Lisbon, July 4, N. S.

Spanish Privateer having some Days ago taken an English Vesfel that was at Anchor in the Port of Faro, and attempting to carry her out, Mr. Lempiere the British Conful at that Port, made Complaint to the Governour of the Town, who gave him a Company of Foot Soldiers, with which he embarked in two Boats, engaged the Privateer, boarded and took her; the Captain with 23 Men he brought Prisoners to the Town, where they were confined in the Common Gaol till Orders should be sent from this Court. Mr. Parker, the British Consul at Corunna, was in the Beginning of March sent by the Spaniards to the Castle of Montforte de Lemos, and has continued there ever fince under close Confinement, together with several British Masters and Mariners; where no Subfistance is allowed to any of them, so that they must have perished had not the Consulsubsisted them at his own Charge. The British Envoy here has received the like Complaint from Masters of Vessels who have been carried Prisoners into the Ports of Ga-

Berne, July 7. The Canton of Schaffhuysen having wrote lately to this State, to complain of the Disobedience their mutinous Subjects of Wilchingen continue in, and to defire them that Instructions might be given to their Deputies at the present General Dyet of Baden, to concert with those of the other Evangelical Cantons, the proper Measures for bringing them to Reason, our Sovereign Council, which was affembled fome Days ago upon this Subject, agreed ac-cordingly to the Demand of the aforenamed Canton, and have fent Orders to their Deputies at Baden to treat of this Matter. Foreign Parts, under Pain of Confiscation and other Punishments. According to our Advices from Baden of the 4th Instant, all the Deputies of the 12 Cantons were arrived there, and the French Ambassadour was likewise expected that Day. It is advised from Geneva, that upon the Request of the late Lord Marr, Liberty was given him to take the Air in the publick Walks of that City, but that he was always accompanied by fome Officers of the Garrison. Brigadier Sturler, whose Regiment is in England, and who has been detained here some Time by Siekness, set out on the 3d Instant for Great Britain.

Hanover, July 7, O. S. The Duke of York, the Prince of Beveren, and the Duke of Holstein, have been three or four Days with the King at Herenhausen; and To Day the Duke of Holstein came hither to visit the Earl Stanhope, who on Saturday last entertained at Dinner the Marquess de Senererre, Ambassadour from

the most Christian King.

Genoa, July 11. On the 7th Instant arrived here the Dragon and Superbe, two British Men of War, from Port Ma-hon; they sail again To-Morrow to join Sir George Byng. Yesterday by the Way of Milan we received a Copy of the Journal from the Imperial Camp under General Mercy's Command to the 26th of June: The Imperialists had then lost 2500 Men, killed or wounded, and they understood by Deserters that the Spaniards had lost about 2400. The two Camps were within Musket Shot of each other: The Imperialists have an open Communication with the Sea.

Paris, July 19. Letters from the Marshal Berwick's Camp before St. Sebestian advise, that all the necessary Dispositions were making for opening the Trenches as To-Morrow Night, Letters from Rome relate, that the Pope being perfectly recovered of a late Indisposition, had resolved to make a Promotion of Cardinals, and it was believed

Count Kiniglegg, the Emperour's Ambassadour, sets out from hence on the 23d Instant for Vienna. He is appointed Master of the Houshold to the Printess of Saxony, and the Emperour's Plenipotentiary in the North: The Dutchess of Berry having fallen Ill again within these four Days, is now thought past Recovery.

Paris, July 22. Madame Mary Louisa Elizabeth, Dutchess of Berry, died at Muette in the Night between the 20th and 21st Instant. She was born on the 20th of August 1695, and on the 6th of July 1710, was Married to Monseigneur Charles of France Duke of Berry, who died the 4th of May 1714. This Evening her Heart is to be carried to Val de Grace, and To-Morrow Night her Corpfe is to be carried to the Royal Abbey of St. Denys.

By the Asts of the 3d and 4th and 12th of the late Queen, for the incouraging the Importation of Navial Stores from her Majesty's Plantations in America, the Commissioners of the Navy are required to make out Bills to the Importers of Such Stores, for a Reward or Premium after, and according to several Rates therein par-ticularly set forth; provided that the Pre-emption and Refusal of such Naval Stores be offered and tendered to the Commissioners of the Navy for her Majesty's Service, upon landing the same: And it being observed by the faid Commissioners, that several of the Importers of the faid Stores have neglected to make Tender thereof at the Navy-Office for His Majesty's Service, upon landing the fame; they have consulted the Attorney-General in this Case, who hath given his Opinion thereon, That if any Neglect on the Merchants Part appears that he might fooner bave made a tender thereof, he thereby loses the Benifit of the Pramium granted by the faid Act. And it being conceived that a reasonable time for the Mershants making a Tender of the Said Stores at the Navy-Office, may be within a Fortnight at the Port of Lon-don and within a Month at the other Ports in this Kingdom, after their landing the faid Stores; thefe are to give Notice thereof to the Importors of Juch Stores for bincir Information therein, for his and their bringing we be their Tenders Certificates from the proper Officers of bl. Custom bouse of the time of landing the Goods they Shall offer for the Service.
