*Dantzick, April 17.*

ON the 15th Instant in the Evening three Swedish Frigates and five armed Barks came to an Anchor in this Road; their Design was to attack three Muscovite Ships of War, commanded by M. Wilbois, which had for a long time interrupted the Navigation and Commerce of the Swedes with this Port. As soon as the Muscovites had fight of them, they retired from the Mouth of the Vistula towards this City. Yesterday in the Evening the Swedish Ships came up the River likewise with great Difficulty, the Wind being contrary. Upon this Occasion this Town observed an exact Neutrality, suffering both the Swedes and Muscovites to pass without Opposition before the Fort called the Munde, and refusing to let the Muscovite Commadore come within the Boom. The Swedish Commadore being desired by our Magistrates not to proceed immediately to Extremities, granted M. Wilbois 24 Hours time to take his Resolution either to leave this Port or to fight. To-Day the Muscovites capitulated with the Swedes; who in favour of this City, and for preventing the ill Consequences which might happen to it, in case of an Engagement in our Road, (there being a Convention subsisting between the Czar and this City) agreed not only to let them retire, but promised to let them be 48 Hours out at Sea before they would chase or endeavour to attack them. General Jagozinsky his Czarish Majesty's Minister arrived here some Days ago, and is to proceed with a Commission to the Court of Vienna. Our last Letters from Poland give us some Expectation that his Polish Majesty will come and spend Part of the Summer here: The great Treasurer is expected here To-Morrow.

*Hambourg, April 23.* The Gentleman sent by the King of Sweden to notify to several Courts his Advancement to the Throne, arrived here some Days ago. On the 21st Count Tessin proceeded from hence for the Court of Great Britain, as did Yesterday Count Lewenhaupt for Vienna, Count Spens for Paris, Baron Duben for Cassel, and General Horn for Berlin; and we are expecting General Trautfetter, who goes with the like Commission to the Court of Poland. Baron Kniphausen, his Prussian Majesty's Minister arrived here Yesterday in his Return from Stockholm, and will forthwith proceed on his Journey for Berlin. The last Letters from Petersbourg of the 5th of this Month advise, that M. Stambke was expected there, and it was rumoured the Design of his coming was to negotiate a Marriage between the Duke of Holstein, and the Princess Anne the Czar's eldest Daughter.

*Copenhagen, April 23.* Captain Gruner being sent Express by the King of Denmark with Dispatches for Major General Lewenohrn his Majesty's Minister at Stockholm, it is hoped the Negotiation of Peace between this Crown and that of Sweden will soon be brought to a happy Issue.

*Hague, April 30.* The Count de Recheren is arrived here, to solicit on the behalf of his Brother, that the Sentence given by the Council of State against him and the Field-Officers of the Garrison of Tournay, may if possible be reversed or at least mitigated, alledging that they have been treated with too much Rigour. Count Staremburg, who is appointed Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperour to the Court of Great Britain, is daily expected here: The William and Mary Yacht which is to carry him over, arrived some Days ago at Rotterdam. Prince William of Hesse Cassel

Cassel, Governour of Breda, is set out from thence for Stockholm, in order to be present at the Coronation of the King his Brother, which is to be performed at Upsal next Month. M. Preiss, the Swedish Minister here, has notified in form to the States General the King his Master's Accession to the Crown.
