SOME Days ago the Emperour gave, with great Ceremony, in the Pope's Name, the red Caps to the Cardinals Georgio Spinola the Nuncio at this Court, and Count Michael Frederick d'Althan Bishop of Vaccia. Both Cardinals went in the Morning to Court with a splendid Equipage and Retinue. Cardinal Spinola had three Coaches drawn by six Horses, and another Coach with two Horses. Count Althan had likewise three Coaches drawn by six Horses, which were followed by four more drawn by two Horses each. Their Eminencies were in Purple, and their Servants in rich Liveries. They attended his Imperial Majesty from the Palace to the Church of the bare-footed Augustin Friars, where the Ceremony was performed in the following Manner; Count Collonitz, Prince-Bishop of this City, said Mass in his Pontificalia, after which Sig. Spinelli and Sig. Valenti Gonzaga, Gentlemen of the Pope's Bed Chamber, whom he had sent hither with the Caps for the two Cardinals, took each a Gilt Silver Bason which were placed on a small Table standing between the Imperial Throne and the Desk behind which the Cardinals sat, in which Basons were the Pope's Letters transmitted hither on this Occasion, and presented them to the Emperour who ordered them to be read aloud: This done they took each another Bason in which were the red Caps, and the Cardinals one after the other approached the Throne, where the Emperour holding his own Hat with the Left Hand, with the Right put the Cap on the Cardinal's Head, covering himself at the same time. The Ceremony was concluded with singing Te Deum, after which the Cardinals attended the Emperour to Court, where they appeared in his Majesty's Presence during his Dinner with their red Hats on; from thence they went to a splendid Entertainment provided for them by Count Michael John d'Althan Counsellour of State and Master of the Horse to the Emperour. The Emperour has appointed Count Waldstein, Provincial

Marshal of the Kingdom of Bohemia, in the Room of Count Gallas late Viceroy of Naples. On the 28th past arrived here from Sicily Admiral Byng's Son, as also an Imperial Lieutenant Colonel, who brought an Account of the State of Affairs in that Island. On the 29th the Court received Advice from the Hague, that the Marquess Beretti Landi had signed the Instrument of the King of Spain's accepting the Conditions contained in the Treaty of Quadruple Alliance, and in the Evening the Emperour was complimented on that Occasion by the Nobility and the foreign Ministers. The Marquess de Breil, sent to this Court by the King of Sardinia in the Room of the Marquess de St. Thomas, forbears appearing in publick till he has notified his Arrival to the foreign Ministers. Don Marino Francesco Caracciola, Prince of Avelino, Hereditary Chancellour of the Kingdom of Naples, died here on the 19th past in the 52d Year of his Age.

Lisbon, March 10. The new Cardinal Pereyra arrived here from Algarve some Days ago, and is preparing for his Voyage to Rome, where he is to reside as Minister of this Crown. The British Men of War Dursley-Galley and Enterprize are now cruising from Cape Finisterre along the Coast of Galicia and Portugal, and Commadore Cavendish has sent the Tartar and Sheerness to cruise to the Northward. The Dover and Advice are refitting in this Harbour: The Antelope is sailed for England. The Dragon Man of War is sailed for Minorca. By a Ship that came from Cadiz the 25th past N. S. we are informed, that three Men of War, one of 74 Guns, another of 62, and a third of 25, were sailed from thence, having with them five Spanish India Ships, not laden as Merchantmen, but as Transports with Arms and Ammunition, and that a Draught of 20 Men out of each Company of that Garrison, amounting in all to 1200 Men, were embarked on those Ships, with Provisions for six Months. The Design they are gone upon was not publickly known, but it was supposed they are bound for the West-Indies.
