Berne, Jan. 24. This State has been taken up laft Week with profecuting the necessary Measures for the better ordering hereafter the Government of this City, and for preventing all Diforders on Account of Duels, and the like Accidents; whereupon they have refolved, that such Tradesmen who serve under Master Workmen, and all Apprentices, shall be forbidden to wear Swords, either in or about the City, on any Account whatever : The like Prohibition extends to all young Men under the Age of 16, of what Quality or Condition soft the Academy of this City. Orders will likewife be given to all the Keepers of Taverns in this Town, not to entertain any Body beyond a certain Hour which is to be fixed in abother Meeting, and not to suffer any Gamings. It is hoped that these Regulations will produce the Effect this State promises it felf from them.

Ndples, Jan. 12. Laft Week Count Neffelroth, the Imperial Commiffary General, imbarked on a Galley and put to Sea for Messina, carrying with him a confiderable Sum of Mo-ney for the Service of the Imperial Troops. Yefterday failed a Number of Tartans with the Remainder of Prince Lobkowitz's Horle for Tra+ pani, under the Convoy of the Canterbury, and Rippon, two British Men of War. The last Letters from Meffina are dated the 25th paft: They give an Account, that the greatest Diligence was used for the third and last Imbarkation of Imperial Troops, and all neceffa-ry Stores for Trapani. General Mercy himfelf goes with this last Body of Troops, and Sir George Byng will accompany him: They would all be ready to fail the first Week of January. We promise our felves, that immediately after their Arrival, Palermo will declare for the Emperour.

St. James's, Jan. 24. This Day Alexander Cunningham, Elq; His Majefty's late Refident at Venice, being returned from that Employment, was introduced to His Majefty by the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Graggs, and delivered his Recredential Letter from the Doge of Venice to His Majefty.

Admiralty-Office, Jan. 20, 1919-20. The Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty do bereby Brittly charge and require all fuch Men belonging to His Majefty's Ships as have had Leave to be absent from them, that they do not fail to return to their Duty on Board the faid Ships, fo foon as the Leave given them fhall be expired; And that fuch others as have abfented then felves without Leave, do immediately repair to their Duty on Board the Ships whereunto they respectively belong, as both the one and the other will answer the contrary at their Peril, and forfeit the Wages due to thim.
