ON the 17th Instant the Czar with his Fleet arrived here from Cronlot. Immediately after his Arrival his Czarish Majesty went on board a Ship of 48 Guns lately taken from the Swedes, which he ordered to be refitted for this Summer's Service. His Czarish Majesty will put to Sea again, as soon the Wind, which is now contrary, will permit. The Gallies have passed by Helsingfors in their Way to Hangut. The Mole for the Security of the Shipping in this Port, a Work which three Kings of Sweden had attempted unsuccessfully, is, by the Czar's Directions, very near finished. 400 Carpenters and 5000 Labourers were employed on it last Winter, with 1500 Horses for bringing the Materials. About 200 Pieces of Cannon are already placed on it, to defend the Entrance of the Port.

*Berlin, July 18.* On the 14th Instant, Mr. Whitworth, His Britannick Majesty's Minister, returned hither from Hanover. He dispatched the same Evening a Messenger to the King of Prussia, who is at Charlottenburg with the Queen and Royal Family, in order to know his Majesty's Pleasure about his Audience, which was appointed him on Sunday the 16th, at Ten in the Morning: He was then conducted to Charlottenburg by Baron Kniphaußen, and was received by his Prussian Majesty with great Marks of Favour. Several Persons having been some Time since taken up and confined, some upon an Accusation of a Conspiracy against the King's Person, and others of holding a Criminal Correspondence with his Majesty's Enemies, they were last Week brought to Trial, which lasted from the 14th to the 17th Instant, and at which the King's principal Ministers assisted. Their Judges pronounced Sentence against two of them, the one Secretary to the Field-Marshal Wartenleben, and the other to M. Grumkau. The last was condemned to work chained to a Wheel-barrow for Life, and the former to be beheaded, but he was found dead in his Bed the Day before he was to suffer. This however did not put a Stop to the Execution of the Sentence; his Body was brought from Spandau to Berlin Yesterday dressed in the usual Habit he wore when alive, and placed in a Chair on a Cart. A Company of Grenadiers attended it to the Place of Execution, where the Head was cut off by the Hangman, and the Body afterwards laid on a Wheel. M. Tolstoy, the Czar's Minister, arrived here on the 16th.

*Hambourg, July 21.* Letters from Norway advise, that the Danish Army was to draw

together the 15th Instant on the Schepen-Heide, between Frederickshall and Frederickstat; that the King of Denmark was to take a Review of them on the 17th, and the next Day would begin to march upon some Enterprize.

*Hague, July 25.* The States are very much perplexed about the Trade of their Subjects to the Baltick, the Merchants continuing very importunate to have something done for the Security of that Trade. Though M. de Hasselaer, who was proposed by the Town of Amsterdam for the Ambassy of Sweden, is dead, yet the States of Holland still oppose the sending M. Burmania, and seem determined to employ the Resident de Bic to negotiate the particular Affairs of their Province. The other Provinces who named M. Burmania, abide by what they have done, seeing it was always the Practice to decide Matters of this Kind by the Plurality of Voices in the Assembly of the States General: They are therefore resolved he shall go Ambassadour from the Republick to Stockholm, notwithstanding they cannot obtain the Concurrence of Holland. The Marquis Beretti Landi has not only notified in form to the States, that in the late Action at Franca Villa in Sicily, the Spaniards gained a compleat Victory over the Imperialists; but likewise caused Te Deum to be sung for it in his Chapel on Sunday last, with extraordinary Pomp and Solemnity. 'Tis advised from Brussels, that the Government there having had some Reason to suspect that Brigadier Daudigniet (who was formerly a Colonel of Dragoons in the Netherlands, and who was broke with Infamy two Years ago by a Court Martial) held a dangerous Correspondence with the Spanish Ambassadour at the Hague; Application was made to the Governour of Maubeuge for seizing the said Brigadier; accordingly some Days ago he and his Brother, who is a Captain in Holstein's Dragoons, were seized, with their Papers, by 50 Grenadiers at his House within three Leagues of Mons on the Territories of France, and carried to Maubeuge. Count Windisgratz, whom the Emperour has nominated his Minister to this State, is expected here in about three Weeks. Letters from Vienna of the 12th Instant say, they had received the List of the Number of Men killed and wounded on the Side of the Imperialists at Franca Villa; by which it appeared, that their whole Loss was 2050 killed and wounded. General Mercy had writtten to Prince Eugene on the 27th past, that he was in so fair a way to recover of his Wound, that he doubted not to be able to get on Horseback in a few Days.

The Commissioners for examining and determining the Debts due to the Army give Notice to the Officers of the two late Regiments of Mariners, under the Command of the late Lieutenants General Holt and Seymour, and the Regiment of Foot late under the Command of the Honourable Colonel Richard Motesworth; that they have directed the Colonels of the said Regiments, or their Agents, to state the particular Accounts of the Officers, and also of the Companies in the said Regiments, agreeable to the Regimental State determined by the said Commissioners, and to lay them before the Commissioners with all convenient Speed; and the said Officers are hereby required, by themselves, or their lawful Attornies, to adjust and settle their particular Accounts with the said Persons employed to settle and adjust the same, on or before the 14th of September next, at which time the said Persons are required to lay the Accounts so distributed before the Commissioners, in order to their determining and certifying the Debts due to the said Officers; also all Persons that have any Assignments made by the Officers of the said Regiments upon their arrears of Pay due in the said Regiments, are required forthwith to enter their Assignments with the Person employed to adjust the Account of the Regiment to which the Officer, under whom they claim, did belong, who is hereby required, upon producing the said Assignments, to make true Entries thereof, expressing the Assignor's Name, Quality and Company in which he served, the Assignee's Name, the Sum assigned, and Date of Assignment, and to lay the same before the Commissioners; together with the Accounts of the said Regiments; and all Persons concerned in the said Assignments may have free Access to inspect and examine the Entries of the said Assignments; and where any Disputes shall arise touching any of the said Accounts or Assignments, the Parties may apply to the Commissioners; and in Case no Application be made to the Commissioners within 14 Days after the said 14th of September, they will then proceed to certify on the said Accounts, agreeable to the Distributions then to be delivered in by the Persons employed to adjust the Accounts of the said Regiments, as aforesaid.
