Venice, October 20.

ON the 17th arrived here Mr. Burges, who is appointed by the King of Great Britain to relieve Mr. Cunningham, in the Quality of Resident here with this State. The next Day he notified his Arrival to the College. Mr. Cunningham having desired an Audience of Leave, intends to set out from hence in a few Days for England.

Genoa, Oct. 31. Mr. Davenant made Application to the Senate to permit Captain Beverley, Commander of the Mountague, to destroy the Spanish Privateer which his Lieutenant had driven ashore at Diano, but has had no Answer from the Republick, the Captain of the Privateer having decided that Business by setting Fire to his Ship. Captain Beverley three Days ago ordered his Lieutenant with a small armed Vessel to cruize on the Coast for the French Tartans, who finding at St. Remo the Tartan laden with Powder which the aforesaid Privateer had taken, seized her and brought her to Vado: Where all the Tartans laden with Artillery and Ammunition from France being now arrived, Captain Beverley is preparing to sail with those and the other Transports for Sicily.

Berne, Nov. 1. The Protestant Cantons have written a second Letter to the King of Great Britain, to implore his good Offices with the Elector Palatine in favour of his Protestant Subjects. They have written upon the same Subject to his Electoral Highness, as also to the King of Prussia, the States General, and the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel. On the 27th past an Express arrived here from Bienne, with Advice that the Disputes between the Bishop of Porentru and the said City had increased, and that all things were again in Confusion there, and the Citizens in Arms: Whereupon the Senate assembled extraordinarily, and dispatched immediately one of their Se-

cretaries to Bienne for more certain Information of Matters, that upon his Report such Measures may be taken as may put a Stop to this Disorder. In the mean while they have ordered their Bailiff at Nidan, in the Neighbourhood of the said City, to keep his Militia in readiness to march in case of Need.

Heidelberg, Oct. 25. On the 13th Instant Mr. Haldane, the King of Great Britain's Minister, arrived here, and having conferred some Days with the Chief of the Reformed about the State of their Affairs, and notified his coming to the Ministers, he had his Audience of the Elector the 18th, wherein he laid open to his Highness the Grievances of his Protestant Subjects, and the Obligation his Majesty and the other Protestant Powers lie under to support them in the free Exercise of their Religion and peaceable Possession of their Rights and Liberties. His Highness received him very favourably, and gave him Reason to hope, that in Consideration of his Majesty's Interposition he would redress whatever had been done contrary to the Tenour of the publick Treaties. The Complaints of the Reformed are now laying before the Council; and as the Ministers seem very sensible of the bad Consequences the Continuance of the late violent Proceedings must unavoidably have, and of the Necessity of hearkening to his Majesty's Advices, which are seconded by the King of Prussia's, the States General's, and the Landgraves of Cassel and Darmstat's Remonstrances; (Mr. Haldane having delivered Letters from those two last Princes, and being empowered to acquaint the Elector, that they will go into whatever Measures the King of Great Britain will think fit to take to maintain the Protestant Religion in the Empire;) there is Reason to expect a good Effect of this Negotiation, and that the Differences between the Reformed and Roman Catholicks will be amicably accommodated. On the 20th Mr. Hecht, the King of Prussia's Resident, had an Audience of the Elector upon

upon the same Subject. M. Spinà, the Dutch Resident, is likewise arrived here; but he expects further Orders from his Masters, before he presents his Credentials. On the 24th his Electoral Highness reviewed three Regiments of Foot, near Schwetzingen, and afterwards gave a very noble Entertainment to the Officers and the Persons of Distinction who were present.

Brussels, Nov. 4. M. Pesters, Resident of the States General here, has received repeated Orders to demand the Release of the Frigate and Cargo belonging to the Dutch West-India Company lately brought into Ostend: But the Marquess de Prié persists in his first Resolution of detaining her till he has received the Emperour's Orders. In the mean time his Excellency has intimated, that by means of this Reprizal the States General have an Opportunity to press the West-India Company to cause Restitution to be made to the Owners of the two Offenders taken on the Coast of Africa by the Guardships of that Company, to the End this Affair may be treated as between private Persons, without drawing either the Emperour or the States General into Dispute. The Regiments of Foot, which during the Summer incamped in the Park, are preparing to break up; two Battalions of them are to march to Antwerp, two to Bruges, and one to Charleroy: The Garrison of this Place will then consist of six Imperial Battalions, some Companies of Grenadiers, and Vehlen's Regiment of Dragoons. The Marquess de Rubi is gone from hence to take Possession of the Government of Antwerp. M. d'Artiaga is gone to command in Ghent, and Brigadier Devenish in Courtray. To Day being the Festival of St. Charles Borromeo, whose Name the Emperour bears, Te Deum was sung in the Cathedral of this Place, after which the Artillery round the Ramparts was thrice discharged, and there was a great Appearance at Court of Persons of Quality and Distinction, to pay the usual Compliments to the Marquess de Prié.

Hague, Nov. 7. The States of the Province of Holland are to assemble here To-Morrow. A Resolution has been newly taken by the City of Amsterdam for the effectual Accession of this State to the Treaty of Quadruple Alliance, importing that they would agree that the States General should forthwith represent in Form to the King of Spain, that judging this Alliance to be not only equitable in it self, but even advantageous

to his Catholick Majesty, and absolutely necessary for re establishing the Peace of Europe, they are determined to become a Party in it; and that in case his Catholick Majesty does not within three Months, to be reckoned from the 8th Instant, accept of the Terms of that Treaty, they will declare War against him, and in Consequence fully execute their Part of the said Treaty. And they farther propose the States should pass a Resolution to declare War, at the Expiration of the three Months, pursuant to this Representation.
