Copenhagen, June 3. Reparations are making here for attacking Gottenbourg and Maestrand. Befides three old Ships of War, which are cut down low enough to ferve for a kind of Bat teries, they are building a large Float of great Timber of 160 Foot long, and 18 Foot broad ; and 30 Battering Pieces of Cannon and 20 Mortars are imbarking : All will be ready to fail under the Command of Admiral Judicher, towards the End of this Month. Major Ge. neral Arnholdt is gone from hence to bring 16 Batallions from Norway; which 'tis thought are to be employed in the Expedition a-gainst Gottenbourg. The Swedes on their gainst Gorrenbourg. The Swedes on their Side, are drawing Troops together about that Place, to be commanded by General Morner who was expected there foon; they have raifed Batteries all along on the Coafts befween Elsbourg and Gottenbourg, and are equipping their Fleet at Carlfcroon and their Flotilla at Maestrand. . Collonel Lewenobr returned from Sweden on the ift Instant, and is gone to Day to the King of Denmark who is at Coldingen, to give his Majefty an Account of his Negotiations at Stockholm.

Hambourg, June 6. Letters from Petersburg of the 19th past advile, that on the 6th died Peter Petrowitz, only Son of his Czarilh Ma-jefly, in the 3th Year of his Age ; who had been declared Hereditary Prince of Muscovy, after the solemn Renuntiation made by the late Prince Alexius Petrowltz.- He was buried on the 7th with great Solemnity, in a Monaftry about a League from Petersburg, whither his Czarish Majesty, the Ministers of State, and a great Train of Nobility, accompanied the Corpse, in their Mourning Barges; while the Czarina with divers Ladies remained in her Apartments, bewailing the great Loss suffaine ed by this unexpected Accident. The Czar has had 11 Children by his present Confort, of which three Princeffes are yet living ; all the reft dyed young t the eldest of these Princeffes is in her 11th Year, and refembles the Czar very much. The deceased Prince Alexius Petrowitz left a Son who is in the 4th Year of his Age. On the 9th a Ship built to carry 90 Guns was launched at Petersburg, on which Occasion the Court laid afide Mourning for that Day, and a great Entertainment was prepared on Board the new Ship, where his Czarish Majesty treated all those who attended him. The Preparations for War were continued ; and they had no Account at Petersburg of the Arrival of the Queen

Penterriedter, the Emperour's Minifter to the King of Great Britain, fets out to Morrow for Vienna. England, and Yefterday proceeded for Hambourg. Prince Kourakin, the Ruffian Ambaffadour, has notified in Form to this State the Death of the young Prince, Son of the Czar his Mafter, whereupon the States have by their Deputies made him Compliments of Condolance.

Hanover, May 27, O.S. On the 22d Infant Earl Stanhope arrived here. The King is in good Health, and intends to keep his Birth Day at Herenhausen, and to set out the next Day for Pyrmont, to drink the Waters.

Edinburgh, May 26. His Majefty's Ship the Flamborough, Captain Hildefley Commander, came into Leith Road last Saturday in the Evening. He brought with him a Spanist Lieutenant who was taken at Donan Caffles and who has given the Lord Carpenter the following Account, viz. That there came bat two Frigates, and they brought but 307 Spaniards, being a Detachment of 12 Men per Company of Don Pedro de Castro's Regiment of Foot, which confifts of 24 Companies, befides two of Grenadiers out of which nonë were detached : That they failed from Port-Paffage the 8th of March, N.S. and landed in Kintail the 27th of April, N. S. having not feen any of the Spanish Fleet in their Ways, A Lieutenant Collonel commanded them, with fix Captains, fix Lieutenants, and fix Enfigns: That none elfe came in thefe Frigates but three Lords with their Servants, fo that what other Rebel Gentlemen are with them must have, been in the Country before, or have landed in other Places. He fays they brought 2000 Arms, + and he was told had delivered out 400, but he believes not fo many, for he faw few Men with them. The Lieutenant Col-lonel was affured, that 10000 Men were there in Arms ready to join them, but find-ing very few, he kept the two Frigates there 10 Days refolving to go off again y tho' at last he was prevailed with to stay, and to let them fail. He judges they can have but little Ammunition left, and that those which remain will endeavour to get into the Ifles int order to make their Elcape. The Lord Carpenter has fent theie Particulars, which the Spanish Lieutenant appeared to relate freely without any Referve, to Major General Wightman, and ordered him when in Kintail, if the Rebels should be gone to the Isles, to imbark on his Majesty's Ships 4 or 500 Men to follow them, under the Command of Collonel Clayton, who was in those Isles the last Rebelliont with a Body of Troops, Letters from Invernefs of the 22d Inffant, fay Major General Wightman was expected there the next Day \$ And that immediately on his Arrival, the King's Forces would march against the Rebels.
