The Lord Lieutenant's Speech.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

YOU have the Satisfaction to fee that the Bills which were transmitted into Great Britain, and have been returned hither under the Great Seal of that Kingdom in this Seffion, are now paffed into Laws.

His Majefty's Gracious Intentions to fecure the Quiet, and promote the Happiness of the Kingdom, first inclined him to call you together, to advife and propole what might most effectually attain thole Ends. And the fame Goodnels hath induced His Majesty to direct that the Royal Affent should be given to the many uleful Bills fo returned.

You cannot but recollect with Pleasure, that His Majefty being in the more remote Parts of His Dominions hath not occasioned any Delay in the confidering and approving those Bills, and that more than ordinary Expedi-tion hath been used therein, whereby you will be the sooner enabled to attend your own Affairs, after having done your Duty to His Majesty and to your Country in Parliament.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

The Unanimity and Chearfulness shewn by you in Granting to His Majefty the neceffary Aids for the Support of His Eftablishment and Government, are fresh Instances of your Zealous Attachment to His Majesty's Interest and Service, and of the Continuance of the fame Loyal and Dutiful Difposition which you bave at all Times shewn. And I do affure you that I will justly lay the fame before His Majefty, and make no doubt of His receiving thole Inftances of Duty and Affection in the most Gracious manner.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I think my felf happy to find by your refpective Addreffes that my Administration hath been to your Satisfaction, and that by the Tefimony of those who have the best Opportunities of observing and knowing, I have in some Measure attained the End which I proposed to my felf, and have ever had in View fince my coming to the Government, the Service of the. Cown and General Good of the Kingdom.

The advanced Scalon of the Year makes it proper to put an End to this Seffion, that you may have an Opportunity to take Care of the publick Peace in your feveral Countries, and to keep a vigilant Eys over those who may have a Defire to disturb it; but of this you will have less Occasion to be apprehensive, if you fhall all use your Endeavours to cultivate that which will be your best Security against
