before Enchujen, and must expect a Spring tide to bring her off again. The ships set out by the Admiralty of Rotter dam are at the Brielle and Helvoer Sluys, and only want about one hundred an fifty Seamen to compleat their numbers; those of Zesland and Frief-land are also ready, but the Admiralty of North-Holland, hath, as is faid, written to the States General, giving them an accompt, that they must expect fome farther fupplies of Money, before their ships can put to sea : in the mean time here is a difcourse, that the States will in a little time, tay up feveral of those men of War again , not thinking it necessary to keep to great a Fleet abroad this Summer.

From Spain we hear, that Monsieur Beverning Ambaisador from this State in that Court, having performed what he had in Commission to negostate there, intends to depart from thence about the Seginning of June, and to return home by the way of Lyons, Swifferland, and Germany.

The Baron d' I fola who lately went for Cologne, is lately returned again from thence, telling us of the great likelihood there seems to be, that through the mediation of several Princes, who appear very earnest in their encleavors for the composing of those differences, all things may at length be peaceably accommodated. His Highness the Prince of Orange is gone to pass fome part of the Summer at his house at Honflerdike, but so, as to be frequently here at the Assembles of the Council of State.

Paris, May 26. From Marscelles of the 19th inflant, they tell us, That Monseur de Vivonne was put to Sea with nine Galleys for the Coast of Bazbary, and that as many more are making ready to fucceed upon the return of those, which it is believed are not to stay abroad much above two moneths.

From Dunkirke we have advice, That the Kang was to remove from thence the 25th inftant.

Whitehal, May 20. His Majelly hath been pleafed upon the death of Sir John Kceling, Lord Chief Juftice of the Court of Kings Bench, to confet thaplace upon the Lord Chief Baron Hales, who afren having taken the usual Oaths before the Right Honourable the Lord Keeper, on Thuriday last tooking Seat accordingly on that Bench.
