Copenhagen, September 19, N. S.

BY Letters from Stockholm of the 13th of September, N. S. we have Advice, that the Squadron of British Men of War commanded by Sir John Norris, having been joined by the Swedish Fleet off Carlscroon, arrived at the Dahlern on the 6th, to the unspeakable Joy of the People of Stockholm and of the neighbouring Country. The Muscovite Fleet was retired towards Revel and their other Ports: The Gallies with the Troops they had on board were retired towards Abo.

Revel, Sept. 7, N. S. On the 4th Instant the Muscovite Fleet came into the Road of this Port, where they lye at Anchor expecting Orders from his Czarish Majesty either to remain here or to go to Cronstot. The Fleet left the Czar at Lameland, whence he had sent for a Galliot in which he intended to embark at Birckeneiland for Petersbourg. The Muscovites lost a good Number of Men in the Resistance they met with from the Swedes in some Places where they landed to ravage the Country, about 1000 Men have been brought ashore and put into the Hospitals of this Town, and others were left at Abo.

Berlin, Sept. 19. M. Kniphausen sets out from hence this Evening for Hanover, with Instructions to make the King of Prussia's Compliments of Thanks to His Britannick Majesty, for procuring by his Mediation a Convention of Peace between the Crowns of Sweden and Prussia. His Prussian Majesty has ordered his Ministers to notify that Convention to M. Tolstoy, and to M. Mayer, the Muscovite and Danish Envoys at this Court.

Berne, Sept. 20. The Protestant Cantons have written a Letter to the King of Great Britain, to implore His Majesty's good Offices with the Elector Palatine, in favour of the Reformed Churches of the Palatinate, and the Catechism of Heidelberg, which was lately suppress'd. The Deputies of this State who have been some Time at Frawensfelt, are expected back this Week. It is advised from thence, that the Differences arisen lately between the new Abbot of St. Gall and his Subjects of the County of Tockenbourg, are in a fair way of Accommodation, by the friendly Interposition of the two Cantons of Zurich and Berne; and that the Abbot seems inclined to redress all Matters which should be found by the said two Cantons to be contrary to the Privileges of his Subjects.

Hague, Sept. 29. We have Advice from Brussels, that the Marquess de Prié had been dangerously ill, but was recovering: M. Neny his Agent here, has accommodated amicably some Differences which had arisen about the Collecting the Tolls on the Maese. M. Heinsius, the Great Pensionary, having been indisposed these three Days, the Deputies of the Province of Holland, who were come hither, have put off their Assembly to next Week. The States General have sent to M. Bruyninx their Minister at the Court of Vienna, their Answer to a Memorial lately delivered to them on the Part of the Emperour, concerning the seizing of a Ship of Ostend by the West-India Company. M. Burmania having been nominated by six of these Provinces, and at last by that of Holland, the Town of Amsterdam only excepted, to go Ambassadour from this Republick to Sweden, the States General sent Orders some Days ago to the Chamber of Admiralty of Amsterdam, to cause a Frigate to be got ready for carrying him
