Whitehall, June 5.

AN humble Address to His Majesty from the High Sheriff, Governour, Deputy-Governours, Justices of the Peace, the Protestant Clergy, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Cavan, and the Corporations of Cavan and Bellurbett, having been transmitted by his Grace the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland to the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Craggs, has been laid before their Excellencies the Lords Justices.

Berne, May 31. The Sovereign Council here continues its Deliberations upon encouraging all Sorts of Manufactures in this Country, and upon hindering the further Exportation of Money, which is very scarce; for which End they came to a Resolution some Days ago to oblige every Body that is any ways employed by this State, to wear no other Apparel but what shall be actually manufactured in this Canton. The Commissioners which went lately on the Part of this State to Lausanne to visit that Academy, are expected back here to Day: It is said that things have passed there with great Quietness and Moderation. The Republick of Geneva has written a Letter to this State, to acquaint them with the Step they had lately taken at the Requisition of His Britannick Majesty's Minister there, in causing the late Lord Mar with his Papers to be seized. Letters from that Place advise, that an Apartment had been fitted up at the Town house for the said Lord Mar, whither he had been removed from his Inn; to be more securely kept till his Majesty's Pleasure be known.

Paris, June 10. The Parliament of Bourdeaux have published an Arrêt, censuring the Declaration in the King of Spain's Name lately dispersed, and forbidding the vending or uttering the same on the Penalty to all Offenders of being treated as guilty of High Treason. On the 8th Instant, the King of Great Britain's Birth day, the Earl of Stair his Ambassadour at this Court, gave a very magnificent Entertainment, to several Dukes, Marshals of France, foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Quality and Distinction. Letters from the Army commanded by the Marshal Berwick advise, that the Siege of Fontarabia is carried on successfully with all Diligence.

Dublin, May 29. Yesterday being His Majesty's Birth-day, the Nobility and Gentry attended his Grace the Lord Lieutenant in the Presence-Chamber of the Castle, where was also a great Appearance of Ladies; there was a Song in Honour of the Day, accompanied with a Consort of Musick of the best Performers in the Kingdom, which was ended by a Flourish of the State Trumpets, and, on a Signal given, there was a triple Discharge of the Ordnance; after which his Grace, in his State-Coach, attended by a Body of Horse, made a Tour on the Strand; the Stewards for the Feast, with the Nobility and Gentry, waited on him in their Coaches. From thence they repaired to the Tholsel to Dinner; where was a splendid Entertainment provided by the Stewards: Dinner being ended his Grace went to the Play, where there was a very great Appearance; the Play being over, his Grace with the Ladies and the rest of the Company went to the Fire-works, which with Bonfires, Illuminations, and Ringing of Bells, concluded the Day's Solemnity. His Grace designed a Ball at the Castle, but considering it would be too great a Fatigue to the Ladies after the Fire-works, it is appointed to be to Night.

Edinburgh, May 30. Letters of the 25th Instant from Inverness, give us Reason to conclude that Major-General Wightman, who arrived at that Place the Day before, marched against the Rebels on Tuesday or Wednesday last. It is believed here the King's Forces will not find any Body of the Rebels together, except the Spaniards in order to surrender. It is advised, that there are no Men of any Note with them, except such as are attainted. As there are divers Persons in this Town, Enemies to His Majesty's Government, who have endeavoured to persuade others, that there were no Prisoners taken in Donan-Castle, it was thought proper that those brought by the Flamborough Frigate into Leith-Road, should be landed, which was done on the 28th, and they marched through the Town into the Castle. By Letters of the 19th from Captain Holland Commander of His Majesty's Ship the Assistance, we learn, that the Blow the Rebels received lately in Castle Donan had obliged them to shift their Quarters, and march to the Head of Lough Carran near Lough Kiffern, where the Dartmouth and Assistance are at Anchor; and that there often happen small Encounters betwixt their Parties, and the Ships Boats, which are employed to observe their Motions, and destroy all Imbarcations of any kind whatever. These Letters add that there is a Difference between the late Marquis of Tullibardine, and Seaforth, and Marischal, upon the Point of Command, whereupon Tullibardine was removed with the Spaniards to a Place three Miles distant from the others; a Deserter from the Spaniards had assured, that they would surrender upon the first Summons from a Body of regular Troops.
