Letters from Warsaw give an Account, that the General Diet held there, did on the 17th Instant agree upon new Instructions to be given to the Palatine of Mazovia, appointed Ambassadour from the King and Republick to the Czar: Which Instructions contain in Substance, That the Republick does by him assure his Czarish Majesty of its sincere Intention to cultivate a strict Friendship with him, provided he will on his Side acquit himself of his Engagements with the Republick; in Consequence whereof the said Ambassadour is to demand the Cession of Livonia to the Republick, Restitution of the Artillery and Ammunition taken and carried out of Poland, and Satisfaction for the great Damages caused by the Muscovite Troops. He is also to make Instances, that the Czar desist for the future (by Letters or Intrigues of his Ministers) to excite Jealousies and Distrust between the King and Republick. And lastly, the said Ambassadour is to endeavour to dispose his Czarish Majesty to Peace; but in Case he will continue the War, then the Ambassadour is ordered in the Name of the whole Republick to renounce all Alliance with him.

Hague, Feb. 10, N. S. On the 8th Instant at Night Count Morville the French Ambassadour received by an Express, the King of Spain's Act of Acceptance of the Convention made at Paris the 18th of July 1718, N. S. without any Restriction, Limitation, or new Conditions. The same Express brought to the Marquess de Beretti Landi Ambassadour of Spain, Full Powers for signing the said Convention: And the Marquess having received, by another way, from his Court, Instructions to accept the Treaty of London, dated the 2d of August, 1718, N. S. before the Time limited by the Convention signed here in Relation to the Expectatives in Italy should be expired, he found himself sufficiently empowered to sign the said Treaty. He has accordingly agreed with the Imperial, British, and French Ministers, to do it, in the Form that was used for the Accession of the King of Sardinia to the said Treaty; that the Preamble of the Instrument shall be the same with that of the King of Sardinia's; and that

the whole Treaty with the secret and separate Articles shall be inserted therein. Instruments are engrossing accordingly, and will be forthwith signed by Count Windisgratz, the Earl of Cadogan, Count Morville, and the Marquess Beretti Landi.

Hague, Feb. 13, N. S. The several Instruments for the Accession of his Catholick Majesty to the Treaty of Quadruple Alliance made at London, which are to be signed by his Plenipotentiary and those of the Contracting Powers in the said Treaty, being by all those Ministers intirely settled as to the Form and Tenour thereof, are getting ready for signing with all possible Diligence: And that nothing may be wanting, in Point of the strictest Form, to secure the Consent of Spain to all the Conditions of the said Treaty, the Marquess Beretti Landi has also agreed to sign the Convention made at Paris the 18th of July 1718, in concert with the Ministers of the Powers who are Parties thereto; so that there will be forthwith a perfect Conclusion of this important Business. Letters from Heidelberg of the 7th Instant advise, that the Elector Palatine having received from the Emperour, a Letter exhorting him to satisfy the Protestants by accommodating the Disputes lately risen, his Highness had resolved to comply therewith; and particularly in what relates to the Church of St. Esprit and the Heidelberg Catechism: And the Ministers of the Powers who have interposed their good Offices in Behalf of the distressed Protestant Subjects of the Palatinate, were to have his Highness's said Resolution communicated to them in a Day or two.
