Berne, Jan. 24. This State has been taken up last Week with prosecuting the necessary Measures for the better ordering hereafter the Government of this City, and for preventing all Disorders on Account of Duels, and the like Accidents; whereupon they have resolved, that such Tradesmen who serve under Master Workmen, and all Apprentices, shall be forbidden to wear Swords, either in or about the City, on any Account whatever: The like Prohibition extends to all young Men under the Age of 16, of what Quality or Condition soever; as likewise to all Scholars and Students of the Academy of this City. Orders will likewise be given to all the Keepers of Taverns in this Town, not to entertain any Body beyond a certain Hour which is to be fixed in another Meeting, and not to suffer any Gamings. It is hoped that these Regulations will produce the Effect this State promises it self from them.

Naples, Jan. 12. Last Week Count Nesselroth, the Imperial Commissary General, imbarked on a Galley and put to Sea for Messina, carrying with him a considerable Sum of Money for the Service of the Imperial Troops. Yesterday sailed a Number of Tartans with the Remainder of Prince Lobkowitz's Horse for Traipani, under the Convoy of the Canterbury, and Rippon, two British Men of War. The last Letters from Messina are dated the 25th past: They give an Account, that the greatest Diligence was used for the third and last Imbarkation of Imperial Troops, and all necessary Stores for Trapani. General Mercy himself goes with this last Body of Troops, and Sir George Byng will accompany him: They would all be ready to sail the first Week of January. We promise our selves, that immediately after their Arrival, Palermo will declare for the Emperour.
