THe University of Cambridge, having upon the death of the Earl of Manchester, late Chancellor of that University, made choice of his Grace the Duke of Buckingham, for their Chancellor, on Wednesday last they accordingly appeared in Town, when Dr. Breton Vice-Chancellor of that University, together with the Heads of Houses, a very considerable Number of Doctors of all the Faculties, a great body of Masters of Arts, and other Members of the University, met at Exeter-House, from whence they went in their Formalities to York-House, (which house his Grace had borrowed of his Excellency the French Ambassador for that day) where his Grace, accompanied with several of the Nobility and other persons of Honour, received them, and conducted them into a large Room, prepared for that purpose; being entered, his Grace took his Seat, and was presented by the Vice-Chancellor, after a short Speech suitable to the occasion, with the Patent and Statutes of the University, and was accordingly admitted with the usual solemnity; which being ended, his Grace was pleased to entertain them with a very Noble Treat.

Rome, May 23. Here hath been lately published the Popes Bull, by which all Gentlemen within the Ecclesiastical Dominions, have liberty given them freely to Trade and Traffick in all kind of Merchandise, without the least prejudice to their Honour and Nobility, which is looked upon as a great matter for the promoting of Trade in these Countries.

The 18th instant parted hence Cavaglier Grimaldi, Ambassador from the Republick of Venice, on his way home, and the 21 arrived Cavaglier Morosini, appointed by that Senate to succeed in the same quality here. His Holiness having some time since made choice of Signior Durazzo a Genouese, to be his Nuncio to the Duke of Savoy, it is said, that Duke hath upon the score of his Nation, with whom he has at present some difference, declared, he should take it more kindly, some other person were nominated to reside at his Court, nothing has as yet been done in it, nor is it well known, how the matter will be carried.

Upon the advice we had from Vienna, of the Marquis de Franchipani's having been beheaded at Nieußadt, for Treason and Conspiracies against the Emperors Person and Government, they have here adjudged his Estate forfeited to the Church, for having held Correspondency with the Turks, tending to the destruction of the peace of Christendom, and accordingly sent several persons to take possession thereof, on the part of this See, which as is said, hath begot some dissatisfaction in the Cardinal Antonio Barberini, who pretends to part of it, by the settlement of the late Marquis, and especially to the Marquisate of Ne-

mi; how things will be ordered to the content of the said Cardinal we know not.

From Naples they write, that two famous Banditti, some time since brought prisoners thither, were lately executed; and that Don Pedro d' Aragon was gone to divert himself for some days in the Country this season.

Genova, May 27. the 24th instant arrived here from Rome, Signior Giovanni Luca Durazzo, late Resident from this Republick there, not having been able to effect any thing in that Court, concerning the Authority of the Inquisition, to the satisfaction of this State.

From Alicant we have advice of Captain Herberts having been engaged with two Algerines, but that both escaped him; and of an other English Fregat, having forced an Argiers man of War a shoar near Bugia, and afterwards fired her; but of this we must expect a farther confirmation.

Venice, May 29. By a Vessel arrived from Dalmatia, we are told, that General Barbaro continues still at Spalatro, giving all necessary Orders for the well settling of things there, after which he is expected to return hither. That the Turks appear very still on those Confines, not giving us any cause to apprehend the least trouble from thence, as was lately feared; which hath very much satisfied the Senate here.

The Marquis de St. Andre Monsbrun, hath obtained leave to go and pass some time in the Court of France, on condition to return into their service again, when called upon, having in the mean time a yearly pension of about 550 l. Sterling, settled upon him here.

Procurator Nani, was according to our last advice from him, setting forward from Zara to Spalatro, the next day after his arrival there, from whence he proposed to dispatch a Messenger to the Port, as is said, to be there expected with an account of his being on the place; to the end, the Grand Signior may likewise appoint his Commissioners to be sent thither, for the final determining those matters.

From Corfi we have advice, that the Captain Bassa was sayled with his Fleet, consisting of 60 Gallies, and a hundred and twenty Londraes, out of the Archipelago for Candia; some say, they were already arrived there; on what design they may be employed this Summer, we cannot imagine; but certain it is, that great preparations are made for them, of all kind of Military provisions. From the Port they write, that the Grand Signior holds his resolution of going to Belgrade, attended with a body of 20000 men, on pretence of hunting only this season in those parts, though the Neighbouring Countries are in the interim little satisfied therewith, and are not without fears of some design in hand against them, especially the Poles, who seem to be the more concerned, through the great encouragement they may have from the Cossacks to attempt the Ukraïn this Summer.
