A PROCLAMATION, For putting in Execution the Laws and Statutes of this Realm, for the preventing the Exportation of Wooll, Wooll-Fells, Woollen-Yarn, Mort-lings, Shorlings, Wooll-Flocks, Fullers Earth, and Fulling Clay.

GEORGE R. Hercas many good Laws have been made to pro-hibit and premant the Function made to probibit and prevent the Exportation of Wooll, Weoll-Fells, Mortlings or Shorlings, or any Tarn made of Wooll, or any Wooll-Flucks, or any Fullers. Earth, or Ful-ling-Clay what foewer, out of the Kingdoms of Great Bri-tain or Ireland, or out of the Ifis of Forfin or Guernfey, wish Sark and Alderney, into foreign Parts, under the wish Sark and Alderney, into foreign Parts, under the feveral Penalties and Forfeitures in the faid Laws con-tained; in ard ly which Laws feveral Encouragements are given to fuch Perfon or Perfon who fhall fue or in-ferm for the fame; and thereby feveral Directions are given, as well for Guards on the Coafts as for entring and reg firing of Mooll near the Sea-Coafts, for the bet-ter p eventing fuch Exportation, under feveral Penalties therein mentioned; yet neverthelefs the Exportation the reof is fill notorioufly continued, to the great Difeu-rar ment and Pretudice of the Weollen Trade and Marag ment and Prejudice of the Woollen Trade and Ma-nufacture of this Kingd m: We therefore taking the fime into our ferious Confideration, and duly weighing the cuit Conf guences thereaf to the Hooll n Man ufacture of this Kingdom, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, Kingdom, by and with the Advice of our Privy Genneil, have thought fit to iffue this our Royal Proclamation : And we do hereby, in Purfuance of the faid Laws, firit-ly charge, prohibit and command, that ro manner of Wooll, Wooll-Fells, Wrollen-Tarn, Mirtlings, Shoilings, Wooll-Flocks, Fullers-Earth, or Fulling-Clay whatforver, fhall be at any time hereafter, by any Perfon or Per-fons whatfoever, either natural born Subjests, Denizens or Strangers, exported, transported, fent, or conveyed out of the Kingdoms or Places aforefaid, into any Parts beyond the Seas, contrary to the faid Laws : And that all the Laws and Statutes now in Force agains? all the Laws and Statutes now in Force against the Exportation of the faid Commodities, be in every Partrcular punctually o ferved and kept, upon Pain of the feveral Penaltics, which by the Laws and Statutes of this Realm may be inflicted upon the Offinders themfilves, their Aiders, Procurers, Abettors or Favourers. And we do hereby declare, that we will cause to be effectually put in Execution the Laws and Statutes a-jorefaid ; and that all Affistance and Encouragement forefata; and that all Applicance and Encouragement fhall be given by the Commissioners of our Customs, and other our Officers, in the Recovery of the Rewards given by the faid Laws, to the Perfons who shall dif-cover and fue for the fame. And we do be eby strictly charge and command all our Officers of the Customs, and others, who shall be any ways imployed or intrufand others, who just be any wars imployed of intraj-ted in the discovering, profecuting or preventing the faid Offinces, that they do use their utm ft Diligence in the discharge of their said Trust, under the Pain of incurring our highest Displeasure. And we do here-by striktly charge and command all our Officers and incurring our highli Dipliadure. And we do here-by frittly charge and cummand all our Officers and Minifters to be aiding and affifting to the Officers and eur Cuftoms, and others duly authorized to put in Ex ecution the faid Laws, and all others afting in their Aid. And for the further Encouragement of all Per-fors to be diligent in diffeovering any of the Exporters of Wooll or Woollen Yarn, we do hereby, upon the bumble Addrifs of the Commons of Great Britain in Parliament affimbled, further promife and declare, that whoever shall diffeover any Perfon or Perfons who, after the twentieth Day of May which shall be in the Year of our Lord One thousand feven bundred and twenty ones shall export any Woolls or Woollen Yarn constrary to the faid Laws, so as fuch Perfon or Per-fons be brought to Justice, shall have and receive, oven and above all Rewards already given by Afts of Par-liament, the twenter Rewards of forty Pounds, where the Rewards already forty Pounds, where the Rewards already forty Pounds, where the Rewards already of the provent of Par-liament, the further Rewards of forty Pounds, where the Rewards any fuch Offender shall wake

Stocklolm, May 18, N. S. The 14th Inflant being appointed for the King's Coronation, two Heralds did the Day before give publick Notice thereof with Scund of Trumper, and the Mafter of the Ce-remonies invited all the foreign Ministers to affift at the Coremony. The next Morning the King and Queen repaired to the great Church of St. Nicholas, the Regalia being carried before them by the great Officers of State, the Solemnity was performed by the Archbifhop of Upfal, and the Count de Horn as Prefident of the Chancellerie administred the ufual Oaths to his Maj fly, and to the Senators, and the Day concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and o-ther Marks of univerfal Joy. Ye terday the States of the Kingdom paid Homage to his Majefly, who be-ing placed on the Throne, Count Horn as Marthal of the Afterrbly, read the Oaths of Allegiance, which each Order of the States repeated after him. This being over, he read another Oath, by which they obliged themfelves to defend the Liberties of their Country, and to oppofe Arbitrary Power, after which every Member killed his Majefly's Hand and de-parted. Seven Men of War of 50 to 80 Guns arri-ved fome Days ago in the Mouth of our River from Carelferoon, and thofe that wintered here, confilt-ing of 10 Ships of the Line of Battle, befides feven or eight Frigates are failed down to join them.
