Naples, September 26.

WE have received Letters from the Imperial Camp at Messina dated the 19th Instant, which give an Account, that on the 8th the Spanish Army approached Messina, and the Marquess de Lede with the General Officers advanced and viewed from the Hills the Situation of the Imperial Camp. The Left Wing of the Imperial Army was extended along the Eminences which command the City of Messina, and thence to the Shore for securing the Transports: The Right Wing stretched from behind Fort Gonzaga, to the Bastion called del Secreto, and two Regiments of Horse were posted on the Hill of the Capuchins: Field-Pieces were placed at all the Avenues, and Corps de Garde at the Principal Posts within the Town, and other proper Dispositions were made, for a vigorous Defence against any Attack from the Enemy or Insurrection in the City. On the 15th the Spanish Army drew off and retired to Rametta, their Generals having judged it too hazardous to attack the Imperial Camp. On the 17th in the Night the Imperialists possessed themselves of the Angle of the Covered Way, and made a Communication from thence with all their Works on the Right and Left. On the 18th, two intire Battallions of the Besieged, with the ordinary Guards of the adjoining Works,

made an Attempt to dislodge the Imperialists from that Angle; the Fire was great on both Sides, and lasted for some Time; at length the Enemy were forced to retire, and the Imperialists remained Masters of that Post. On this Occasion Lieutenant General Count Wallis, and Lieutenant General Baron Seckendorf, received Contusions, and Major General Baron Schmettau was wounded.

Naples, Sept. 29. Yesterday arrived a Courier from the Imperial Camp at Messina, with Advice that the Marquess de Lede, with the Spanish Army, had retired towards Palermo; and that it was expected the Imperialists would be Masters of the Citadel in a very few Days. Some Days ago Captain Haddock in the Grafton brought hither a Flemish Colonel, named Storf, who had been taken the 29th past in a Sattee by Captain Scot. This Colonel had been sent by the Marquess de Lede after the Battle of Francavilla to King Philip, and had been dispatched back from Madrid to that Marquess, with Orders, Commissions, and new Promotions, all which he threw into the Sea; just before he was taken.

Berlin, Oct. 10. By Letters from Petersbourg of the 22d past, N. S. we have an Account that M. Slippenbach having received the King of Prussia's Letter to the Czar, notifying the Conclusion of his Treaty with His Britannick Majesty and his Accommodation with Sweden; which Letter he delivered to M. Schaffiroff, and the

the Czar being gone to Cronstot, was expecting an Audience at his Return. The King of Prussia dined Yesterday with the High Steward of his Household M. Printz, at his Country Seat beyond Brandenburg; and was to review the Regiment of Horse commanded by the Markgrave Albert To-Day.

Paris, Oct. 18. It having been resolved to erect Barracks in several Parts of this Kingdom for the Quartering of the Troops, as well Horse as Foot; M. le Blanc has ordered Ingeniers to make Plans of those which are designed to be built in the Generality of Paris. An Arrêt of the King's Council of State, dated September 17, has been published, which renews the former Prohibitions to import into this Kingdom, to sell, or use, Indian Chinese or Eastern Silks or Callicoes, or white Callicoes or Mullins, except such white Callicoes and Mullins as shall be imported and sold by the India Company. Another Arrêt has been published for suppressing the Offices of Receivers General of the Finances, and assigning to the India Company the Management of those Offices.

Hague, Oct. 17. The Town of Amsterdam continues to refuse its Consent to the Nomination of M. Burmania, for the Embassy to Sweden; and have even renewed their Protestations against it. This Ambassador however, having upon repeated Orders from the States General obtained a Frigate of 45 Guns, from the Admiralty of Amsterdam, to carry him to Gottenburg, has taken his Leave of their High Mightinesses, and is gone to Frizeland, from whence he designs to repair to Stockholm as soon as possible, having taken Measures with that Province for the Payment of his Allowance out of the Quota which the said Province is to pay the Generality. Prince Kourakin takes a great deal of Pains to obstruct the Loan of a Million of Dollars demanded by Sweden: His Memorial, as also the States Resolution on that Affair are under the Consideration of the States of the several Provinces.
