Naples, September 19.

Cardinal Schrottembach our Viceroy causes all Diligence to be used in transporting from Time to Time to General Mercy such Supplies of Artillery, Ammunition, and other Necessaries, as can be procured in these Parts: His Eminency gives continual Application to the redressing all publick Grievances that are represented to him, and to the settling of good Order and preserving Tranquility in the Kingdom, which has gained him the Esteem and Affection of all sorts of People. On Sunday last Cardinal Pignatelli, our Archbishop, made his first publick Visit to the Viceroy, in great Pomp, and with a numerous Retinue; and was received with all Marks of Distinction, and magnificently entertained. Yesterday the Viceroy, accompanied by the Marquess of S. Giorgio, and by the Duke of Trajeto Carafa, both Grandees of Spain of the first Rank, went to the Cathedral Church to view the Preparations which are making there for celebrating the Festival of St. Januarius, and was entertained with vocal and instrumental Musick, Cavalier Nicolino Grimaldi and the Marquess Matteo Sassano being the Chief Voices. On the 17th, Sig. Giovanni Maria Vincenti, Resident of the Republick of Venice, made his publick Entry, and was conducted to an Audience of the Viceroy; his own Coaches and Liveries were very splendid, and he was attended with a Train of Seventy Coaches, in which were the Principal Persons of his Nation residing here.

Genoa, Oct. 3. The Night between the 28th and 29th past Sir George Byng failed from Vado, having under his Convoy the Transports, on which were embarked about Seven Thousand Five Hundred Imperialists; and as here

the Wind seems to have been favourable for them, it is hoped they will have a quick Passage. Other Vessels have been hired here, and Stables built in them, to go for Naples, and imbarke there Two Thousand Horse for Sicily; and 'tis reckoned these Vessels will be going in Three or Four Days; by which Time are expected seven Hundred Imperialists more from the Milaneze, which are designed for Sicily also.

Urgel, Oct. 2, N. S. Little Progress has as yet been made in the Siege of this Place, which has been occasioned by the great Difficulties met with in bringing the Cannon to it through the Mountains; but the Artillery coming up last Night, we shall begin to batter in breach to Morrow, and it is not questioned we shall be Masters of the Place in five or six Days. The Marshal Berwick proposes to begin his March from hence upon this Day Seven-night, and to arrive at the Rendezvous of his Army, within six Leagues of Roses, on the 17th Instant. The Enemy have at present three Battalions in Roses, and will probably sling in another or two. The Town is small, but very strong, being a regular Fortification of five Bastions, with Half Moons before the Curtains, and the Works put in very good Repair: But however, it is supposed it will not be able to hold out above twenty Days, considering the Body of Troops we shall have before it, which will consist of thirty three or thirty four Battalions, and seventy three Squadrons, with a Train of Artillery of forty five Cannon of twenty four Pound Ball, ten of sixteen, twelve Mortars for Bombs, and ten for Stones. M. de Bonas is in the Conca de Trem (which Country has submitted to him) with ten Battalions, four Squadrons, and fifteen hundred or two thousand Miquelets; he himself is at La Puebla
