From on board the Barque in Melazzo Bay, May 30, N. S.

ON the 22d we sailed with the Fleet from Baya. On the 26th getting the Length of Strombolo, General Mezey went a-head to Melazzo, to confer with General Zunjuzigen; and a Resolution was taken to land between Parti and Olivetta. It was so late in the Evening the 27th when we came to an Anchor, that we did not disembark that Night; but the next Morning as soon as it was Day we began, and by Eight a-Clock all the Infantry and part of the Cavalry were landed without Opposition, and immediately marched to take the Heights of Olivetta, and secure the Pass that leads into the open Country between that Place and Melazzo. The General having Notice that the Spanish Army was decamped from before Melazzo and moving towards Barcelonesta, giving out that they intended to attack him, resolved not to stay for the rest of the Cavalry that was not disembarked, and might be about 600, but advanced to the Heights of Olivetta afore-mentioned. That Evening we went with the Fleet into the Bay to the Eastward of Olivetta, and landed the Field-Pieces and Necessaries for their Carriage. At Day-break the General marched on with the Army, and was joined by some of the Troops he had given Orders to come to him from Melazzo. On his March he had Intelligence, that the Enemy had decamped the Night before, and this Morning he had Notice that they marched without halting to Villa Franche, (about 30 Miles) leaving behind them some Baggage which they could not carry with them, but they had before sent away most of their Baggage to Messina. 'Tis reported they did not carry with them above a Day's Bread, and it seems they were so undetermined, that they had not provided any Magazines at Villa Franche, nor in any Part of that Country. All the Account we have at present of the Spanish Army is that they halt at Villa Franche, lying near three Passes, by which they may retire either towards Messina, Palermo, or Syracuse. Most Part of the Inhabitants of the Country hereabouts are come out and have submitted to the Emperour's Obedience, Prince Furieri at the Head of them, who has a considerable Interest in this Part of the Island. Last Night we came hither with the Fleet, and are now disembarking the rest of the Horse, and all the Equipage of the Army that is thought necessary at present, which will be all ashore this Evening, and probably by To-morrow the General may procure such Accounts of the Enemy, as may determine him which Way to move from hence. The Troops are very good, and in perfect Order.

Navy Office, May 27, 1719.

By the Acts of the 3d and 4th and 12th of the late Queen, for the encouraging the Importation of Naval Stores from her Majesty's Plantations in America, the Commissioners of the Navy are required to make out Bills to the Importers of such Stores, for a Reward or Premium after, and according to several Rates therein particularly set forth; provided that the Pre-emption and Refusal of such Naval Stores be offered and tendered to the Commissioners of the Navy for her Majesty's Service, upon landing the same: And it being observed by the said Commissioners, that several of the Importers of the said Stores have neglected to make Tender thereof to the Navy Office for Her Majesty's Service, upon landing the same; they have consulted the Attorney-General in this behalf, who hath given his Opinion thereon, That if any Neglect on the Merchants Part appears, that the same sooner have made a tender thereof, he thereby loses the Benefits

Benefit of the Premium granted by the said Act. And it being conceived that a reasonable time for the Merchants making a Tender of the said Stores at the Navy-Office, may be within a Fortnight at the Port of London, and within a Month at the other Ports in this Kingdom, after their landing the said Stores; these are to give Notice thereof to the Importers of such Stores for their Information therein, for his and their bringing with their Tenders Certificates from the proper Officers of the Custom House of the time of landing the Goods they shall offer for the Service.
