Lisbon, October 28. N. S.

THE Lord Hinchinbroke arrived here the 19th Instant, from the Lord Viscount Cobham. His Lordship has had Audience of the King and Queen of Portugal; who received him with great Marks of Favour. We have Advice that the late Duke of Ormond left Valladolid about the 20th past, upon the Arrival of two Couriers that had been dispatched to him from the Court of Madrid; and that he was to imbark at St. Ander with about 1800 Men and Arms for a considerable Number, on five Men of War, viz. the Admiral of 56 Guns, the Toulouse of 56, the Hermione of 40, the Fidela of 30, and the Galera of 14.

Genoa, Nov. 7. The Montague, commanded by Captain Beverley, and the Transports, continue at Vado: But as all the French Vessels that were expected with Artillery and Ammunition for Sicily are arrived, and those Stores are reladen on the Transports, we are hourly in Expectation to hear of their Departure, the Wind being come fair.

From the Camp before Roses, Nov. 7. The French Men of War which were designed to block up Roses by Sea are arrived, and lie at Anchor in the Road. For these three Days past we have had very stormy Weather, with such violent Rains, that the Rivers having overflowed have laid the flat Country under Water, so that there is hardly any Communication between the several Quarters of our Army; and during this Time the Men appointed to unlade the Tartans which brought the Artillery and other Stores necessary for making the Siege, could not work. This Day several of the said Tartans being driven by the Storm upon the Beach, were bulged. It is not yet known what can be recovered out of them: When that is known, the Marshal Berwick will determine, whether to undertake the Siege, or to end the Campaign.

Heidelberg, Nov. 11. Mr. Haldane, his Britannick Majesty's Minister, has had some Conferences with the Ministers of the Elector Palatine, and continues his

Instances to his Electoral Highness, for redressing the Grievances of his Protestant Subjects, and re-instating them in the Possession of the Rights granted them by solemn Treaties. M. Hecht and M. Spina, Ministers of the King of Prussia, and of the States General, are employed in the like Offices; and Yesterday M. d'Osemberg Gentleman of the Bedchamber to the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel arrived here, with Instructions to act in Concert with his Britannick Majesty's Minister on this Occasion. The Pope has written a Letter to the Elector Palatine, applauding his Proceedings against the Protestants, and exhorting him to persist in his Zeal for the Roman Catholick Church.

Hanover, Nov. 3, O. S. The King of Prussia arrived here the 31st past at Night, and was received with all due Honours. Their Majesties have since had frequent Conferences; and having every Day dined in Publick, have shewn on both Sides all the Marks of mutual Satisfaction. His Prussian Majesty designs to set out on the 5th Instant, to return to Berlin. The King intends to leave this Place on Saturday the 7th Instant. The Duke of Holstein came hither some Days ago, and went away on the 1st Instant.

Hague, Tuesday Nov. 10, O. S. His Britannick Majesty being to set out from Hanover on Saturday last, is expected on Thursday next in the Evening at Helvoetsluys, where the Yachts with the Men of War commanded by Sir John Jennings are attending. This Morning the Earl of Cadogan set out from hence to meet his Majesty at Schoonhoven. The Earl of Sunderland arrived here last Saturday Night, as did the Duke of Montrose the next Day, and the Marquess of Winchester this Morning. The Earl Stanhope takes his Way by Schoonhoven directly to Helvoetsluys; whither the Earl of Sunderland goes from hence on Thursday, as do also the other Noblemen and Gentlemen, who are to embark with his Majesty for England. The States of the Province of Holland are to re-assemble To-morrow.
