## A PROCLAMATION,

WHEREAS this present Parliament stands Prorogued to the first Day of October next, we, with the Advice of his Majesty's Privy Council do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further Prorogued on the said first Day of October next, to Monday the three and twentieth Day of November next; and we have given Order, that a Commission be prepared for Proroguing the same accordingly. And we do hereby further declare his Majesty's Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said three and twentieth Day of November next, be held, and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners of Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said three and twentieth Day of November next.

Given at Whitehall, the Twentieth Day of September 1719, in the Sixth Year of His Majesty's Reign.

From on Board the Barfleur in Vado Bay, Sept. 19. Sir George Byng stays here, expecting the Imperial Troops that are marching from the Milaneze, the last Column of which will be here on the 23d. It is proposed to get them embarked and to sail with them as soon as possible for Melazzo. The Cannon, Ammunition and Provisions, are already shipped. Twenty four heavy Pieces of Cannon, with a good Quantity of Powder and Ball, were some Days ago sent away by Sir George Byng to Melazzo, for General Mercy.

Mont-Louis, Sept. 19. The Marshal Berwick goes from hence to Day to Ruyterda, where he will stay for the coming up of his Cannon, and from thence march to Ciudad d' Urgel six Leagues further, in order to make the Siege of that Castle. The Catalans express great Desire to see the Marshal enter their Country with his Forces. There are Parties of them in Arms in Favour of France all over the Province, which make Incursions as far as the Ebro, from whence they sent hither on the 17th two Mails which they had intercepted going from Tortosa to Madrid.

Ruyterda, Sept. 23. The Badness of the Roads through the Mountains, has rendered the Passage for the Artillery to Urgel very difficult, and tedious. It got last Night within three Leagues of that Place, so that 'tis reckoned it will arrive before the Castle on the 26th.

Marshal Berwick intends to be at the same Time, in order to begin that Siege, which 'tis believed cannot last above five or six Days. Then he proposes to take Berga a little Castle, where is a Garrison of about 120 Men. These two Places he proposes to be Master of by the Time of the Arrival of the French Gallies at Port Cetté, and will then proceed to other Military Operations. In the mean Time he has ordered all his Horse, and a great Body of Foot, to begin their March directly for Perpignan. The Marshal has left some Troops at St. Jean Pied de Port, St. Sebastian, and Fontarabia; and has on this Side about 70 Squadrons and 47 Battalions.

Stockholm, Sept. 9. O. S. Admiral Norris arrived with the Fleet at the Dahlers the 26th of last Month. On the 27th his Excellency the Lord Carteret went on board him with the Prince of Hesse, who was treated magnificently. On the 30th the Admiral came to this City, where he was received by the Queen and by his Royal Highness with great Honours. On the 3d Instant the Queen, with the whole Court, went on board the Fleet, and was splendidly entertained at Dinner: There was afterwards a Ball, her Majesty danced, and about Seven in the Evening she retired to a Country-seat in the Neighbourhood, belonging to the Countess of Douglas. Mr. Berkeley, Son of the Lord Berkeley, of Stratton, set out Yesterday from hence with the Lord Carteret's Letter to the Czar, offering His Britannick Majesty's Mediation for making Peace between his Czarish Majesty and the Queen of Sweden.

Hague, Oct. 6. The Swedish Minister here, has by Order from his Court, desired in Form the Guarantie and Permission of this State, for borrowing a Million of Crowns at six per Cent. offering as a Security for the Payment of that Sum with Interest, the Revenues of the Isle of Gothland. The Muscovite Ambassadour endeavours to hinder it, and presented a Memorial to the States against it to Day.

Now I the said Thomas Wheeler do hereby declare, that such Aspersions are false and unjust, and were spoken by me without any Reason or Provocation, and do hereby ask Pardon of the said Mr. Buttens therefore; and do further hereby declare my Belief of his Innocency of and in the Fact by me reported as aforesaid; and, as an Acknowledgment for the same, have this Day paid to him, for forbearing any further Prosecution in Law against me for the aforesaid Scandal, the Sum of 10 l. to be distributed, at his Discretion, to the Poor of such Places as he shall think fit, and have agreed to pay all Costs of Suit touching the Premises; and do hereby empower and desire the said Mr. Buttens to publish this my Acknowledgment and Declaration in the London Gazettes twice, as witness my Hand this 30th Day of June, Anno Domini, 1719.
