Petersbourg, May 29, O. S.

IT is advised from Revel, that the Men of War which were fitted out there have been some time at Sea; that Part of them are employed to transport from thence to Abo in Finland three Regiments of Foot, designed to serve on board the Gallies which are there; and that the others cruise on all Merchant-Ships going to Sweden. They had already taken about 30 Prizes of several Nations, among them five Ships belonging to the Subjects of the King of Great Britain, viz. the Unity from Hull, and the St. George, both bound for Stockholm; the William of Glasgow, the Nathaniel of Yarmouth, and the Mary of Dublin. A considerable Number of Gallies have been built here, for this Summer's Service. To-Morrow being the Czar's Birth-Day, a new Ship of 50 Guns will be launched; and immediately after his Czarish Majesty will set out for Cronstot, whether the Gallies will soon follow, they having got a-board all their Necessaries, as well as embarked their Compliments of Men; but 'tis yet doubted whether the Fleet can be ready to sail from Cronstot before the Middle of June. On the 20th Instant General Jagoskinski began his Journey for Aland, to assist at the Congress there in the Quality of the Czar's Minister Plenipotentiary.

Berne, June 14. The Sovereign Council continues its Deliberations upon the Proposals that have been made lately for establishing several sorts of Manufactures in this Canton; and it was resolved in their Meeting of the 10th Instant, that for the Encouragement of Foreigners who should be willing to come and settle here for that Purpose, the Right of Habitation, called *Le Droit des Bourgeois habitants*, should be granted to such as should upon Examination be judged useful towards the setting up of the said Manufactures. A Committee is appointed by this State to draw up Instructions for the Deputies which were named lately to assist on the Part of this Canton at the next General Diet, which is to meet the 2d of July at Baden, and where 'tis said the French Ambassador the Marquis d'Avarey, will likewise assist, he being expected back for that Purpose from Paris, whither he went lately by Order of his Court. It is advised from Coire, that the Grisons have finished their new Treaty of Capitulation of Milan with the Baron de Grench, his Imperial Majesty's Envoy to the Three Leagues.

Brussels, June 24. On the 21st Instant the Count de Senneterre, Ambassador from the most Christian King to His Britannick Majesty, arrived here from Paris, and immediately made a Visit to the Marquês de Prié, who returned it the next Day, and treated him at Dinner, with several other Persons of Distinction. Yesterday in the Afternoon he proceeded on his Journey for Hanover.

From the Marshal Berwick's Camp at Renterie, within a League of St. Sebastian, June 24. On the 22d the King's Army decamped from Iron, and came hither. A Battalion of the Enemy's Miquelets appeared near Oyarson, and seemed resolved to molest us in our March; but Brigadier Bulkeley facing them with some Companies of Grenadiers, and some Pickets, hindered them from attempting any thing, till a Battalion of our Harquebusiers of Roussillon coming up, drove them from their Post, and pursued them two Leagues. We have no further Account of the King of Spain or of his Army, since they retired towards Pampelona.

Hanover, June 27. Mr. Whitworth left Berlin on the 22d Instant, came hither on the 25th, and immediately proceeded to wait on His Majesty at Pyrmont, from whence His Majesty is expected back here on the 30th Instant.

Hague, June 27. On the 16th Instant Princes Koufakin acquainted the Deputies of the States General in a Conference, that the Czar being informed some Jealousies were entertained, that the great Preparations making at Petersbourg for the Embarkation of a considerable Number of Troops might regard Meck-

lenbourg; his Czarish Majesty had ordered him to make a Declaration in Form, that the said Preparations were designed against Sweden, that the Czar would not concern himself for the Duke of Mecklenbourg any other way than by good Offices, and that he would not intermeddle in the Business of the Empire, or raise any Troubles there. The Minister of Prussia being impowered by his Court to treat here of an amicable Agreement, under the Mediation of the States, on the Differences between that King and the House of Nassaw-Friseland, about the late King William's Succession, the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel and the Princes of Nassaw, Guardians to the Young Prince, have written to the States that on their Part they were ready to begin the Negotiation, and would to that End send forthwith their Ministers hither: Baron Dalwich is the Person designed by the Landgrave. The Muscovites having taken 20 Dutch Ships going to Sweden, the Merchants of Amsterdam have complained of it to the States, and petitioned for a Squadron's being sent to the Baltick to protect their Trade. The Town of Amsterdam has protested against M. Burmania's going Ambassador to Sweden: But as this Matter depends on the Plurality of Voices in the States General, the Six Provinces who named him for that Ambassy persist in their Resolution of sending him, and his Instructions will soon be ready.

Windsor, June 23. This Day the most Noble Evelyn, Duke of Kingston, Lord President of the Council, was Installed Knight Companion of the most Noble Order of the Garter, in the Chapel Royal of St. George, within the Colledge, in the Castle of Windsor, by the most Noble Henry, Duke of Kent, Lord Privy Seal, John Duke of Montagu, Master of the Great Wardrobe and Captain of the first Troop of His Majesty's Life-Guards, and Thomas Holles Duke of Newcastle, Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household, Knights Companions of the said Order, Commissioned thereto by the Sovereign under the Great Seal of the Order; the Achievements of the late Earl of Albemarle having been first offered by the two Senior Knights Commissioners: And when all the usual Ceremonies had been performed in the Chapel, the Procession was made from thence through the Great South Door of the Church up to the Castle, and the Knights Companions, the Officers of the Order, and a Great Number of the Nobility, and other Persons of Quality and Distinction, were splendidly entertained at Dinner in the Great Guard-Chamber.

of Snuff, any Fustick or yellow Ebony, Touchwood, or any other sort of Wood, or any Dirt or Sand, or Dust sifted from Tobacco, or shall knowingly sell, or expose to Sale, any Snuff so made, mixed or coloured; every such Person so offending shall forfeit the Snuff, and for every Pound Weight thereof the Sum of three Pounds, one Moiety of which Forfeiture shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to such Person as shall seize or sue for the same; Which Act is further enforced by a Clause in another Act passed the last Session of Parliament, intitled, An Act against clandestine Running of uncustomed Goods, and for the more effectual preventing of Frauds relating to the Customs: And whereas the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs have received Information, that great Frauds and Abuses are still carried on by divers Persons in the making, mixing and colouring of Snuff, notwithstanding the aforesaid Acts to the Prejudice of the Revenue and the fair Traders in that Commodity; for the better preventing thereof the said Commissioners do hereby give Notice, that if any Person or Persons will, either by themselves or Agent, give an Account of such Frauds to the said Commissioners; or to any Officer under them, so as such Frauds may be detected, the Person or Persons giving such Account shall have and receive all due Encouragement.
