Ambassador Extraordinary from the Court of France hath acquainted her Majesty with his intentions of leaving this Court, in order to his return home, about the latter end of this Moneth, in pursuance of the orders he hath received from his Master, and that they might within a short time after expect the arrival of Monsieur Vi tars, whom his most Christian Majesty hath appointed to fucceed him in his employment in this Court.

Fro.n Palermo we have advice, That the Prince de Ligny, Vice Roy of Sicily, was perfectly recovered again of his late Indisposition; and that that Kingdom had been of late very much alarmed, as if the Turks had fome design of attaquing them this Summer; for the preventing of which, they fail not to make what provision they can, and seem not now to apprehend any great danger from that side this year.

Listo, May 24. On the 26th instant their most Christian Majelties are expected with the Court at Armentiers, and the Tuesday or Wednesday fo lowing in this place; for whose reception all nea fary preparations are in the interim making; wont flay the King may make here is not certainly known, though it is generally thought it will not be many

Bruffels, May 24. On Friday last according to the Advice we had from Bruges, we expected here our Governor the Count de Monterey, but since find that his Excellency for some particular reasons, had thought fit to defer his intentions of leaving

that place, for some few days at least.

It is said, that the Countess de Monterey, hath sent to return her humble thanks to her most Chrstian Majesty, for her kind invitation to come and fee her at Aeth, and to excuse her not being able to wait upon her Majesty there, by reason of her late indisposition,

The Prince de Mamines hath not yet received his final orders for his departure, but seeing his intentions are of meeting the French Court at Acth, there seems to be no need of his making any great hafte from hence. The Count Marcin hath been lately surprised with a sudden ilness, but is

Lid to be at prefent a little better.

Oftend, May 27. From Dunkirk they write, that the French Court went thence the 25. instant, together with the Army, excepting 5 or 6 thousand men that are left there to pursue the work of the Fortifications: That night their Majesties were to lodge at Wattou, and to be the next day at Armentiers, and on Wedne (day at Liste, where they intended to stay but 3 or 4 dayes, and then to remove to Aeth, with intentions to pass there three weeks or a moneth. Don Francisco de Velasco hath taken possession of his Command of the Spanish Regiment in Garrison here.

Ghent, May 28. The 26. in the Evening arrived here our Governour the Count de Monterey from Bruges, accompanied by Count Marcin, who is perfeetly well again and several other persons of quality: And yesterday his Excellency went to visit all the new Fortifications of this place, on which they work daily with 1200 men; and which, when finished, will he a very great strength to the Town. His Excel-lency will stay here some few dayes, and then return for Bruffels.

Hague, 29. May. The Lieutenant Admiral de Ruyter, with other of the principal Officers, is finally gone from hence to the Fleet, with orders to put immediately to Sea: The Amsterdam Squadron is quite ready, that Admiralty having to make up their number appointed an other Ship of the same force, which it feems was ready fitted, instead of that,

which, as was said, run lately on ground near Enchuyfen, so that they may fail out of the Texell with the first fair wind, consisting of 12 Men of war, and 6 Frigats, with as many Fire-ships, to joyn with those of Rutterdam, Zealand, and Friesland: It is said the Fleet will continue during the time of their being abroad, in the Wielingen, and on the Coast of Zenland, to avoid the giving of any jealousie to our Neighbours.

Monsieur de Greet, Ambassador from this State in the Court of France, having defired leave to make a step hither for some snort time, in order to the 'ooking after his particular concerns; the States have accordingly granted his desire in this particular, and ordered a Vessel to attend him at Sluyse for

his Transportation.

Here are lately returned from Dunkirke several persons of Quality, who wen hither out of curiolity to see the French Court; they tell us, mongst other toings, that the Fortifications of that

are very much advanced, and almost finish d; Ma, ties went from thence on Monday they would not flay long there, but proceed in few days for fourney, and the other conquered places, to be back again at Paris about the later end of June. The four Deputies which are at present at Bilevelt, on the part of this State, hav, as is said, represented, that the presence of them all there seems not to be so very necessary, but that two of them may have permission to return home, and more particularly we are told, That the Heer d'Ameronghen hath desired leave of the States to return from

From Munster our Letters tell us, that the Bishop hath promised the States of his Country to disband all his Forces in a Months time, unless any thing extraordinary happen to hinder it; though in the mean time the Princes of Lunenburgh, show not as yet, the least intention of dismissing their

From Cologne they write, of the great hopes they have of an accommodation with that Elector; that Collonel Bampfield who had raised a Regiment there for the service of this State, hath since passed into that of the City, and hath accordingly, together with the other chief Officers, taken the oath of Fidelity; before the Marquis de Grana, and the Magistrates of that place.

Whitehal, May 4. His Majesty having been pleased upon the removal of my Lord chief Baron Hales to be Chief Justice of the Court of Kings Bench, to make choice of Sir Edward Turner Knight, his Majesties Sollicitor General, to succeed in that place, On Tuesday last the 23. instant, in obedience to His Majesties Writ, commanding him to take his Degree of Sergeant at Law, he appeared at the Chancery Bar, and according to custom, took the usual Oath before the Right Honourable the Lord Keeper; which being done, he went before the Lord Chief Justice of the Common Pleas, where having performed the Ceremonies belonging to that Degree, he was called by my Lord Keeper, to the Exchequer Bar, and being there sworn Lord Chief Baren of that Court, he took his place on the Bench accordingly.

His Majesty hath likewise been pleased to make choice of Francis North Esquire, Son to the Lord North, to succeed the said Sir Edward Turner, as his Sollicitor General; and accordingly having fome dayes before received the honor of Knighthood from his Majesty, on Tuesday the 23. afore-

laid he was fworn into the Place.
