A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

For Apprehending William Murray, commonly called Marquis of Tullibardine, George Keith late Earl of Marischal, and William Mackenzie late Earl of Seaforth.

Whereas we have received Information, that William Murray, commonly called Marquis of Tullibardine, eldest Son of John Duke of Arbol, George Keith late Earl of Marischal, and William Mackenzie late Earl of Seaforth, who, by Act of Parliament, stand attainted of High Treason, in levying War against His present most gracious Majesty within this Realm, did lately come into that Part of His Majesty's United Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, and appeared in Arms, openly abetting the late Insurrection there: And whereas there is good Reason to believe, that the said Persons do endeavour to conceal themselves, and are now lurking in the Highlands, or elsewhere, in that Part of His Majesty's said Kingdom; we have therefore thought fit, with the Advice of His Majesty's Privy-Council, to issue this Proclamation: And all His Majesty's loving Subjects are hereby commanded and required to discover, take, and apprehend the said Persons above-named, and every of them, where-ever they may be found, and to carry them before the next Justice of the Peace, or chief Magistrate, who is hereby required to commit them to the next Goal, there to remain until they be thence delivered by due Course of Law. And the said Justice or other Magistrate is hereby required immediately to give Notice thereof to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State. And we do hereby publish and declare to all Persons who shall conceal the Persons above-named, or any of them, or be aiding or assisting in the concealing of them, or any of them, or the furthering their Escape, that they shall be proceeded against for such their Offence with the utmost Severity of Law. And for the Encouragement of all Persons to be diligent and careful in endeavouring to discover and apprehend the said Persons, we further declare, that whosoever shall apprehend and bring before such Justice of the Peace or Magistrate the said Persons, or any of them, shall have and receive, for every one of them so apprehended and brought before a Justice of the Peace or Magistrate, the Sum of Two thousand Pounds Sterling: Which said Sum of Two thousand Pounds for every one of them, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are hereby required and directed to pay accordingly. And if such Person so discovering and apprehending any of the said Persons stands in need of His Majesty's most gracious Pardon, we do hereby further declare, that such Person shall have His Majesty's most gracious and free Pardon.

Given at Whitehall, the Twenty first Day of July, 1719, in the Fifth Year of His Majesty's Reign:

God save the KING.

Gibraltar, June 1, O. S. The Spaniards are putting Cadiz into the best Condition they can for Defence, and many of the Inhabitants have already retired with their Effects, being under Apprehension that a British Squadron with Land Forces will make an Attempt on that Place. There is in it a Garrison of 3000 Men besides Militia; they also oblige the several Villages of the Province to send in all the Horses they can furnish, as well as Contingents of Men fit to bear Arms: These are not only to assist in the Defence of that Town, but to guard the Coast. In the mean while there is every where a general Dislike among the People, of the Mea-

asures into which the King has been drawn by Cardinal Alberoni.

Genoa, July 18. Letters from Leghorn of the 14th Instant give an Account, that on the 10th the Loo, a British Man of War of 28 Guns, Captain George Protheroe Commander, took and brought into that Port a Spanish Privateer of 26 Guns, called the St. Antonio (which some time since took an English Merchant Ship called the Panther, commanded by Captain Timms.) In the Action between 70 and 80 of the Privateer's Men were killed or wounded, but the Loo had only two Men killed and three wounded. The Chevalier de Vincelles, who is sent by the Regent of France to reside at Naples with a publick Character, passed through Leghorn the 12th on his Way thither. The British Man of War the Dragon, commanded by Captain Scot, and the Superbe by Captain Masters, sailed from hence the 13th for Naples, having under their Convoy a Vessel laden with Powder for the Emperour's Service. The last Letters from the Imperial Camp in Sicily are of the 30th past, advising, that the Imperialists had secured their Communication with the Sea by the way of Taormina, and were continuing all proper Dispositions for freightning the Spaniards.

Hambourg, July 28. By Letters from Stockholm of the 3d Instant, O. S. we have received Advice, that the Lord Carteret, His Britannick Majesty's Minister Plenipotentiary, arrived there on the 30th of June in eight Days from Gottenbourg. The next Day his Excellency sent Mr. Elliot his Secretary, to notify his Arrival to Count Cronhielm the President of the Chancery: The same Evening his Excellency made a Visit to Count Cronhielm. The 3d Instant in the Morning the Queen sent M. Dubin, one of the Gentlemen of her Chamber, to acquaint his Excellency that she was ready to give him Audience at Three in the Afternoon. Her Majesty sent two Coaches with six Horses each to conduct his Excellency to Carleberg, where he was received with the Honours usually shewn to Ambassadors. After the Audience her Majesty appointed Count Cronhielm, Count Ducker, Count Taub, Count de la Gardie, all four Senators, and M. Hopkin Secretary of State, to be her Plenipotentiaries to treat with his Excellency; who immediately after he had left the Queen's Apartment, went to the Prince of Hesse, and was received by his Royal Highness in the most favourable Manner, and they had a Conference together.

Hague, Aug. 1. The Earl of Cadogan set out Yesterday for Amsterdam, where he designs to remain some Days, and return hither by the Way of Utrecht. The States have nominated M. Ham to assist at the Conferences to be held for an Agreement between the King of Prussia and the Prince of Nassau, which are to be begun shortly; M. Hubert on the Part of the Prince of Nassau, Baron d' Halwich from the Landgrave of Hesse, and M. Hymen sent by the King of Prussia to be joyned with M. Meynderhagen, being daily expected here.
