*Berne, Jan. 24.* This State has been taken up last Week with prosecuting the necessary Measures for the better ordering hereafter the Government of this City, and for preventing all Disorders on Account of Duels, and the like Accidents; whereupon they have resolved, that such Tradesmen who serve under Master Workmen, and all Apprentices, shall be forbidden to wear Swords, either in or about the City, on any Account whatever: The like Prohibition extends to all young Men under the Age of 16, of what Quality or Condition soever; as likewise to all Scholars and Students of the Academy of this City. Orders will likewise be given to all the Keepers of Taverns in this Town, not to entertain any Body beyond a certain Hour which is to be fixed in another Meeting, and not to suffer any Gamings. It is hoped that these Regulations will produce the Effect this State promises it self from them.

*Naples, Jan. 12.* Last Week Count Nesselroth, the Imperial Commissary General, embarked on a Galley and put to Sea for Messina, carrying with him a considerable Sum of Money for the Service of the Imperial Troops. Yesterday sailed a Number of Tartans with the Remainder of Prince Lobkowitz's Horse for Trapani, under the Convoy of the Canterbury, and Rippon, two British Men of War. The last Letters from Messina are dated the 25th past: They give an Account, that the greatest Diligence was used for the third and last Imbarcation of Imperial Troops, and all necessary Stores for Trapani. General Mercy himself goes with this last Body of Troops, and Sir George Byng will accompany him: They would all be ready to sail the first Week of January. We promise our selves, that immediately after their Arrival, Palermo will declare for the Emperour.

*St. James's, Jan. 21.* This Day M. Bonet, Resident from the King of Prussia, had a private Audience of Leave of His Majesty, to which he was introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl Stanhope, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Master of the Ceremonies.

*St. James's, Jan. 24.* This Day Alexander Cunningham, Esq; His Majesty's late Resident at Venice, being returned from that Employment, was introduced to His Majesty by the Right Honourable Mr. Secretary Cragg, and delivered his Recredential Letter from the Doge of Venice to His Majesty.

Admiralty-Office, Jan. 20, 1719-20.

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do hereby strictly charge and require all such Men belonging to His Majesty's Ships as have had Leave to be absent from them, that they do not fail to return to their Duty on Board the said Ships, so soon as the Leave given them shall be expired; And that such others as have absented themselves without Leave, do immediately repair to their Duty on Board the Ships whereunto they respectively belong, as both the one and the other will answer the contrary at their Peril, and forfeit the Wages due to them.

The Commissioners for Examining and Determining the Debts due to the Army, give Notice to the Officers of the Regiments of Foot late under the Command of the Right Honourable the Lord Slane and Brigadier Dormer, that they have directed the Colonels of the said Regiments, or their Agents, to state the particular Accounts of the said Officers, and also of the Companies of the said Regiments, agreeable to the Regimental State determined by the said Commissioners, and to lay them before the Commissioners with all convenient speed; And the said Officers are hereby required, by themselves, or their lawful Attornies, to adjust and settle their particular Accounts with the said Colonels, or their Agents, on or before the 10th of February next; at which Time the Colonels or Agents are required to lay the Accounts so distributed before the Commissioners, in Order to their Determining and Certifying the Debts due to the said Officers: Also all Persons that have any Assignments made by the Officers of the said Regiments, upon their Arrears of Pay due in the said Regiments, are required forthwith to enter their Assignments with the Agent of the Regiment to which the Officer whom they claim did belong; and the Agents are required, upon producing the said Assignments, to make true Entries thereof, expressing the Assignor's Name, Quality, and Company, in which he served, the Assignees Name, the Sum assign'd, and Date of Assignment, and to lay the same before the Commissioners, together with the Accounts of the said Regiments; and all Persons concerned in the said Assignments, may have Access to the Agents to examine the same; and where any Disputes shall arise touching any of the said Accounts or Assignments, the Parties may apply to the Commissioners; and in Case no Application be made to the Commissioners within 14 Days after the said 10th of February, they will proceed to Certify on the said Accounts, agreeable to the Distributions then to be deliver'd in by the respective Colonels or their Agents.
