Leghorne, M1y 13. The Centurion Frigat Captait Bowen Commander is here ready in Port, and may infew days fail with a fleet of twenty fail of Merchant men for England. The Galley which is here building by Order of the King of England, is now quite finished, and in three or four dayes may be teady to launch. At Florence wee hear that Signior Magalotti, hath had feveral conferences with the Ministers of the Great Duke, about the leavies he is to make in these parts for the fervice of his most Christian Majesty, but know not the result of them.

Hamborough, May 26. From Stockholme they write, that the King and Queen Mother, having been this feafon diverting thomfelyes in the Country, were come to Town again with moft of the Senators, who were in few days to have 4 folemn meeting about the affairs of the Kingdom, & that they expected the arrival there of feveral forriegn Ministers, as from Poland, Muscowy and Turky, the Envoy from the Crim Tartars to that end deferring his departure till their arrival, to learn, if possible, their feveral errands. Wee expect here out of England the Sieur de Campen one of the Deputies of this Town; the Sieur Maetveldt and the Sieur Garmers being in the mean time directed to ftay there to take care of the affairs of this City.

The Lunenbourgh Troops which were quartered in the Fortrefs of Harburgh are marched out from thence, confifting of 11 Companies, asis faid towards the River Wefer. Here s a report, that the Bishop of Munster hath instea 70 nen, which by the Preliminary Treaty he solutient to put into Hoxter, cauled 300 ment 1 that Town, and to continue quartered there the great diffatisfaction of the Inhabitants; but of this we expect fome farther confirmation.

Hague, June 2. The Deputies of the refpective Admiralties are ftill in Towne, and have frequent Conferences with the Councel of State, concerning matters of the Fleet. Don Estevan de Gamarra, Amr baffador from the Crown of Spain is preparing for his return hone, being to be fucceeded in his employment here by Don Emanuel de Lyra, who it is faid, is already on his way hither; Wee are likewife told, that Monsieur Pompene Ambassador from his most Christian Majesty, may be very suddainly recalled from hence.

His Highnels the Prince of Orange continues ftill at Honflacrdyke, a houle of pleafure three miles from hence, and will as is thought pafs moft of the Summer there, yet fo, as to be frequently at the affembly of the Councel of State. From Bylevelt they write, that the Deputies of the Bishop of Munster were not yet arrived, but were with great impatience expected there.

From Cologne, that the Heer van Sypeflein Envoy from this State, after having had feveral meetings with the Marquis de Grana, and the Magiffrates of the place, for the accommodating the prefent differences; had likewife been at Bonna with that Elector, to confer with him upon that Subject, and to offer the mediation of the States his Mafters for the effecting the fame, but that he had received for answer, that his Electoral Highnefs, could in no fort accept of their good intentions in this particular, feeing the Emperor had already made choice of the Electors of Trever, of Mentz, and of Brandenburgh, as Arbiters in the matter, and that to their determination, he had committed the whole affair.

Some days fince we had a report here, that the Magiftrats of Brunsmick, having of late observed great numbers of Roman Catholicks within the Town, had defired some Troops of their Duke, for their fecurity against all accidents; but this day we have had advice from *Hanouer* that the, faid City was befieged by the Forces of that Duke, though not known upon what account, which feems so strange and surprising, that we shay for a farther confirmation in it. Our Fleer it is faid, is this day put to Sea for the Coast of Zealand.

Paris, June 2. From Marseilles of the 26th past they write, that they had advice there by a Bark ar-rived ineight days from Argiers, that Sir Edward Spragg had been before that place with ten Frigats, freihips and other imall Vessels, and had fired leveral hundred great thot into the Caftle and Town, though withour doing any farther execution as we hear of, then the killing fome of the Inhabitants, who are at prefent fo wearied out, with the many loffes they have of late received, and that without meeting with any confiderable purchase to recompence them, that most of the Seamen and others, who ferved in maritime employments, to the number of 8000 have left the place, and gone and taken fervice at Tunis; they have at prefene25 men of War, of which 10 are abroad, the reft in Port, which they have haled close under the Cafile for their security. They farther add from *Marfeilles* , that the Nine men of War,which as was formerly faid,were there fitted,are ready to fayl, as is thought for Tunis, and that they have not had any advice from the Squadron of Galleys lately fet out from thence fince their departure.

From Lifle we hear, that his most Christian Majefly was gone from thence towards Tournay and Action and that he intended to be the 15 instant at Charler or-

Windfor, May 31. On Sunday being the Eve of the celebration of St. George's Feast, appointed to be kept this year on the 29 infant, the day of his Majefties Birth and ever happy Reftauration, His Majefty as Soverain of the Order, accompanied by his Royal Highnels the Duke of York, His Highnels Prince Rupert, and leveral other Companions of that most Noble Order, all of them in their Habits, proceeded in the afternoon to the Ohappel in great Solemnity, where before the Divine Service begun, the Earl of Carlisle, introduced between his Royall Highneis and Prince Rupert, was installed as Proxy of the King of Sweden; and the East of Winchelfea, be-tween the Duke of Ormond and Duke of Buckingham as Proxy for the Elector of Saxony & both which Princes had been invefted with the full Habit of the Order in the year 1669; and after them the Duke of Albermarle introduced between the Earl of Sandmich and the Earl of Oxford was likewife invested and fet in his Stall. The next day the Feast was celebrated with extraordinary Splendor and Magnificence in all the circumstances of it; and the day following in the morning the Soverain proceeding to the Chappel, after he had taken His Stall, the Companions before they ascended to theirs, offered in order the Atchievements of Arms, viz. The Banners, Swords and Crefts of 7 decealed Knights; being William Earl of Sali foury, Thomas Earl of Berks, Alger-non Earl of Northumberland, Thomas Earl of Southhampton, George Duke of Albermarle, Mountagu Earl of Lindsey, and Edward Earl of Manchester.

Then the Soverain and Comparions, having Offered, as they had also done the day before, returned to the Chapter house, put off their Mantles, which is the only Habit of that day, and so the Solemnity ended.
