The Bilhop of Eutin, his Uncle, is gone this Evening to Boitzenburgh, where the Duke will be To-Morrow. The Danish Collonel Lewenohr, who was lately at Stockholm, paffed through this Place Yefierday in his Way to Pyrmont, whither he is fent with a Commission from the King of Denmark to H₂, Britannick Maiefly.

fent with a Community. H15 Britannick Majefty. The two Dutch Ministers at States that Sweden How, June 13. The two Dutch Ministers at Stockholm have informed the States, that Sweden was willing to confent their Subjects should enjoy an entire Liberty of Commerce in the North, provided the States on their Part would execute the Treaty of Travendal, which appears no lefs than a flat Denial of the faid Liberty of Trade: The Ambaffadour of Muscovy, who lately offered the same Liberty in the Gzar's Name, provided Sweden would grant it like-wife, preffes for an Anfwer; which is deferred till the next Affembly of the States of Holland. He has re-ceived none hitherto on his Demand of recalling M. de Bye, but it has been intimated to him that he will return from Sweden, as foon as M. Burmania arrives there. The faid M. Burmania is not yet come back from Friefland. M. Haefler his Competitor for that Ambaffy is dead ; but the Diffention on that Subject continues between Holland and the other Provinces. The Ministers of Tuscany, Lorrain, and Modena who resided at London, artived here fome Days ago. M. Neny is fent hither by the Marquels de Prie, to treat of a Convention with the States for the mu-tual Affiftance of one another in the Places of the Low Countries in Cafe of any Infurrection; and to fettle likewife fome Difficulties occalioned by the rajfing of the Cuftoms on the Maefe.

We expect To-Morrow Night a Reinforcement of feven Battallions, and then we shall advance towards the Spanifh Army.

may, fhall command Silence, and repeat, or caule to be repeated, the following Proclamation; Our Sovereign Lord the King chargeth and command eth all Perfons being affembled, immediately to differfe themfelves, and peaceably to depart to their Habitations, or to their lawful Business, upon the Pains contained in the Att made in the first Year of King George for preventing Tumults and Riotous Assemblies. God fave the K IN G-

And the Perfons fo affembled continuing together by the Space of one Hour, do all and every of them become Guilty of Felony without Benefit of Clergy ; and if any of them shall happen to be killed, maimed, or hurt, in the dispersing, feizing, or apprehending, of endeavouring so to do the Magistrates and Persons affifting them shall be discharged and indemnified.
